lois. Myrtle Creek wasted little time before moving well out in front of the host quintet, leading by seven points, 15-8, at the first break, and increasing this margin to 14 points, 28-15, by the halftime intermission.

The miserly defense of the Vikings limited the Pirates to a mere 12 points in the second half. Bob Beamblossom led the defensive players, giving up just one free throw while he was in the game. Jim Billings limited his assigned man to three points.

While the Viking defense was stopping the Pirate attack, the winners were busy sinking 26 of 63 field goal attempts for a .412 shooting percentage. Pacific hit a mere 10 of 40 shots for a .250. At the foul line Myrtle Creek converted six of 10 chances and the Pirates made seven of 13 tries.

Jerry Wilson's 11 rebounds led the Vikings to a 41-28 advantage on the boards.

Larry Pringle and Willson each collected 14 points to top the Vks in scoring. Pringle hit six field goals and was two for four at the charity stripe, while Willson made all his points from the field. Jim Billings added 10 points for the winners, while Mike David's nine was high for Pacific.

Following the weekend sweep at Pacific, the Vikings sport a 6-3 record in non-league outings.

## No. 1 Ranked Loyola Upset

By United Press International The busiest weekend of the college basketball season may be over, but the tournament whirl continues today with five major championships still to be decided.

In New York, Villanova meets Minnesota for the Holiday Festival title at Madison Square Garden; in Philadelphia, LaSalle meets St. Bonaventure for the Quaker City championship; Oklahoma State plays Kansas State in Kansas City for the Big Eight title; Brigham Young faces Oregon State in Portland for the Far West Classic title; and Denver meets Texas Western in El Paso for the Sun Bowl championship.

A number of tournament championships were decided Saturday in addition to some important regular season games involving the top ten.

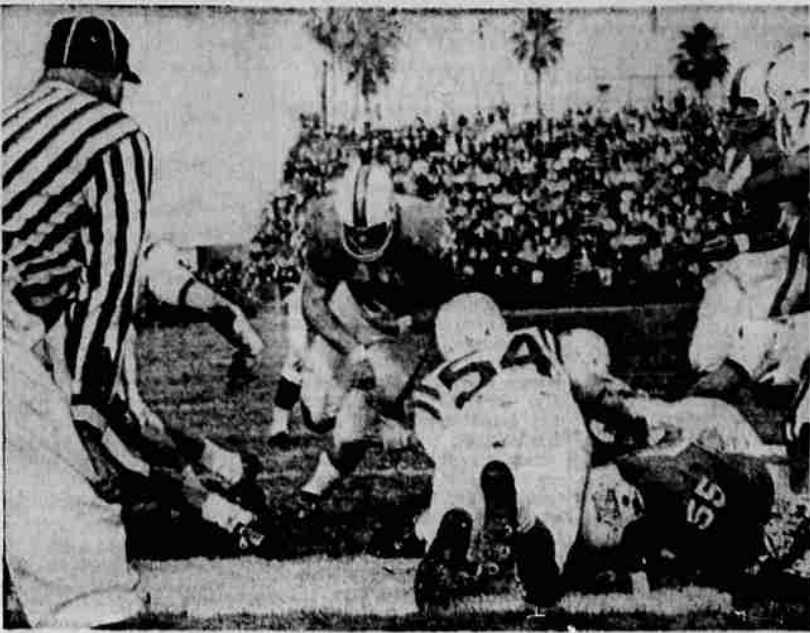
Kentucky, which hopes to land the No. 1 spot in the UPI coaches' ratings following Loyola's loss to Georgetown (D.C.) in the Quaker City Tournament, scored an impressive, 101-81, win over Notre Dame as Cotton Nash scored 33 points.

The Wildcats were third in last weeks ratings behind Michigan which lost to fifth-ranked UCLA in the semifinals of Los Angeles Classic.

UCLA won the L.A. title for the second straight year by defeating Illinois, 83-79. The Bruins did it with a 25-point spurt during a six-minute stretch in the first half.

Fourth-ranked Cincinnati, by passing Christmas tournament play this year, had a tough time with Tulsa in a Missouri Valley Conference game but finally won, 54-52.

Vanderbilt, rated sixth last week, won its own invitational tournament with a 106-78 win over South Carolina. Seventh-ranked Oregon State beat Colorado State 53-51 to enter the finals of the Far West Classic tonight.

## North Carolina Rips To Win Over Air Force In Gator Bowl

By United Press International The Navy had better inspect its ammunition before it cruises into the Cotton Bowl on New Year's Day because two of its fellow service academies—Air Force and Coast Guard—fired nothing but blanks in Saturday's bowl action.

The Middies, the nation's second-ranked college football team, figures to need all the live gunfire they can muster on Wednesday when they tangle with top-rated Texas, a defensive bear all season.

True Navy has Heisman Award winner Roger Staubach, the country's top marksman, at quarterback. But the Air Force had a very talented single caliber—triple-threat Terry Isaacson—at the helm and still was shut out by North Carolina, 35-0, in the Gator Bowl.

The Coast Guard suffered the

same fate in the Tangerine Bowl where the previously unbeaten Cadets were smothered by Western Kentucky, 27-0. The South tripped the North in the Blue-Gray game, 21-14, and the East tied the West, 6-6, in the San Francisco Shrine game in Saturday's other action.

**Polished Off Quickly**

The Falcons were demolished in short order. North Carolina quickly marched for 77 yards and a touchdown in the first period en route to a 20-0 halftime lead. Ken Willard, a bruising 220-pound halfback voted the most valuable player in the game for the Tar Heels, gained 50 yards on the first scoring drive on powerful bursts through Air Force's thin defense.

Carolina quarterbacks Junior Edge and Gary Black outshone Isaacson before a crowd of 50,018 in Jacksonville. Isaacson, the fifth player in the nation in total offense this season, was intercepted three times and the Tar Heels swiped two other passes from his substitutes.

Coast Guard, held to a total net rushing yardage of five yards, couldn't penetrate the Hilltoppers strong defense. Sharon Miller, Western Kentucky's junior quarterback, completed only two passes all night, but both went for touchdowns—20 yards to John Mutchler and 27 yards to Stan Nappler.

**Lost First Game**

Miller also ran for another score on a 14-yard reverse around left end. The crowd of 7,500 in Orlando saw Otto Graham's Cadets suffer their first defeat of the season after eight wins.

Larry Rakestraw of Georgia also passed for two scores in the Blue-Gray Classic in Montgomery, Ala., but he completed 14 of 22 for the day in a dazzling aerial display. A crowd of 20,000 saw Rakestraw hit Tennessee's Mallon Faircloth with TD tosses of 44 and 10 yards.

Michigan State's dazzling All-America halfback Sherman Lewis scooted 10 yards around end in the game's waning minutes to send the East into a 6-6 deadlock with the West in a bruising defensive battle at San Francisco. But Dave Parks of Texas Tech blocked Rick Lee's conversion attempt to salvage a tie for the Western forces.

The West had scored in the third period when Willie Brown of Southern Cal made a leaping grab of Don Trull's 25-yard trajectory in the end zone. Brown, who also played an outstanding game on defense, was voted the game's top player.

## OSU, BYU To Tangle In Classic Final Tonight

PORTLAND (UPI) — Oregon State's once-beaten Beavers and the fast-breaking Brigham Young Cougars collide in the finals of the eighth annual Far West basketball classic tonight.

The Beavers, led by 7-foot senior center Mel Counts, will be seeking their eighth straight classic championship in the final game at 9:15 p.m.

Oregon State edged Colorado State 53-51 and Brigham Young defeated Oregon 80-70 before a record classic crowd of 12,309 in the semifinals Saturday night.

### Liston Holds Training Sessions In Las Vegas

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI)—Las Vegas doesn't have the Sonny Liston-Cassius Clay title fight, but it has the longer-running and profitable Liston training show.

The heavyweight boxing champion of the world arrived at this gambling and entertainment city during the weekend and immediately began the same type of drill that drew hundreds of spectators prior to his successful title defense here last summer against Floyd Patterson.

The often-gruff Liston was in a jovial mood Sunday in the showroom of the Thunderbird Hotel and carried on conversations with members of the audience.

When one person asked Liston if it was true he ran only six miles a day during his training, Liston replied: "I am only trying to catch Clay, not set any track records."

Las Vegas nearly completed negotiations for the Liston-Clay fight here, but Miami Beach, Fla., won out finally. Liston indicated previously he would spend at least three weeks here before setting up camp in Florida for the Feb. 25 bout.

Colorado State meets Oregon at 7 p.m. for third place. Seattle played Louisiana State for fifth place at 4 p.m. and Iowa took on Washington State for seventh spot at 1:45 p.m.

High-ranking Oregon State, which has a 9-1 record for the season, figures as a solid favorite against Brigham Young, which owns a 5-3 mark. However, the Beavers, who now have 20 straight classic wins, must stop the Cougars' withering fast break.

**Looks For Break**

"We always look for the break," Brigham Young Coach Stan Watts said. "They'll try and slow us down and we'll try and make them run."

"We don't throw fast balls to fast ball hitters," Oregon State Coach Stals Gill said.

The Cougars also have a defensive problem — stopping Counts.

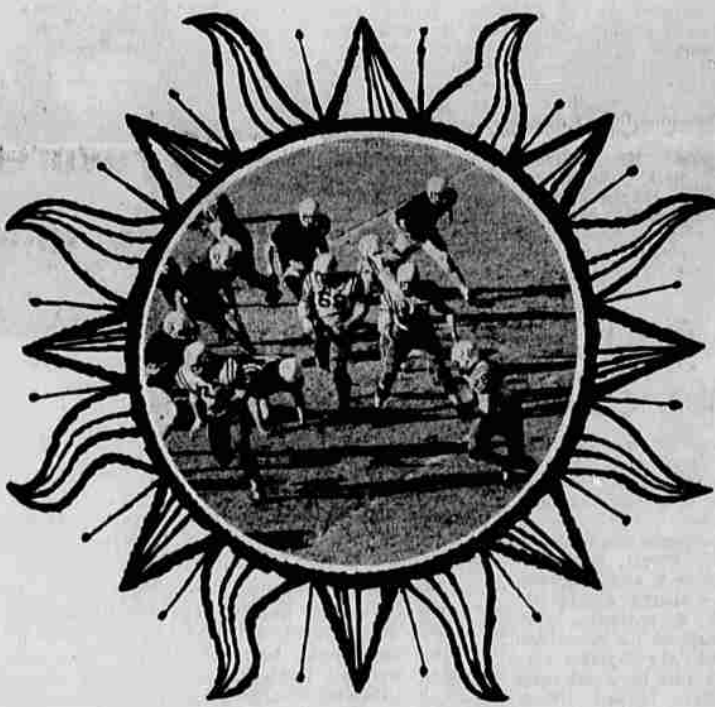
