The Roseburg-Sutherlin Bowling Association will have a "Hall of Fame." Yes, it is now official. The Executive Committee at a meeting Dec. 8 formally adopted the method of selection and requirements for eligibility to this select group.

The association has long wished, in some way, to give lasting recognition to individuals who have made outstanding contributions to the association, to bowling in general or by their personal bowling ability have established themselves as deserving of a permanent place in association records. The American Bowling Congress long ago set up its "Hall of Fame" to honor deserving individuals.

Although we know of no such award by the Oregon State Bowling Association, several states do have the "Hall of Fame" award. Many city associations have awards of merit, revolving trophies and various other methods of recognizing their outstanding members. We approve of our association's choice both in the creation of the "Hall of Fame" and in the procedure governing the selection of the individuals to be honored.

Names of candidates can be submitted by any member of the Roseburg-Sutherlin Association. Here is an outline of rules as adopted:

1. Individual plaque with picture and listed accomplishments. (A. Original to be contained in a lighted, portable cabinet.)
2. Qualifications: (A. Distinguished service to bowling). (B. Distinguished service to Roseburg-Sutherlin Bowling Association). (C. Outstanding accomplishments in bowling).

Young Ace Area Bowler Will Be Given Trophy

Danny Fairchild, the 15-year-old Riddle High School student who made history with his perfect 300 bowling game at Indian Lanes Sunday, will be honored by the Brunswick Corporation.

The Riddle lad will be awarded a trophy for his 300 game, a 300 arm patch and will be made an honor member of the 300 Hall of Fame. Danny's perfect game was the first ever rolled in a Roseburg bowling establishment.

3. — Hall of Fame Selection Committee. (A. To be appointed by Association President. Preferably made up of active past-association presidents). (B. To accept nominee applications, screen them and report to the Executive Committee). (C. To investigate and prepare applications for Executive Committee. Nominations must be presented to committee, in writing, before February 1 of each bowling year).
4. — Final acceptance to be made by Executive Committee. (A. Use secret ballot and must be approved by 75 per cent of Executive Committee).
5. — Cabinet containing "Hall of Fame" citation to be rotated among association bowling establishments at yearly intervals. (A. Must be displayed in prominent place).
6. — "Hall of Fame" cabinet to be prominently displayed at all Association-sponsored bowling tournaments for the length of said tournament.

How is your average coming along? Are you in line for the Association "Bowler of the Year Award?" The trophy is a beauty! We saw it last week at the Roseburg Bowl. It will be on display at each of the houses eventually so everyone can take a look. Here is the way to earn this award:

1. Highest average per one bowling year in a single sanctioned league. (Summer leagues exempted).
2. Average must be earned with sanctioned four- or five-man team. Mixed-team averages not eligible.
3. A minimum of 78 games in league of the highest average.
4. Trophy to be displayed in house where attained.
5. Any bowler winning trophy three times retires the award and the Association will furnish a new one.
6. Association secretary must validate contending averages.
7. Association Executive Committee to be final judge in offering award.

League bowling is drawing to its first half conclusion, but there is ample time to get yourself in contention for the "Bowler of the Year" award. Next week we shall again give you a list of the highest averages around town.

Northwestern Selects Agase

CHICAGO (UPI) — Notre Dame and Northwestern had new football coaches today, definitely, and most of the nation must have heard the sigh of relief breathed by officials of both schools.

Ara Parseghian accepted the Notre Dame job after telephone conversations cleared up a "little difference" which caused him to reject a proffered Irish contract Monday.

Northwestern promptly hired Alex Agase, Parseghian's No. 1 assistant during his eight years as Wildcat coach, as the new head man under a three-year contract.

Announcements of the final selection of the two coaches came less than an hour apart. The log jam broke first when Parseghian and the Rev. Edmund P. Joyce, C.S.C., executive vice president of Notre Dame, settled on exact terms of a four-year contract.

Parseghian, 40, notified Northwestern Athletic Director Stu Holcomb, and Holcomb hastily called a press conference and notified Agase he was hired.

Roseburg Wrestlers Seek Revenge Win At Crater

Revenge will be foremost in the minds of the Roseburg Indian grapplers tonight when they invade Central Point for a return engagement against the Crater Comets.

Starting time at Crater High School is set for 6:30 p.m.

The tribe wrestlers lost to the Comets, 27-22, in the season's opener, then fell before the powerful Medford Black Tornado, 43-13. Therefore, the Indians will not only be looking for revenge, they will be seeking their first victory of the season.

Following tonight's match, the next action for the local matmen will be Jan. 4 when the Indians host the Roseburg Invitational Tournament. Competing against the Indians in tournament action will be the Marshfield Pirates, the Klamath Falls Pelicans and the Medford Black Tornado.

The probable lineup for the Indians in Varsity action tonight will find Mike Raiche leading off in the 98-pound bracket. Raiche was awarded a forfeit against Crater, then lost to the Medford lightweight. Don Langenberg will be in uniform at 106 pounds. Langenberg has a 2-0 record, winning by a decision and a forfeit. Jay Zurcher (0-2) is set for action at 115 pounds, with Matt Frey (0-2) wrestling at 123 pounds.

In the 130-pound class will be John Waldron (0-2), with either Lonnie Good or Wayne Gray handling the chores at 136 pounds. Gray battled his Medford opponent to a draw, while Good was selected "Wrestler of the Week" for his opening win against Crater.

Rich Holder (1-1) and Ron Begley (1-1) will be in action at 141 and 148 pounds respectively. In the 157-pound class will be last week's "Wrestler of the Week," Tom Thomas. Thomas has posted lopsided 9-0 and 10-0 decisions in his two matches to date.

In the heavier weights will be either Stan Rich or Mike Bigler in the 168-pound class, with the latter wrestling at 178 pounds. Both have 0-2 records. Dick Spielman (0-1) or Terry Byrd (1-0) will wrestle at 191 pounds, and Tom Alberston (0-2) is set for duty in the unlimited division.

Elkton Elks Are Favored In Yoncalla Cage Tourney

Yoncalla's Eagles will serve as the host team for the second annual Yoncalla Lions Club basketball tournament Thursday and Friday.

In the opening game of the tourney the Elkton Elks and the Lowell Raiders will square off, while the Crow Cougars and the host Eagles will clash in the second outing Thursday. The Elkton-Loell game will start at 7:15 p.m., with the Crow-Yoncalla outing scheduled for 8:45.

Friday the losers of the consolation round will meet for consolation honors at 7:15, and the winners will play for the championship at 8:45.

While the Elks and the Eagles are competing in tournament play, other Bico-B teams are set for limited action this week. Friday the Oakland Oaks entertain the Camas Valley Hornets, while Saturday the Canyonville Tigers will be at Grants Pass to play the Cavenemy Jayvees and the Powers Cruisers will host the Pacific Pirates. Regular games find the Jayvee action starting at 6:30 and the varsity games at 8.

In the Yoncalla tournament the Elkton quintet will enter the action as the favorite. The Elks have posted three victories in as many starts and are picked as the team to beat in Bico-B play this year. The Elks have posted wins over Drain, Crow and the Marshfield Jayvees. Elkton has scored 163 points in the three games, while giving up just 117 points.

Don Suloff leads the Elkton attack, ranking as the second leading scorer among the Bico-B stars. Suloff has potted 53 points in three games for an average of 17.67 points-per-game. Gary Brooks, having missed the last two Elkton games, scored 13 points in his lone outing, while Daryl Bullock is averaging 8.33 points-per-game in three contests.

Yoncalla, the host team of the tournament, has a 0-3 record against A-2 opponents. The Eagles have been toppled by Sutherlin and twice by Riddle. Yoncalla has been outscored by its opponents, 187 to 128.

Leading the Yoncalla scoring is Don Wiley with 39 points in the three games for a 13 points-per-game average. Don Wiley also provides the Eagles with rebounding power. Don Langdon follows Don Wiley in scoring for the Eagles with an average of 7 points-per-game, while Dick Langdon is averaging 6.67 and Dennis Boan is hitting at a 6.33 clip.

Lowell comes into the tournament rated as one of the leading candidates in Trico-B League play, and the Raiders boast a record of 35 consecutive home victories. Crow features a tall team, but in its only invasion of Douglas County the Lane County team fell to the talented Elks, 72-46.

Friday's game at Oakland will feature two Bico-B teams in a warm-up game, having beaten Glendale and losing to Riddle by two points. Oakland has the leading scorer in the league in Kerney Manley who is averaging 18 points per game for two outings, followed by Dennis Parker, 16.5 points-per-game, and Jon Lamoreaux, 13.5 points-per-game.

Camas Valley is led by Terry Buel who has averaged 13 points-per-game for three battles. Steve Looney follows Buel in the scoring with 23 points in the three games. Camas Valley has a 2-1 record, and is fresh from winning the invitational tournament at Canyonville Bible Academy.

Canyonville will go into Saturday's game at Grants Pass with a 1-1 record, losing to Camas Valley in the CBA tourney finale. The Tigers are led in scoring by George Muetzel who is averaging 11.5 points-per-game and Mike Heath with a 9.5 average.

Powers has a 1-2 mark to date, losing a pair of games to Myrtle Point. The Cruisers are led by star guard Dan Taylor, currently ranking third among the Bico-B scorers.
