

Russians Have Failed To Answer Suggestion For East-West Talks

LONDON (UPI)—Russia has failed to answer a month-old British suggestion for bilateral East-West talks on the foreign ministers' level, authoritative sources said today.

Early last month, in a message to Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko, Foreign Secretary R. A. Butler suggested they meet in Geneva when the 17 nation disarmament conference resumes Jan. 21.

But the sources said that so far there has not been even an indirect response from the Kremlin.

Seconds Delay Duel Between Two Brazilians

BUENOS AIRES (UPI)—A duel between Defense Minister Leopoldo Suarez and former Air Secretary Martin R. Cairo appeared early today to have been postponed for at least 24 hours.

Seconds for the two men met four times Wednesday night and early today, apparently without reaching agreement on arrangements for what had been expected to be a meeting with pistols at dawn today.

Attorney Luis Caggiano, a Suarez second, said the talks are "in the first stage."

"The discussions are continuing," said retired Col. Manuel Reimundes, a Cairo second. "We have not suspended them."

Although no further details were available immediately, it appeared the seconds were trying to determine whether there were sufficient grounds for a duel and whether it was proper for Cairo to challenge Suarez, his nominal superior in the cabinet.

If the duel takes place, Suarez presumably would resign temporarily before appearing on the "field of honor."

Cairo, a 61-year-old retired air commodore, asked permission to fight Suarez in the letter announcing his resignation from the cabinet.

President Arturo Illia accepted the resignation, but assailed the terms of the letter as "hasty and improper" in a statement issued Wednesday.

The former air secretary, despite the president's criticism sent Reimundes and Rear Adm. Raul Lynch to call out Suarez. The defense minister, a 49-year-old provincial attorney, designated Caggiano and engineer Fermin Garay to represent him.

Cairo's letter charged that Suarez failed to consult him in preparing a list of officers for promotion to brigadier, the highest rank in the Argentine air force. He also accused the defense minister of delaying a hearing of bad-check charges against Cairo despite repeated requests.

The dispute over the promotions apparently stemmed from Cairo's reported desire to reinstate a number of high-ranking air force officers who were retired for participating in the abortive revolts of September, 1962, and April, 1963.

Dueling is illegal in Argentina, with penalties ranging up to six months in jail, but the law is not rigorously enforced. Participants usually say they met in nearby Uruguay, where dueling is permitted, regardless of where the encounter actually took place.

new initiatives toward easing East-West tensions.

Douglas-Home made an announcement to that effect in Parliament which subsequently was retracted by his spokesman. But since then the prime minister has reaffirmed that Butler will go to Geneva sometime.

The British retraction followed notification from Washington that U.S. Secretary of State Dean Rusk had no plans to go to Geneva for a meeting of foreign ministers. Rusk confirmed this in Paris last month.

But American officials have let it be known that Washington has no objections to a possible meeting between Gromyko and Butler so long as he would merely probe Communist intentions and not commit the West as a spokesman for the Allies.

Moscow has given strong indications in the past that its attentions are focused primarily on the United States as the key factor in any meaningful East-West policy developments.

Approaches Prime Minister

But immediately after the assassination of former President John F. Kennedy, Soviet First Deputy Premier Anastas Mikoyan approached Douglas-Home with the suggestion that Britain take the initiative for resumption of East-West contacts. This happened, according to authoritative sources, when Douglas-Home and Mikoyan were in Washington for the funeral of the late President.

Since then President Johnson has reaffirmed his intention to continue Kennedy's "strategy for peace." It is thought Moscow may have interpreted this as a re-opening of direct Soviet-American contacts.

Butler sent his message to Douglas-Home through Aleksandr Solodov, Russia's ambassador to London, when Solodov flew to Moscow to attend a meeting of the central committee of the Soviet communist party last month.

Solodov has been back in London for some time. But the sources said he has delivered neither a written nor an oral reply.

Gromyko has let it be known he is on vacation. Butler has put off an early trip to Geneva for the time being and now is not expected to go before late February.

By then Douglas-Home and Butler will have visited Washington for talks with Johnson.

Boy Fractures Arm During Football Play

A Fremont Junior High eighth grader, Timothy Wayne Thomas, 13, started out the new year with a cast on one arm as the result of an accident during a "cow pasture" football game with friends in the late afternoon on Dec. 31.

According to a report received this morning, young Thomas suffered fractures of both forearm bones near the right wrist in a pileup after a tackle while playing in a field across from his home. The accident occurred around 4:30 p.m.

Thomas was treated at Douglas Community Hospital and released to go home later in the evening. His "vacation" was to continue until Monday of next week when he expects to return to school.

Active Portland Scout To Report To Johnson

Mike, with scouts from other regions, will visit Philadelphia, Valley Forge and New York, from Feb. 5 to 13. The annual report is Feb. 8.

Timely Somersault Saves Local Youth From Injury

While Lynden Kruse, 16, was on his way by motorcycle from his home on Buckhorn Road to the Dr. Benton home for a New Year's Eve party, he encountered a four-point buck coming up over the river bank about a mile from his destination near the John Livingston place.

The buck seemed to be vying for the right-of-way, and the rider had to determine whether to pull toward the river bank or toward the ditch, either of which might have caused serious if not fatal injuries.

This was where young Kruse was grateful for his tumbling and trampoline instruction at Milo Academy, where he is a sophomore. He decided to keep his course. At the time of the impact, Kruse gave a head-long

leap over the buck, brushing one horn on the way. He landed on the pavement in a summersaulting move which carried him out of danger.

When he stopped rolling he saw the buck lying near by on the pavement, kicking viciously and trying to regain equilibrium. After some time the buck meandered up the hill. On fifth attempt the animal finally negotiated the fence and made off, bruised and a bit wiser.

The young man ended up with torn trousers and a badly bruised knee, but there was only slight damage to the motorcycle. Kruse maintains he came out on the better end of the deal. He was administered first aid by Mrs. Benton.

Police Bullet Fatal To Ex-Football Star

CHICAGO (UPI)—A grand jury and the National Football League today announced investigations into the fatal shooting of an ex-football star in a bowling lane frequented by members of the world champion Chicago Bears.

Police, meanwhile, searched for the disgruntled New York Giant fan whose needling of Bear players at a New Year's Eve celebration resulted in the shooting of former Bear Tony Parrilli, 24.

Parrilli, a one-time University of Illinois grid star, died instantly from a shot fired accidentally by the gun of Police Chief Robert Winthers of suburban Willowbrook. The gun went off as Winthers used its butt to club Joe Marconi, fullback of the Bears.

Police said both the police chief and Marconi were trying to break up the quarrel between Parrilli and the Giant fan. The shooting occurred in the men's room of the plush Willowbrook Lanes, which is partially owned by Bear end Mike Ditka.

State's Atty. William J. Bauer of Du Page County said a special grand jury would begin investigating the shooting immediately. Bauer met a 11 morning with top police officials mapping the investigation.

The National Football League investigation was announced by league Commissioner Pete Rozelle in Miami. He said the league will look into the shooting "as a matter of routine as in the case in anything affecting the league."

Coroner Samuel K. Lewis revealed that a group of Bears fans crowded into the Hinsdale, Ill., sanitarium, where Parrilli's body was taken after it took 15 policemen two hours to clear the crowd of 30 persons from the hallways so that Parrilli's body could be taken out of the emergency room.

Some persons in the crowd, which included relatives of Parrilli, threatened to "get" Winthers, Lewis said.

Capt. Herbert Mertes of the Du Page County police said the fatal quarrel hinged on the Bears' 14-10 victory over the New York Giants which brought them the NFL championship Sunday.

"As I understand it the man was a fan of the Giants and they were arguing about the game," he said.

It was reported that police were searching for a tall, heavy set man who was seen at another tavern in the area after the brawl. The man had a swollen lip, as if he had been punched, it was reported.

Marconi was knocked unconscious by Winther's blow and was dragged unconscious from the washroom. He needed eight stitches to close his head wound, but was not hospitalized.

Deputy Coroner James Clark indicated an inquest would have been held this week—but he delayed it after learning some of the Bears players who will be called to testify planned to leave Chicago Wednesday for the pro bowl game in Los Angeles Jan. 2.

Roseburg Residence Is Damaged By Fire

The Roseburg Fire Department answered three calls Tuesday, with the most serious being a house fire at 2961 NE Yount Ave.

Two trucks were dispatched at 7:37 p.m. to the frame house. Damage was estimated at \$500.

Earlier in the day the firemen had extinguished a car fire at 669 West Corey St. Damage was estimated at \$50. A rescuer's call at 12:27 p.m. Tuesday at 308 SE Lane St., was answered by the firemen. When the fire department arrived the party had already been taken to a local hospital.

New Year's Road Accident Puts 11 Persons In Hospital

GRESHAM (UPI)—Eleven persons remained hospitalized today following a three-car New Year's day accident on Highway 26 about nine miles east of Sandy.

Sheriff's deputies said the accident involved two cars of a Salem Assembly of God Church group returning from Mt. Hood and a Portland car en route to the mountain.

Several other persons were treated for injuries and released from the hospital.

Dawn Shaw, 21, and Linda

Pfau, 16, both of Salem, who had been on the critical list, were reported in "fair" condition at Gresham General Hospital today. Both suffered head injuries.

Reverly May Smith, 19, Hubbard, who also had been listed as critical, was taken to Emanuel Hospital in Portland where she was reported in "satisfactory" condition after surgery early today. She suffered head and back injuries.

Also in the hospital here were Charles Dougherty, 18, Salem, fractured leg and chest injuries.

Geneva Holderby, 16, Salem, fractured nose and head injury.

Daniel Schimelpfenig, 18, Salem, head and face cuts.

Daniel Weber, 12, Salem, possible concussion.

Irvin Kramcr, 36, Portland, facial and chest injuries.

Lloyd Lewis Smith, 40, of Myrtle Creek, Tuesday was sentenced to serve three years in the Oregon State Penitentiary, with imposition of sentence to be suspended after he has served 10 days in the Douglas County jail.

Smith in November pleaded guilty to negligent homicide, charged in a Grand Jury indictment, in connection with the traffic death of Theodore Sidney Easton last Aug. 16. Sentence was imposed by Judge Charles S. Woodrich following a pro-sentence investigation.

Smith, after serving 10 days in jail, will be placed on probation for a period of five years, subject to provisions of the state Board of Probation and Parole.

The accident in which Easton met his death took place on Interstate Highway 5 near Myrtle Creek. Smith was accused of operating his car while in a state of intoxication. His car allegedly had crossed over the center divider line of the highway, colliding with the car of Easton and resulting in the latter's death.

Smith originally entered a plea of innocence and trial had been set. But he changed his plea to guilty prior to the trial date.

In the district court of Gerald R. Hayes Tuesday, Richard Clarence Snuffer, 23, charged with assault and battery by force and means likely to produce great bodily harm, asked for a preliminary hearing, which was set for 4 p.m. today. He is accused of assaulting Ed Musser.

Hulett Becomes Oregon Marshal

PORTLAND (UPI)—Eugene C. Hulett, 41-year-old former state representative, was sworn in today as the 30th U.S. Marshal for the district of Oregon.

Chief Federal District Court Judge Gus Solomon performed the brief ceremony in Hulett's office.

Hulett succeeds the late Paul Kearney.

The new marshal submitted his resignation as a Democratic member of the Oregon Legislature representing Lane and Benton Counties, at 9 a.m. today, prior to taking office.

He is a former member of the State Police and the Eugene Police Department and has been employed by a grocery store operator in Eugene.

Hulett was appointed to the four-year term as marshal by the late President Kennedy last Nov. 14. He was commissioned Dec. 20, following confirmation of the appointment by the U.S. Senate.
