Gator Bowl Squads Set

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (UPI)—The Air Force Academy and the University of North Carolina went through final tune-ups today on the eve of their clash in the 19th annual Gator Bowl.

The Carolina Tar Heels, a slim two-point favorite, went to nearby St. Augustine to work on defenses aimed at stopping quarterback Terry Isaacson whose running and passing accounted for half of the Air Force's offense during a 7-3 season.

The Falcons flew into the naval air station here Thursday afternoon after a morning workout at McCord Air Force Base in Orlando, Fla., where they spent Christmas.

The rival coaches for Saturday's Gator Bowl game are old rivals even though their present teams have never met.

Air Force Coach Ben Martin used to be at the helm of the Virginia Cavaliers who are one of the oldest rivals on the schedule of coach Jim Hickey's Tar Heels.

Hickey has been putting his players through their paces here for several hours a day.

"One of our biggest worries," he said, "is the fact that the Air Force makes defensive changes on almost every play."

"We'll be facing more defensive changes than in any other game this year," Hickey said. "They do a lot of switching on offense too."

because of the lively lift that Cassius gave the fight game as he lapped and laughed his way to the challenger's role.

Clay also was credited with participating in the "fight of the year" because of his victory over Doug Jones on March 13 before a turnaway crowd of 18,732 at Madison Square Garden as he "drove Doug out of his path to a heavyweight championship shot" in their thrilling and controversial bout.

Despite those accolades for the "Louisville Lip," the magazine admitted frankly "Clay is not considered likely to win the championship from Liston at Miami Beach on Feb. 25."

In Clay's other two fights this year, he stopped Charlie Powell (3) at Pittsburgh on Jan. 24 and climbed off the canvas on June 18 to knock out England's Henry Cooper (5).

Champion Liston was credited with participating in the "round of the year"—that 2:10 of the first round in which he knocked out ex-champion Patterson at Las Vegas, Nev., July 22. It proved that Sonny's title-winning first-round kygo over Patterson in 1962 was no fluke.

Bears Chary Of Giants

CHICAGO (UPI)—An unusual talent of the New York Giants' pass receivers makes them a tough team to beat, Chicago Bears defensive coach George Allen said today.

"They have receivers who continually make the great catch," Allen said.

"Frank Gifford made a great catch for them against Pittsburgh, and (Del) Shofner can do it all the time."

Allen said "the No. 1 thing we've got to do to beat them is stop their passing game."

He pointed out that it couldn't be an easy job with Y. A. Tittle throwing and Gifford, Shofner, Aaron Thomas and Joe Walton on the receiving end.

The Bears, Western Division champions of the National Football League, tangle with the Giants, Eastern Division titleholders, Sunday for the league crown. Despite his high rating of the Giants, Allen said he believed "we've got a chance."

"This is the best offensive team we've played this year, and their defense keeps you off balance. But we have the top pass defense, and our morale is very good."

"We know we're going to have to play our top game of the year, but this is the championship game, and if we're not ready for this, we never will be."

Junior Coffey May Play In Rose Bowl

LONG BEACH, Calif. (UPI)—Washington fullback Junior Coffey, once consigned to a spectator's role in the Rose Bowl game because of a foot fracture,

worked out in sweat clothes today and it appeared that he may be able to play against Illinois in New Year's Day.

The 210-pound ball-carrier was fitted with a specially built shoe to support the tiny fracture near the little toe on his left foot. He experienced some pain when the shoe was laced but this was expected to ease off, according to the team physician.

Later Coffey said, "It feels so good, it makes me want to laugh."

No one on the Washington staff including Head Coach Jim Owens would say that Coffey would definitely play, but there was strong hope.

The team physician, who asked his name be withheld, said, "Anybody's guess is as good as anybody else's. We're just sitting around here hoping. Every orthopedic man we've talked to says there's no reason why he cannot play. But we cannot definitely say he will play."

"We'll just have to wait and see what develops," Owens said.

A cast stretching from the toes to the knee on Coffey's left leg was applied last Saturday after the fullback complained of foot pains. The cast was removed Wednesday night.

"Our doctors have determined Coffey's injury is a slight stress fracture," Owens said. "They wish to see how the foot responds without a cast. They recommended limited exercise."

Coach Hayden Fry ran his team through several wind sprints and conditioning exercises in clear warm weather as a heavier workout was scheduled today.

Man-Eating Lines Due For East-West Contest

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — This is the year of man-eating lines (not lions) in the 39th annual Shrine East-West game.

And despite Rudyward Kipling's classic claim that "ne'er the twain shall meet," there'll be a lot of head-on collisions in the forward wall on the lawn at Kezar Stadium Saturday.

In fact, some of the bone-banging charges may be heard clear up in the 60th row—if you can believe what some of the coaches and players have to say.

"That Carl Eller of Minnesota," said a pro scout watching from the stands during practice, "is so tough that he sweeps aside a whole line when he charges. Man, he's going to be a great one in the pro ranks."

"I'll betcha he eats live wildcats for breakfast and spits out the claws."

Eller stands 6-6 and weighs 250. The pro scout thinks he'll finally round out to a nice solid 290 in the pro ranks when he reaches maturity. He is 22 now and already has been signed by the Minnesota Vikings.

Other Stars — Some of the boys who may be playing opposite him aren't exactly pushovers, however. One of these is Gary Kirner, a 218-pound tackle from University of Southern California. Kirner was the outstanding lineman in the West during the collegiate season. He not only is a deadly tackler, but is reputed to be one of the fastest forward wall men in the business.

And when it comes to defense, the four starting ends are rated in the "eat 'em alive" category.

For the East, there are Dave Ellison, 251-pounder from Purdue; and Don Underwood, 210-pounder from Michigan State.

For the West it will be Mel Profit, a towering 6-5, 220-pounder from UCLA; and Jim McNaughton, 230-pounder from Utah State.

These four won't draw the headlines that the offensive ends, such as Jim Kelly of Notre Dame; Vern Burke of Oregon State and Burke will. But they'll get the job done.

There isn't a short, fat lineman on either squad.

Tall Too — As a matter of fact, there are only three men out of the 48 who stand under six feet and all of these are backs. The average lineman will stand around 6-3 and weigh 225 pounds.

The Spaulding Trophy each year goes to the outstanding lineman and the advance prediction is that Carl Eller will be the winner — unless one of the ends grabs all the glory.

With his pass catching. In the past, this trophy has gone to Carl Massey, University of Texas; Matt Hazeltine, California; Joe Long, Stanford; Don Shinnick, UCLA; Don Manoukian, Stanford; Sam Williams, Michigan State; Lou Cordileone, Clemson, E. J. Holub, Texas Tech; Buddy Iles, Texas Christian, and Hugh Campbell, Washington State.

But there is the belief in the training camps that this boy Eller may put all other line performances to shame with a "super-man" showing that could sweep the East to victory.

Flashy Offense — Saturday's 38th renewal of the East-West Shrine game here may provide the nation with a preview of the National Football League title game that follows the next day.

The West, like the New York Giants, figure to feature the flashy attack. At the West camp at Stanford, Baylor's Don Trull has looked like money in the bank passing to a quick fleet of receivers like Oregon State's Vern Burke, UCLA's Mel Profit, and USC's Willie Brown.
