

Angry Republicans Balk Demo Efforts For Aid Bill Vote

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Irate Republicans balked Democratic efforts to win an immediate House test today on a foreign aid fight that has snarled up the adjournment of Congress for Christmas.

They mustered enough votes to block consideration of the measure until Tuesday.

House Democratic leaders needed a two-thirds vote of the House to waive a normal one-day waiting period before consideration of the Russian trade credit amendment involved in the \$3 billion aid appropriation.

On a roll call, they didn't quite get it.

The vote was 202 for proceeding today and 105 against it.

Congressional leaders meantime had rounded up every available member and were confident that despite a transportation fiasco due to an overnight snow they had the votes to settle the aid issue on terms acceptable to the President.

The new contract is retroactive to June 1962, date of expiration of the previous agreement. The 43-month pact expires Dec. 31, 1965.

Bulgarian Spy Trial Slated

VIENNA (UPI) — Communist Bulgaria will try a former official in its U.N. mission this week on charges of spying for the United States. It accuses Ivan Assen Georgiev of receiving \$200,000 for his espionage work and spending much of it on women and immoral living.

The 56-year-old Georgiev, international lawyer and former counselor to the Bulgarian mission to the United Nations, is charged with delivering Bulgarian political, economic, and military information to the "American intelligence service."

The charges were announced Saturday night by the Bulgarian Telegraph Agency (BTA) which said Georgiev's trial would be held Thursday.
