

Texas Gears Defense For Halting Staubach

AUSTIN, Texas (UPI) — The University of Texas Longhorns took a workout break for Christmas amply impressed with Navy's gridiron ability but ready to go on the field in the Cotton Bowl to prove to any skeptic who's No. 1 in the nation.

The national champion Longhorns will take the only perfect record among major colleges to the New Year's classic in Dallas against No. 2 Navy in a contest that has about everything.

A few opinions voiced mainly in the East that Navy should be ranked above Texas have filtered down Texas way in recent weeks.

In addition to featuring the two top teams in the nation, the Cotton Bowl game will see the UPI "linebacker of the year," Scott Appleton, going against the UPI "back and player of the year," Navy quarterback Roger Staubach.

Well Known In Texas
The Middle signal caller is becoming just about as well known among Texas players as their own famous coach, Darrell Royal. Ask any member of the team or any coach about Staubach, and they settle down for some serious discussion that includes all the adjectives used to describe a great player.

"He certainly passes as well as Baylor's Don Trull and is a much better runner," said defense Coach Miles Campbell. "He's the spitting image of Don Meredith plus the fact that he runs much better than Don could. He's something. He's an exciting football player."

Defensive line Coach Charley Shira said the Staubach threat was "greatly increased" by the ability of Navy ends David Sjuggerud and Jim Campbell.

Both Campbell and Shira said Texas will stick to its defensive

pattern used throughout the season in the game with Navy.

Stick With Pattern
"We'd be fools to change our defensive pattern after winning 10 games with it," Campbell said.

But he said he and his crew were reconciled to the fact that "you just can't stop Navy's attack."

"They're too fine a team for anybody to stop them," Campbell said. "The best we can hope for is to slow them down."

Texas relies mainly on its ground game, headed by tailback Tommy Ford, the Southwest Conference's top ground gainer with 738 yards and a 4.6 average, and called by quarterback Duke Carlisle.

Carlisle works from the old-fashioned split-T. But he also does some defensive chores, and one of his great moments in this department was a last-minute interception of a Trull pass against Baylor that saved Texas' undefeated streak and kept them at the top of the national rankings.

Non-League Battles Set For Prep Teams

A light weekend of basketball is on tap for three Douglas County A-2 teams — with all games being away from home.

Myrtle Creek's Vikings, boasting a 4-3 record for the season, will attempt to add a pair of victories when they invade the domain of the Pacific Pirates at Langlois for a pair of non-league encounters.

Along with Friday's Myrtle Creek-Pacific game, the Sutherland Bulldogs will travel to Rogue River to face the Chieftains. Saturday the Douglas Trojans will be at Central Point against the A-1 Crater Comets and Myrtle Creek will square off again against Pacific.

Varsity action for all games featuring the local teams is set for 8 p.m., with the Jayvee games starting at 6:30.

Douglas, sporting an undefeated 5-0 record and currently ranked as the No. 6 A-2 team in the state, will be led to battle by guard Larry Samples. Samples is averaging 14.4 points per game for the Trojans. Assisting Samples in the scoring department to date has been Dan Withers and Ray Shepherd with averages of 11.2 and 11 points-per-game respectively.

The Trojans, rated as the team to beat in Umpqua Valley League play have strung together five straight wins with their high-powered, hard-running offense, which combines with a tight man-to-man defense.

Myrtle Creek, the defending UVL champion, once again boasts a top defensive unit. Offensively the Viks have a well-balanced attack which features deliberate ball control — waiting for the good shots.

Larry Pringle, talented forward, is the leading Viking scorer with a total of 103 points in seven games for an average of 14.71 points per game. Jerry Wilson is averaging 12.43 points-per-game and Bob Fuller has an average of 11.28 points.

The Bulldogs of Sutherland have posted only two wins in six outings, but have shown promise of becoming a tough UVL competitor before the end of the season. Mike Ouellette holds a slim edge in scoring with an average of 10.5 points-per-game, followed closely by Charles Koch and Larry Johnson. Koch, a sophomore, and Johnson have identical 10.33 averages.

U. S. Netters Tie Aussies

ADELAIDE, Australia (UPI) — The United States, looking for its first Davis Cup tennis triumph since 1958, was forced to settle for a 1-1 split of the opening challenge round singles matches against Australia today when Aussie Roy Emerson upset Chuck McKinley, 6-3, 3-6, 7-5, 7-5.

Cocky, often temperamental Dennis Ralston of Bakersfield, Calif., gave the Yanks the early lead when he blew a two-set lead and then rallied to beat 19-year-old John Newcombe of Australia, 6-4, 6-1, 3-6, 4-6, 7-5.

But then Emerson, trailing 4-1 in the third set as Wimbledon champion McKinley of San Antonio, Texas, seemed about to put the Yanks in the driver's seat, staged a stunning comeback to win their battle in two hours and five minutes.

The net effect of the split, watched by a crowd of 7,000 at the Memorial Drive Courts, was to bolster Aussie hopes of keeping the cup. The defending champions, ruled slight favorites to win the doubles match Friday.

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Alaskan Movie To Be Viewed

The next best thing to a hunting and fishing trip to Alaska whale, seal, king crab and Dall is seeing a movie with all the thrills of the stalks backed by the scenic grandeur of the northern wilderness.

A two-hour color movie, "Horns of the Hunter," will be shown Friday and Saturday at the Community Building of the Douglas County Fairgrounds. Starting time each day is 7:30 p.m.

The movie, produced by Ron and Beverly Hayes of Anchorage, features the spectacular fishing in Alaska, along with scenes of caribou, walrus, moose, polar bear, grizzly bear, whale, seal, king crab and Dall sheep. In addition viewers will see the beauty of Alaskan wild flowers, will get a glimpse of Eskimo life and will witness the spectacular Lake George spring breakup.

Hunting scenes will include the taking of a Boone and Crockett record caribou, a 68-inch trophy moose and thrilling bear hunts — both for the elusive polar bear and the dangerous grizzly.

The film is also reported to include the only scenes of the Ballooga and black whale as they work to keep holes open in the surface ice 100 miles off shore. These mammals of the sea must keep the air holes open in order to survive as they need to come to the surface for air every 15 minutes.

All-in-all, the many aspects of hunting and fishing in Alaska is combined with the natural scenic beauty in the "Horns of the Hunter," with scenes from all sections of Alaska being offered. The movie is being shown by Frank and Dale Olson of Springfield.

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OSU'S BIG THREE — Waiting to lead the Oregon State Beavers into action in tonight's opening round of the Far West Classic Tournament in Portland is seven-foot center Mel Counts and guards Frank Peters and Jim Jarvis. The Beavers, rated seventh in the nation with a 7-1 record, are favored to remain undefeated in Classic play. Counts, Peters and Jarvis rate as the top three-point-makers to date this season. Jarvis is a former Roseburg star. Counts played his prep ball at Marshfield and Peters is a California product.

AFL Records Shattered During 1963 Campaign

NEW YORK (UPI) — "Twas a rating system, Rote had 41 points to 38 for Tom Flores of Oakland.

Cappelletti regained the scoring title he had won in 1961 by scoring two touchdowns, kicking 22 field goals and 35 conversions. Art Powell of Oakland was runnerup with 96 points on 16 touchdowns, all on pass receptions.

Taylor gained his fourth straight pass-catching title with 78 catches that covered 1,010 yards.

Bobby Jancik of the Oilers won two titles, punt returns and kickoff returns, Tobin Rote of the San Diego Chargers was the league's top passer, Gino Cappelletti of the Boston Patriots won the scoring championship with 113 points and Lionel Taylor of the Broncos was the AFL pass-catching king.

Taylor, Fraser and Jancik were repeaters from the 1962 season.

Daniels, a speedy, 220-pound halfback, eclipsed the old rushing mark of Buffalo's Cookie Gilchrist when he carried for 1,098 yards. A 157-yard production against Houston in the final game did the trick. Paul Lowe of San Diego was second with 1,010 yards, the only other player to go over the 1,000-yard mark. Keith Lincoln of San Diego had the best carrying average, 6.4 yards.

Glick intercepted 12 passes to crack the record of 11 thefts held jointly by Denver's Goose Gosounlin and New York's Lee Riley. Fraser's 45.8 yard punting average supplanted the old league mark of 45 yards set by Billy Atkins of Buffalo in 1961.

Jancik's twin titles were accomplished by running back 45 kickoffs for an average of 29.2 yards and returning 15 punts for a 15-yard average.

Rote, a veteran pro in his first AFL season, had a 59.2 percentage on 170 completions in 287 attempts. He passed for 2,510 yards and tossed for 20 touchdowns. Under the efficient-

OSU Beavers Favored For 8th Far West Title

Christmas has come and gone, which means it's time now for those hectic holiday basketball tournaments.

Major jousts get under way today at Los Angeles, Portland and San Francisco and a few West Coast teams are also at Oklahoma City for the All-College tourney.

The Los Angeles Holiday Classic is again presenting a strong field.

Nationally fifth-ranked UCLA and Big Six dark horse Southern California are co-hosts for this one and the visitors are led by Michigan, the nation's second-rated team, and NYU, currently holding down the 10th spot.

But there is not a weak team in this one, since Illinois, Pitt, West Virginia and Yale are also entered.

The competition will also provide a comparative showcase for a host of All-America candidates including performers such as UCLA's Walt Hazzard, NYU's Barry Kramer, and Yale's Rick Kaminsky.

Here's the opening round pairings: UCLA-Yale, Michigan-NYU, Illinois-West Virginia, Pitt-USC.

The question at the Far West Classic in Portland has never

varied since it started in 1956 and the answer may also be the same. The question: Who is going to beat Oregon State? The answer: Nobody.

The Beavers have never lost a game at the tournament and have won the event seven straight times. And this year's Oregon State team would seem to be the strongest ever to participate in the classic.

The nationally seventh-ranked Beavers are joined by West Coast teams Oregon, Washington, and Seattle. The unbeaten Chiefs would seem the team most likely to upset the Beavers.

Strong Visitors Too

Visitors include powerhouses Iowa and Colorado State and lesser lights LSU and Brigham Young.

Oregon State meets LSU and Iowa faces Colorado State tonight.

At San Francisco, the eight teams of the West Coast Athletic Conference have at it in the fifth annual WCAC tournament. The field includes Santa Barbara, newest conference member.

University of San Francisco appears head and shoulders above the rest of the others, but the tournament has a history of wild upsets and the winner of the previous four tournaments has never gone on to capture the conference title.

UO Ducks Pin Sun Bowl Hopes On Junior Quarterback--Berry

The following is the fifth of 10 dispatches sizing up the college football bowl teams.

EUGENE, Ore. (UPI) — Oregon's Sun Bowl bound football team, pinning its victory hopes on brilliant quarterback Bob Berry, reassembles today for a flight to El Paso, Tex., where they meet Southern Methodist Dec. 31 in the Sun Bowl's new 30,000 seat stadium.

Berry, a junior, ranked sixth nationally in total offense with 1,733 yards and threw six touchdowns passes in leading Oregon to a 7-3 season. He completed 59 per cent of his passes.

Oregon head man Len Cavanaugh, who has been round a long time, calls Berry the "greatest competitor" he has ever coached.

As Oregon wound up three days of tough, two-day drills just before Christmas, there was no complacency about Southern Methodist, despite the latter's 4-6 record.

"We're in for a battle," Cavanaugh said, pointing to the Mustangs' victories over second-ranked Navy and Gator Bowl bound Air Force.

Oregon will be without its great halfback, Mel Renfro

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
