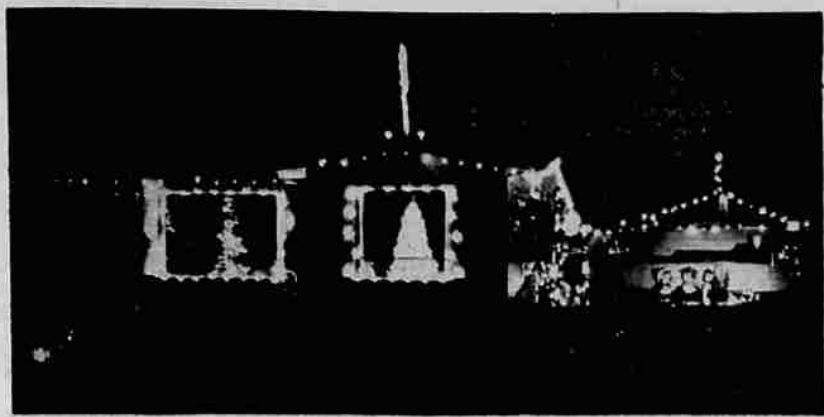

House Approves Sale Of Wheat To Red Nations, Ends Session

That too was turned down in an all-night House session Friday after Democratic members had left town in large numbers. Over the weekend, a frantic scramble took place to get them back and to reverse the decision.

Johnson himself delayed plans to fly to Texas for Christmas. He reportedly spent much of the weekend on the telephone with appeals for support to individual members.

Rep. H. R. Gross, R-Iowa, demanded caustically today whether Johnson planned now to remain in town until the aid bill—with or without the trade curb—was finally passed. Speaker McCormack shut off any possible answer by ruling that Gross' time had expired.

Cash Deal

Rep. Otto Passman, D-La., told the House he was convinced that the wheat sale, as recognized in international trade, actually would be a cash deal.

"And I'm convinced that if we go through with this deal we will receive \$2 billion in gold."

Passman, chairman of an appropriations subcommittee that drafted the foreign aid bill said, if the United States did not make the sale other countries would, and they would be the ones to realize the profits.

"I think it's about time we stopped playing politics," he shouted.

A Republican member of the subcommittee, Rep. George M. Rhodes, Ariz., denied that voting for the ban would be a vote of no confidence in the President.

"He has the capacity to be a strong President and I believe he will be a strong President," Rhodes said. "But he will not be a strong President because Congress rolls over and plays dead."

There were about 200 members present at 7:15 a.m. EST when speaker John McCormack swore in the newest member, Rep. J. J. Pickle, D-Tex., who was elected in a special vote last week and hurried to Washington Monday to be on hand for the session.

The wheat curb was written into a \$3 billion foreign aid appropriation which can't be enacted before Friday at the earliest. Johnson had wanted the whole package wrapped up and sealed before Congress quit for the year.

Local Youth Dies In Eugene Crash

David Lindblade, 17, son of Mr. and Mrs. David E. Lindblade, 3410 Hooker Road, Roseburg, was fatally injured in a one-car crash on Interstate Highway 5 north of Eugene Monday.

The car, driven by Lindblade, swerved off the shoulder, traveling 185 feet in the gravel before rolling over and striking a guard rail, police reports indicate. The guard rail broke and was driven through the windshield. The accident occurred at 9:15 p.m. Lindblade is reported to have died about 45 minutes later.

The car was traveling south on the freeway when the accident occurred two miles north of the Eugene exit.

Albert Kolb, 24; Yvonne Gaswint, 19, and Ella Worden, 18, all of Roseburg, passengers in the car, were taken to a Eugene hospital for treatment of injuries.

Kolb was treated for minor injuries and released later Monday night. Miss Gaswint's condition was reported good by hospital officials and she will be released today.

Miss Worden is reported in fair condition at Sacred Heart Hospital, with her most serious injury being a severe cut on her left side.

Funeral arrangements for Lindblade are pending at Long and Shukle Memorial Chapel.

William E. Crawford

Funeral services for William E. Crawford, 72, Glide, will be held Friday at 2 p.m. at Wilson's Chapel of the Roses.

Crawford was born Feb. 24, 1891, in Indiana. He had lived on Little River Road in the Glide area for the past 18 years, moving there from Vernonia.

Crawford was a bridge construction worker until his retirement and was a member of the IOOF lodge of Vernonia. His wife, Mabel, preceded him in death in 1938.

Surviving is one son, William A. Crawford, Glide; two daughters, Mrs. Mary Hill, Glide, and Mrs. Barbara Foglia, Los Alamitos, Calif.; one brother, J. N. Crawford, Groveland, Calif.; one sister, Mrs. E. A. McDonald, Yoncalla; four grandchildren; and two great grandchildren.

The Rev. James Smith of the First Christian Church of Roseburg will officiate at the services. Graveside services will be held at the Vernonia city cemetery Saturday at 2 p.m.

Beulah F. Reid

Funeral services for Beulah F. Reid were scheduled for 2 p.m. today at Wilson's Chapel of the Roses. Mrs. Reid, 57, died last Friday.

The Rev. John M. Clarno of Roseburg Apostolic Faith Church and the Rev. Loyce C. Carves of the Medford Apostolic Faith were to officiate. Concluding services and interment were to follow at Roseburg Memorial Gardens.

Suspect Asks Hearing

Richard Vernon Ball, 52, of Wilbur, asked for a preliminary hearing when arraigned in the justice of peace court of Warren DeLaVergne Monday on a charge of threatening commission of a felony.

Ball, a service station operator at Wilbur, is accused in a private complaint of threatening a neighbor who operates a nearby garage. He was arrested by a deputy sheriff.

Guy James Lanzo, 43, Tillamook, asked to see an attorney when arraigned in Douglas County District Court on a charge of being a felon in possession of a revolver.

NLRB Dismisses Petition Filed By County Firm

The National Labor Relations Board has dismissed a petition filed by Sutherlin Machine Works Inc. for an election to settle a question of union representation.

The decision, based on a hearing held before the board, evolves from a dispute earlier this year involving the Sutherlin firm and several building trade unions in connection with construction of fuel storage and distribution facilities for Martin Bros. Timber and Container Corp. on a site at Oakland.

Sutherlin Machine Works is non-union.

During the course of the dispute, according to the NLRB decision report, the Lane-Coos-Curry-Douglas Counties Building and Construction Trades Council picketed the project and union representatives asked the employer to sign a building trades agreement to cover employees on the Oakland construction job. The firm refused, according to the report.

Subsequently, however, picketing was halted and the Building Trades Council together with certain of its component unions disclaimed any interest in representing the employees.

The NLRB said the matter to be decided was whether there is a present subsisting claim for recognition raising a question concerning representation.

"The record is clear that since May 29, 1963, the unions have engaged in no picketing of the employer, nor have they engaged in any conduct that may possibly be construed as evidencing a continued claim for recognition," the NLRB stated.

The NLRB ruled that disclaimers of interest filed June 7 and 10 were bonafide and that there "is no present claim for recognition sufficient to support the employer's petition for election."

One member of the NLRB noted that the board would entertain a motion requesting reinstatement of the employer's petition in the event the unions, within six months of the dismissal order, engage in conduct inconsistent with their disclaimers.

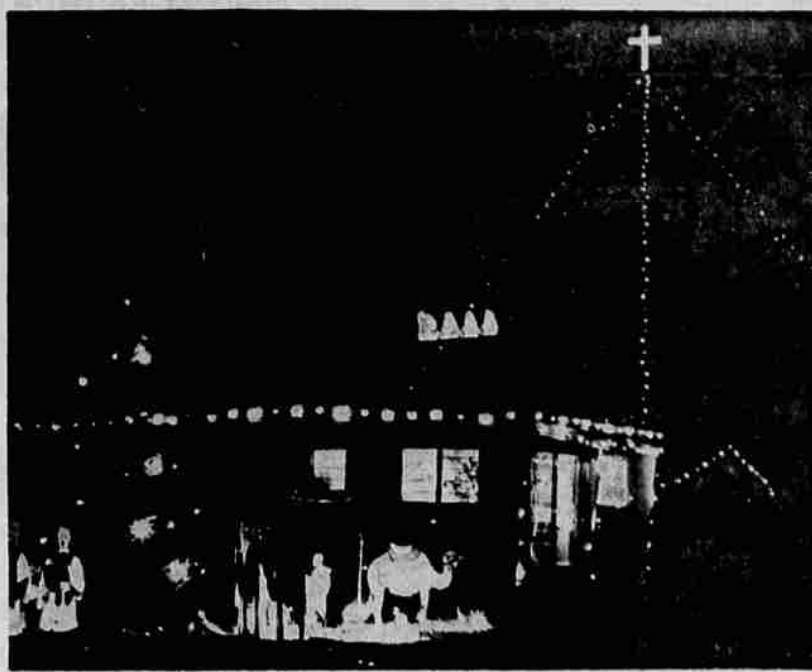
PRESERVING SIGHT
