Truman Scoffs At 'Veep' Plan

NEW YORK (UPI)—Former President Harry S. Truman today turned thumbs down on a proposal by Sen. Kenneth Keating, R-N.Y., that the Constitution be revised to provide for two vice presidents.

"It's a silly program, that's all it is," Truman said during his early morning walk near the Manhattan hotel where he has been staying for a holiday visit with his daughter and grandchildren.

"The present setup is good enough," Truman said.

Truman ridiculed criticism of President Johnson by Sen. Barry M. Goldwater, R-Ariz., who said Thursday that the Chief Executive had used "arm twisting" tactics to get congressional support for the foreign aid bill.

"It wasn't anything that would hurt anybody," Truman said. He said critics of Johnson, "never had any experience in handling a legislative body—and Johnson has."

Truman disclosed that Johnson telephoned him Thursday and asked Truman to meet with him soon at the White House. However, Truman said he did not know why the President wanted to see him.

Congress Meets, But In Ill Mood

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Senate and the House met for a no-business session today in a mood of some ill will, despite the holiday season.

Both chambers planned strictly pro forma sessions—lasting only long enough to convene, satisfy the requirements of the rules, and be gavelled into adjournment until Monday.

Sen. William Proxmire, D-Wis., acting Senate Democratic leader at last Tuesday's brief but rebellious session, said the Senate meeting would be "strictly token. No speeches. We'll be in and out." The same held true for the House, where only a few members planned to show up.

Still to come was an anticipated wrangle in the Senate Monday over a disputed provision in the \$3 billion compromise foreign aid appropriations bill concerning export-import bank guarantees for commercial sale of U.S. wheat to Russia.

Proxmire said the fight "could last all day" and further prolong a session that already is the longest since the 1941-42 World War II meeting.

Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., accused President Johnson Thursday of trying to treat members of Congress as his "personal errand boys" and forcing them to stay during the holidays to pass the aid bill.

Hanging Date Set For Slayer

SEATTLE (UPI)—The date of hanging for convicted killer Don Anthony White, 27, Seattle, was set for March 25 by Judge Theodore S. Turner in King County Superior Court Thursday.

Turner said White's attorneys told him they planned to ask for a writ of habeas corpus in order to present new evidence to the State Supreme Court.

White was convicted in May, 1960, for the Christmas Eve, 1959, rape-slaying of Alice Jumper, 69, and killing of Willie Dixon, 49, both of Seattle. The jury set the death penalty at that time.

The State Supreme Court upheld the decision of the lower court. The U.S. Supreme Court denied White a hearing before that body.

GAO Reports \$247.5 Millions In Savings To U.S. Taxpayers

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The federal "watch dog" agency reported Thursday that it had saved \$247.5 million for the taxpayers that year.

The GAO turned out hundreds of reports and audits on hundreds of activities and forwarded them to congress and the agencies involved.

The \$247.5 million in savings described in its report was made up of "refunds, collections, measurable savings, and other financial benefits resulting from the work of the GAO." Actual refunds totaled \$29.1 million, according to the agency.

The GAO's biggest concern was the Defense Department. This is by far the biggest federal agency, spending more than half of the entire budget.

Among some of the GAO findings and subsequent savings noted in the report:

—The Army and Air Force were spending about \$66 million a year more than they should on repair and maintenance of non-combat vehicles because of practices that were "wasteful and inefficient."

—Over a four year period the services lost at least \$18 million in unrecoverable overpayment to military men.

—The Army could have saved as much as \$5.7 million in contracts on the Redstone and Jupiter missiles had it bought certain parts directly from a manufacturer and supplied them to the contractor sub-contractor for the components.

Oil Firm's Bankruptcy Was 'Shock'

NEW YORK (UPI)—The president of a firm that surveyed oil movements at the Allied Crude Oil Refining Corp. tank farm testified Thursday that Allied had been slow in meeting its bills but its bankruptcy came as a shock.

Gedmund A. Sienicki, president of John Vaughan Co., Inc., told a court-ordered hearing into the affairs of Allied that he had never found any irregularities in the now-insolvent firm's operations.

The bankruptcy of Allied touched off a major scandal involving the disappearance of millions of gallons of edible oils. It also resulted in liquidation of the Wall Street security firm, Ira Haupt & Co., which collapsed when Allied failed to meet an \$18 million margin call.

Sienicki testified Allied owed his company between \$9,000 and \$10,000 and he had made several attempts to collect at least part of the debt.

Allied stored huge quantities of vegetable and animal oils in a Bayonne, N. J., tank farm. When the company filed for bankruptcy, creditors attempted to claim the oil to settle debts. Then it was discovered that millions of pounds of oil, used by Allied as collateral in buying commodity futures, were missing—if they ever existed.

Anthony DeAngelis, president of Allied, was indicted Monday by a federal grand jury in Newark on charges of interstate transportation of \$40 million in forged receipts for soybean oil, supposedly stored in the tank farm at Bayonne.
