

Budget Restoration Funds In The Mill

SALEM (UPI)—State department have been advised to submit priority restoration requests for presentation to an Emergency Board meeting Jan. 24, the Finance and Administration Department revealed.

When the 100,000-acre Boardman project was turned over to the Veterans' department by the special session of the legislature, \$900,000 that had been spent by the state to develop the project was refunded to the general fund from surplus veterans' funds.

Gov. Mark Hatfield will review agency restoration requests, and submit recommendations to the Emergency Board.

The Emergency Board, made up of legislators, must give its approval before any of the \$900,000 can be used to restore austerly cuts resulting from the Oct. 15 tax referendum.

Finance and Administration Director Freeman Holmer advised a "special consideration will be given to those items where the smallest allocation will accomplish the greatest gain in the preservation of essential public services."

Agency heads were ordered to submit their restoration requests by Jan. 8.

Holmer said "it is planned to present the entire list of requests to the Emergency Board for their consideration together with the governor's recommendations as to which requests should receive allocations at this time."

Lengthy Session Still Too Short For 5 Appointees

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Senate session—longest in 22 years—was too short for five disappointed men.

Their nominations for federal office, including four judgeships, were still buried in the labyrinth of Senate process when Congress finally adjourned Monday.

Among the disappointed was A. Leon Higginbotham, Jr., named to be U.S. judge for the eastern district of Pennsylvania.

Higginbotham was nominated by President Kennedy Sept. 25. He was given a hearing by the Senate Judiciary Committee Dec. 19, but there his nomination remained.

Still, Higginbotham's disappointment was tempered by his seat on the Federal Trade Commission which he declined to relinquish until he could assume the judgeship.

The Higginbotham delay led directly to a similar impasse for John R. Reilly of Iowa who was named by Kennedy to succeed Higginbotham on the Federal Trade Commission.

The Senate Commerce Committee could not approve Reilly for the FTC post until Higginbotham vacated the office.

Three other judicial nominees also were left stranded.

They were John Morgan Davis, also named by Kennedy to the eastern district bench in Pennsylvania; David Robinson, chosen for the western district of Wisconsin, and Spottwood W. Robinson III of Richmond, Va., who was nominated for a judgeship in the District of Columbia.

The fate of the five men is now in the hands of President Johnson.

He could give them recess appointments under which they could take office immediately, and then send their nominations to the Senate again after Jan. 7.

Or, the President could forego the recess appointments—leaving the five in suspended animation—and just send their nominations again in the new session of Congress.

Or, he could forget all about them.

Let Baby Sitter Know About Fire

Baby sitters who know what to do in case of fire or other emergencies can make your Christmas a merrier one.

The possibility of a Christmas tree fire always adds to the responsibilities of a baby sitter and should be of special concern at this time of year.

When she comes into your home, at any time of year, you can give her a hand by providing her with phone numbers she might have to use quickly.

Place a card beside the phone with the phone numbers of (1) the fire department, (2) the police department, (3) the family doctor, (4) the number of the phone where the parents may be reached, and (5) the phone number of a nearby neighbor.

The National Board of Fire Underwriters gives these other suggestions:

1. Employ a sitter you know. Be sure she knows her job is responsible, and likes children.
2. Employ a sitter your children will enjoy being with, and let her get acquainted with them before you leave. If you have pets, let her get acquainted with them, too.
3. Make sure the sitter clearly understands that in case of fire, she should get the children out of the house quickly.
4. Show the sitter two alternate routes of escape from the house so that if one is blocked by fire, she and the children can use the other one.
5. Supply the sitter with flashlights to use in case of power failure.
6. When you leave, tell the sitter when you are planning to return home. Telephone her if you are delayed.
7. Always make arrangements for seeing the sitter home.
