

Griffith-Carter Set To Meet In Rugged Middleweight Test

NEW YORK (UPI) — Welterweight champion Emile Griffith makes an all-out bid for challenger's role in the lively middleweight division Friday night at Pittsburgh against top midweight contender Rubin (Hurricane) Carter.

Griffith of New York, fighter of the year and the only man to win the 147-pound crown three times already has beaten 160-pound contenders Holly Mims and Jose Gonzalez in 1963.

And now Emile is favored at 9-5 over slugger Carter of Paterson, N.J.

If Griffith, 24, lives up to the odds by harnessing the "Hurricane" he would be an extreme-

ly attractive challenger at the box office, in a "battle of champions" for Joey Giardello's new 160-pound crown.

Giardello of Cherry Hill, N.J., took the title from Nigerian Dick Tiger at Atlantic City, Dec. 7. Now Joey admits he has a "gentlemen's agreement" for a return title fight with Tiger. However, the World Boxing Association (WBA) banned return-bout contracts or agreements some time ago.

Carter, 26, already is in challenging position and he plans to file "official" challenges with the WBA and New York State Commission if he beats Griffith.

Archie Litman is promoting Friday's nationally televised 10-round at Pittsburgh's Civic Arena. New York's Madison Square Garden Boxing Corporation is serving as television producer.

Meanwhile slugger Florentino Fernandez of Cuba and Miami Beach earned another middleweight contenders' fight at the Garden "some time in February" by turning the tables in bloody fashion on Argentina's Juan (Rocky) Rivero at the Garden last Friday night.

Left-hooker Fernandez, who is ranked seventh by the WBA, stopped Rivero at the end of the seventh round in their scheduled 10-round return fight because of bloody cuts on his right brow and under the chin.

UO Ducks Busy Preparing For Sun Bowl Appearance

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene — Oregon's free-wheeling Webfoots, featuring the pin-point passing skill of quarterback Bob Berry, face SMU of the Southwest Conference in the Sun Bowl Dec. 31 at El Paso.

The Ducks, who finished the season with three consecutive triumphs and posted an overall record of 7-3, ranked among the nation's leaders in total offense, passing and scoring and the amazing Berry rated near the top in both total offense and passing.

Coach Len Casanova's nifty offense, featuring Berry's 253 points and 36 touchdowns and stood fourth in the nation in total offense — with an average of 300 yards per game.

It marked the fifth straight season the Webfoots have averaged better than three touchdowns a game.

Berry, rated by his own coaches as the finest collegiate quarterback in the country, rates fifth in total offense with 1,733 yards and ninth in passing with 101 completions in 171 attempts for 875 yards and 16 touchdowns.

Berry turns primary rushing chores over to halfbacks Larry Hill (289 yards and 5.3 average) and Dennis Keller (294 yards and 4.5 average) and fullback Lu Bain (282 yards and 4.8 average).

Favorite passing targets for the great junior signal-caller are ends Dick Imwalle (23 receptions and 3 touchdowns) and Rich Schwab (22 catches for five touchdowns) and halfback H. D. Murphy (18 grabs for two touchdowns).

All-American halfback Mel Renfro will not participate in the Sun Bowl. Renfro suffered a severe injury prior to the season finale against Oregon State and was ruled out of further competition this year.

Trojan Matmen To Open Home Season Thursday

Douglas' Trojans will have a strong nucleus of veterans returning to lead the way during the 1963-64 prep wrestling season.

The Trojans will open the season Thursday when they host the Riddle Irish and the Myrtle Creek Vikings in a triangular meet at Douglas. Starting time is set for 6:30 p.m.

To date Douglas wrestling action has been limited to the Jayvees and the Marshfield Beginners Tournament. In the latter meet the Trojans captured seven first place ribbons, six seconds and nine third.

Loyola Retains No. 1 Rating; OSU's Beavers Tied For 10th

NEW YORK (UPI) — Michigan and Kentucky moved up to challenge top-ranked Loyola of Chicago today in the United Press International college basketball ratings. The weekly standings were jumbled by a series of upsets.

Loyola's high scoring Ramblers survived a close brush with the upset wave against Detroit and Western Michigan during the week and thus dropped four first-place ballots from last week. The undefeated Ramblers were ranked No. 1 by 28 of the 35 coaches on the UPI rating board this week.

Unbeaten Michigan, an early season favorite to capture the Big Ten crown, skipped three places to second, receiving three first-place ratings and totaling 245 points, 80 behind Loyola.

Kentucky, which has broken the 100-point mark three times in winning five straight, moved four positions to third with two first-place votes and 202 points.

Duke, one of five members of the top 10 last week to be upset, dropped from second to fourth; Cincinnati gained one position to fifth and UCLA, unbeaten in four tests, jumped from 14th to sixth.

NYU, upset by Toledo, fell to seventh from third and Texas advanced a notch to eighth.

Vanderbilt, another high-scoring outfit which dropped Duke last week, vaulted from 16th to ninth with five consecutive wins; and two powerful smaller universities, Davidson and Toledo, both with six straight victories, tied Oregon State for 10th.

Minnesota, Wichita and Arizona State rated 13-14-15 in order followed by Oklahoma City 16th, Kansas State 17th and Creighton 18th.

Bradley finished 19th and Georgia Tech and Villanova tied for 20th.
