

# Beavers Cage Bid Rated Top Story In State Sports

PORTLAND (UPI) — Oregon State's advance to the semifinals of the NCAA basketball playoffs was the state's top sports story in 1963, according to a poll of sports editors.

The Beaver bid, which fell short when Slat's Gill's men were trounced twice, won by nearly a two to one margin over the runnerup story—Portland's bid for the Olympics and the proposed Delta Park complex.

Other balloting was close among a wide variety of stories with more than 30 getting votes.

Here's how the sports editors saw the top 10:

1. OSU reaches NCAA semifinals.
2. Portland's Olympic bid and proposed Delta Park development.
3. Lewis and Clark's unbeaten football season.
4. Honors given Vern Burke, Oregon State end.
5. Steve Pauly of Oregon State wins NCAA decathlon.
6. Injuries to Mel Renfro and Bob Berry and Oregon's upset by San Jose State.
7. Oregon lands future major sports events.
8. Peter Ward's fine rookie year with the Chicago White Sox.
9. Oregon prep wrestlers tour Japan.
10. Terry Baker, Counts Led Beavers.

Mel Counts and Baker led Oregon State to a fine basketball season but the Beavers were no match for Cincinnati in the first game of the NCAA semifinals at Louisville, Ky. At year's end, another fine OSU team, led by Counts, was making itself heard among national powers.

Portland lost out to Detroit as the U.S. choice for the 1968 host Olympic city, but that city in turn lost the bid to Mexico City. Portland now is pointing toward 1972 when it hopes facilities will be available in the Delta Park area of north Portland.

Lewis and Clark went unbeaten in eight football games and attracted more attention when it was passed over by the NAIA for a playoff berth.

Vern Burke made the UPI all-America football team as well as several others and was also given the Pop Warner trophy as the most valuable senior football player on the West Coast and the Voit award as the outstanding player on the coast.

# McKinley Triumph Brings Davis Cup Back To States

ADELAIDE, Australia (UPI) — Chuck McKinley, a 22-year-old native of St. Louis, Mo., whose temper tantrums once brought tennis disgrace to the United States, brought the Davis Cup back to Uncle Sam's shores today with a 10-12, 6-2, 9-7, 6-2 victory over Australia's John Newcombe.

McKinley's triumph in the fifth and concluding match of the 1963 challenge round came after Australian champion Roy Emerson evened the series at 2-2 with a 6-2, 6-3, 3-6, 6-2 win over Dennis Ralston of Bakersfield, Calif.

The victory marked the first time the United States has won the silver cup symbolic of world amateur tennis supremacy since 1928. Australia had held the cup for the last four years and for 11 of the last 13 years.

**Tops Wimbledon Showing**

For McKinley, a 5-foot, 8-inch, 135-pound "bomber" who was subjected to international criticism a few years ago when he threw his racket into the grandstands during an interzone Davis Cup final at Perth, Australia, today's victory marked the peak of his career — a triumph even greater than his win at Wimbledon.

It came when Australia seemed about to snatch the Davis Cup away from the United States which had taken a 2-1 lead in the series Friday when McKinley and Ralston defeated Emerson and Neale Fraser in the doubles competition. Fraser was so disappointed in his performance that he announced before today's first singles match that he is retiring "for good."

**Boggs, Dengenis Picked**

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (UPI) — Guard Gary Boggs of Lewis and Clark and tackle Pete Dengenis of Linfield were named to the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics all-star football team Friday.

Boggs was selected on the offensive unit and Dengenis was named to the defensive unit of the team.

**Dick Stuart Given  
AL Comeback Award**

CHICAGO (UPI) — Dick Stuart, the Boston Red Sox' American League leader in runs batted in with 118, today was named winner of the William Wrigley Jr. Memorial award for comeback for the year.

Stuart was traded to the Red Sox by Pittsburgh after the 1962 season and in his first year in the American League hit .261 with 42 home runs.

# Bears Face Giants For NFL Title

## New York Favored By 1 To Claim Fourth Crown

CHICAGO (UPI) — The New York Giants and Chicago Bears tangle Sunday for the National Football League championship, and fans will pay a record gate of \$1.5 million to watch their all-out battle in clear cold weather.

The temperature was expected to be in the low 20s with fair skies at game time, advanced to noon, CST, to make possible a sudden death overtime if the two clubs are tied at the end of the regulation playing period.

Regardless of the frigid air, Owner-Coach George Halas of the Bears expected the field to be good unless unexpected snow or rain raises the humidity prior to game time or falls after the game begins.

The field has been covered by a tarpaulin for more than a week and a half dozen blowers have forced hot air under the tarp to thaw the scattered frozen areas.

If the weather remains clear, Halas said, the field will be uncovered today for final drills by both teams; if not, they can work elsewhere and the tarpaulin will remain in place until game time.

National League Commissioner Pete Rozelle predicted the record gross gate of \$1.5 million which would provide for a player pool of about \$750,000, paying the players on the winning team about \$6,000 and those on the losing end about \$4,000, comparable to last year's payoff.

All 46,000 tickets for Wrigley Field, site of the game, were expected to be sold today, leaving closed circuit television at three local sites for those shut out at the Bears office.

The Giants, in the playoff game for the 14th time, were one point favorites to rack up their fourth league title. The Bears have won five titles.

## Coffey Is Out Of Bowl Game

LONG BEACH, Calif. (UPI) — Junior Coffey, University of Washington's star fullback, will not be ready to play in the Rose Bowl against Illinois New Year's Day, according to Coach Jim Owens.

Owens said Friday Coffey's progress since the cast was removed two days ago "would not indicate he will be able to play at all."

Coffey suffered a broken bone in his foot in a scrimmage last Saturday.

The Huskies ran through another scrimmage Friday in an attempt to "polish their play" before the game. Owens said he was anything but satisfied with the performance as a whole.

"We didn't have much punch. We should be a lot sharper this late," he said.

Owens, however, praised Bill Siler, his second-string quarterback who missed the last nine games of the season suffering from hepatitis.

"He (Siler) was able to move his team in the scrimmage, and he will probably be a big factor in the game for us," Owens said.

## Rodriguez Gets Unanimous Win

MIAMI BEACH (UPI) — Luis Rodriguez scored a unanimous come-from-behind decision Friday night over Wilbert McClure, then set his sights on a return match with Emile Griffith for the welterweight title.

Rodriguez, who speaks five languages and knows twice as many dance steps, said: "I want Griffith, and I'll fight him for the championship any place and any time."

Angelo Dundee, who manages the Cuban dance master and former welterweight champ, said, "let's make that time early next year."

McClure used his longer reach to hold the 151-pound Rodriguez at bay during most of the first five rounds, piling up points with looping jabs and short stabs from both sides.

## Jones Breaks Oregon Point Mark Friday

PORTLAND, Ore. (UPI) — Defending champion Oregon State meets Colorado State and Oregon plays Brigham Young in the semi-finals of the eighth annual Far West Basketball Classic tonight.

Oregon, with Steve Jones setting a school one game scoring record with 37 points, defeated Washington State 79-62 and Brigham Young topped Seattle 77-74 in first round games of the four-day, eight-team tournament Friday night.

Oregon State and Colorado State posted opening round victories Thursday night.

In consolation games today, Washington State met Seattle and Louisiana State faces Iowa. The finals of the tournament will be played Monday night.

Jones' performance came on the heels of a 48-point effort by 7-foot Mel Counts in Oregon State's first round win over Louisiana State.

Jones made 21 points in the first half and 16 in the second half to break Oregon's scoring mark of 36 points held by Charlie Warren and Charlie Franklin.

The 6-5 senior from Portland hit 16 of 31 field goal attempts and made 5 for 5 from the free throw line as the Ducks collected their first win in five starts this season.

Oregon, which led 30-24 at halftime, got 16 points from Jim Barnett and 13 from Jim Johnson.

Jon Stanley hit a field goal with 28 seconds remaining and Mike Gardner added two free throws with seven seconds left to give Brigham Young its victory over Seattle, previously unbeaten in six games.

The Cougars' five starters were in double figures. Bob Quinney led the way with 15 points. Dick Nemelka collected 14. Mike Gardner and John Fairchild each made 13 and Steve Kramer added 10.

The Chieftains, who led 40-39 at halftime, were paced by L. J. Wheeler, with 17 and Charlie Williams, with 16.

## Patriots Face Buffalo Bills

BUFFALO, N. Y. (UPI) — The Buffalo Bills and Boston Patriots, with a winter scene as the backdrop, tangle for the Eastern Division title today and a berth in the American Football League championship game Jan. 5 in balmy Southern California.

The Bills and Patriots move into stadium-drenched War Memorial Stadium for the first playoff game in the four-year history of the AFL — the climax to a madcap Eastern Division race that saw the Houston Oilers dethroned after a three-year reign.

Buffalo is a two and one-half point choice to beat Boston in the nationally televised game on ABC-TV at 1:05 p.m. EST and meet the Western Division champion Chargers eight days from now in San Diego.

The Bills and Boston each finished with a 7-6 record and split regular season games. Buffalo won, 28-21, here Oct. 26 and the Patriots rebounded, 17-7, four weeks later in Fenway Park.

## Toll Captures Archery Shoot

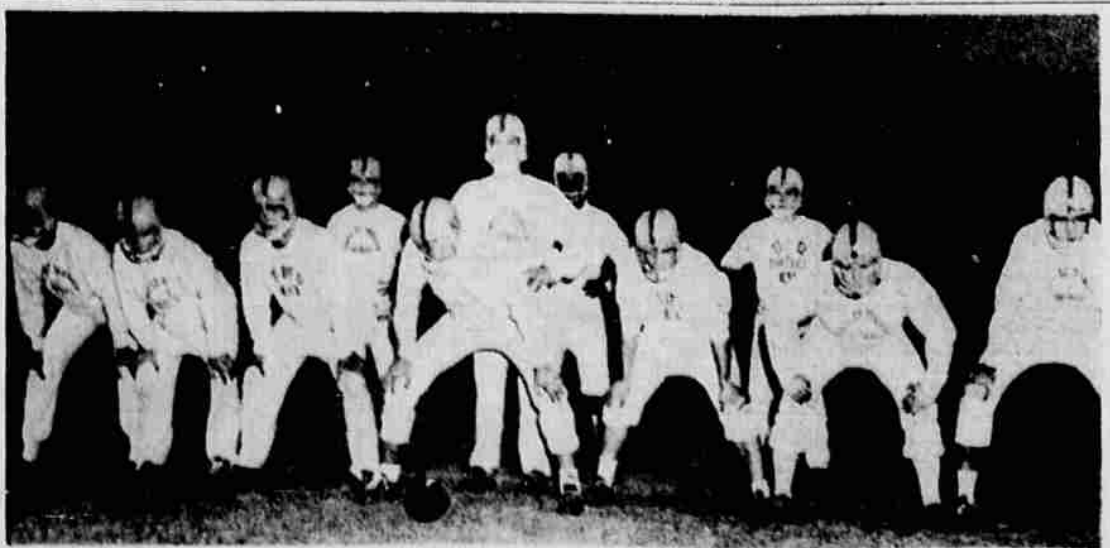
Russ Toll fired a 748 score in the weekly outing of the Roseburg Rod and Gun Club Archers to pace the men in the instinctive class.
