

# Khrushchev Message Seen As Good Omen

MOSCOW (UPI) — Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev's New Year's message to the United States was viewed by Western diplomats today as a good omen for 1964 because of its concrete proposals and lack of boasts or threats.

They said Khrushchev not only issued one of the friendliest messages in years but indicated the Soviets might accept at least one part of Western disarmament plans.

This is a step-by-step approach to disarmament, with adequate controls as each step is achieved. In the past, the Khrushchev line has been to press for sweeping general disarmament at once, with the control systems to come later.

Khrushchev, whose New Year's statement was issued Monday in response to questions put to him by this correspondent, said the new year could bring "decisive change for the better in the entire international situation." He listed a broad range of issues on which East-

West agreement might be possible.

**Range of Issues**

They included:

- Measures aimed at slowing down the arms race and at further alleviating international tension.
- Reductions in armed forces and military spending by both sides.
- A non-aggression agreement between the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) nations and the Warsaw Pact members.
- Agreement not to spread nuclear weapons to countries which do not have their own.
- Establishment of nuclear-free zones.

The lowest priority was given to a Berlin settlement, although Khrushchev warned that "it would be unwise and I would say dangerous to put this matter off for future years."

**Feature Statement**

Soviet newspapers spread Khrushchev's statement over front pages Monday and today and Moscow Radio broadcasts featured it.

(The Western press also welcomed Khrushchev's statement. "Moderate and hopeful," London's Daily Mail said. The Guardian of Manchester said the West will agree with many of Khrushchev's plans, and said "the vital one is to keep nuclear weapons in the hands only of those now possessing them, and if possible, in fewer hands still."

(The London Daily Sketch said, however, that Khrushchev's "noble sentiments . . . must be set against his actions . . . twice since Cuba Nikita Khrushchev has also brought the world closer to war . . . by blockades of roads to Berlin." (The Times of London speculated that "domestic reasons also lead him to seek an easing of the tensions.")

## WCA To Present Shuttle Proposal

West Coast Airlines is apparently interested in providing a "third level" air carrier service at Roseburg.

City officials said today WCA wants to present a proposal to the Roseburg Airport Commission when it meets at noon Friday in the city manager's office. WCA vice presidents Ed Altman and Nicholas Bez Jr., both of Seattle, will attend the meeting.

Airport Commission Chairman Orval Petersen said the proposal apparently involves providing "third level" air passenger service from Roseburg to nearby service points to connect with other West Coast scheduled flights.

This is the second overture the city has received on air shuttle service. Earlier this month American Air-Lease, a Portland firm, approached the city on the shuttle service possibility.

The Airport Commission, in another agenda matter, will view plans by the U. S. Weather Bureau to install remote wind reading and temperature equipment, and a fixed-beam ceilometer.

The commission will also consider adoption of revisions to an "airport site development plan."

**BREAST SIZE AFTER CHILDBIRTH**

Q. After my first child was born my breasts decreased in size and firmness. Is there any way to restore them to normal?

A. A reduction in breast size and firmness is not uncommon following childbirth. Why this occurs isn't known and there is no effective treatment. Although the breasts can not be appreciably altered, certain exercises do help. For example, the chest muscles can be developed by performing push-ups, thus adding bulk to the chest. This, plus an adequate bra, is responsible for the "bosomy" appearance of some women athletes, such as circus performers, who actually may have very small breasts.

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## Paper Says Hoffa Tried For 'Deal'

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (UPI) — The St. Louis Post-Dispatch said Monday that Teamster President James Hoffa attempted to make a deal with the federal government to dismiss charges against him in exchange for his resignation from the presidency of the union.

The government sources were reported to have declined the offer and told Hoffa, through the intermediaries who proposed the deal, that the only way Hoffa could escape trial in Nashville and Chicago was to plead guilty.

The Post-Dispatch, in a Washington story, said, "Hoffa initiated the feelers last summer through intermediaries, one of whom was his chief lieutenant, Harold J. Gibbons, of St. Louis, a Teamsters international vice president."

The newspaper said, "Gibbons denied categorically that he had ever spoken to government officials or anyone else concerning any alleged deal to quash prosecution of Hoffa."

Hoffa is accused of jury tampering in Tennessee along with six other men. In Chicago, Hoffa has been charged with conspiracy involving union funds.

## Myron Iverson

Myron Severt Iverson, 26, of Roseburg, died at a Roseburg hospital early Tuesday morning following a lingering illness.

He was seriously injured in an automobile accident near Sutherland on July 18, 1961, and never regained consciousness.

He was born Sept. 4, 1937, at Coquille. He had lived in the Roseburg area since 1940, coming here from Myrtle Point. He attended the Roseburg schools, one year at Oregon State University and one year at Oregon Technical Institute.

Surviving are two daughters, Barbara Kay, and Nancy; a son, Mitchell, all of Roseburg; his mother, Mrs. Thelma Iverson; a brother, Roger; and his maternal grandmother, Mrs. Doris Schroeder.

Funeral services will be held at 11 a.m. Thursday at the Long & Shukle Memorial Chapel, with the Rev. John Adams of the First Presbyterian Church officiating. Interment will follow at the Roseburg Memorial Gardens.

SARASOTA, Fla. (UPI) — Mario Wallenda, who survived a fall in Detroit last year which killed two of the famous "Flying Wallendas" aerial team, was married Monday to a girl who helped nurse him back to health.

Wallenda, 24, who is partially paralyzed and in a wheelchair, was wed to Detroit nurse Linda Croninger, 23, who met him in a Detroit hospital after the accident.

The simple civil ceremony was held in the Wallenda home and was attended by circus celebrities including three other members of the ill-fated seven who plunged to the ground when their "human pyramid" collapsed on the high wire.

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# Greek, Turkish Cypriots Start Release Of Refugees, Hostage

NICOSIA, Cyprus (UPI) — Greek and Turkish Cypriots today began releasing refugees and hostages held by both sides in a step toward restoring peace to this bitterly-divided island republic.

The exchange began shortly after a new gun battle marred the uneasy cease-fire.

A British military spokesman said the shots were fired in the Omorphita area of Nicosia when Greek Cypriot police ran into three Turkish Cypriots trying to return to the quarter. No injuries were reported. Two Turks were taken to police headquarters and the third disappeared.

**Sandys Visits Hostages**

British Commonwealth and Colonial Relations Secretary Duncan Sandys personally visited the 470 Turkish Cypriots at the Greek Kykko School just before they were let go.

The agreement to exchange the prisoners was signed Monday.

Cyprus has been torn by violence between the two communities for more than a week. About 200 persons are believed to have been killed and many wounded.

British troops moved into the neutral zones between Turkish and Greek communities in an effort to end the bloodshed.

**Statements in Conflict**

Even as the British worked to secure the neutral zone, conflicting statements by leaders of the island nation indicated continued trouble.

British Commonwealth Relations Secretary Duncan Sandys called a meeting today of a political liaison committee—representing Greek and Turkish Cypriots—to discuss additional proposals for restoring peace following a week of fighting that

Foreign Minister Spyros Kyprianou, a Greek Cypriot, raised the question of Cyprus' status Monday by calling for an end to the island's treaty ties to Turkey and Greece. He also suggested a government by the Greek Cypriot majority instead of the present Greek-Turkish mixed administration.

**Claims Constitution "Dead"**

His statement followed a comment by Vice President Fazil Kuchuk, leader of the Turkish Cypriot community, that the constitution that created an independent Cyprus in 1960 is dead and that partition of the troubled Mediterranean island may be the only solution.

Greek Orthodox Archbishop Makarios, president of Cyprus, charged in a year-end speech Monday that Turkish Cypriots may have started the armed clashes with their Greek neighbors to win support for partition.

Observers said his statement could easily aggravate the intercommunal differences, despite his plea in the same speech for "Greeks and Turks alike to build bridges to meet one another."

## Jacksonville Fire Takes New Victim

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (UPI) — An Atlanta woman died today, raising to 22 the toll in the Roosevelt Hotel fire.

Mrs. Josephine Dupre, 35, whose husband died in the blaze Sunday, was pronounced dead at St. Luke's Hospital at 4:45 a.m. EST. She had been in critical condition since being rescued from the smoking building.

Mrs. Dupre was the ninth Georgian to die as a result of the fire, which injured 59 other persons.

Authorities believe they know the cause of the fire, but continued checking the building today to make their finding definite.

## Assassin's Note To Wife Revealed

HOUSTON (UPI) — Lee Harvey Oswald, accused assassin of President Kennedy, left his wife a note of instructions the night before a sniper fired a rifle into the Dallas home of former Maj. Gen. Edwin A. Walker, the Houston Chronicle said Monday in a copyright story.

The Chronicle said the note, which told the Russian-born woman what to do if he were arrested, was in the hands of a special commission investigating the assassination.

The newspaper said the commission had learned that Oswald told his wife he was the sniper who narrowly missed Walker. It was reported earlier that Marina Oswald told the FBI about the incident. The federal government never commented on the report.

## Jury Finds Carr Guilty Of Charge

Wilfred Leslie Carr of Roseburg Monday was found guilty of assault and battery on jury trial before Judge William C. Beckett of Eugene, acting for Gerald R. Hayes in District Court.

Carr, accused in a private complaint with striking Virgil Munion in the face with his fists on Oct. 5, was assessed \$50 court costs and sentenced to serve five days in the county jail. The jail term, however, was suspended for 60 days on provision he comply with the law.

Carr had pleaded innocent before Judge Hayes and has asked for another judge to try his case. Beckett was assigned.
