Historic Holy Land Pilgrimage Ends

E. Berlin Seals Wall As Yule Pass Pact Ends

BERLIN (UPI) — East and West again today and the tearful sound of "auf wiedersehen" echoed along the wall.

The Christmas agreement ended at midnight, and shortly before 3 a.m. Communist guards cleared the last stragglers returning to West Berlin and resealed the barrier which divides the city.

Officials estimated that a record 300,000 West Berliners swarmed through the wall openings Sunday for last-day family reunions, raising to 1.2 million the number of visits made to East Berlin during the 17 days covered by the agreement. Nearly half a million made it on the final weekend.

The holiday crossings to see relatives and friends were the first permitted by the Communists since they erected the anti-refugee wall in August, 1961. Whether they will allow any more in the future appeared to hinge on what political conditions they demand.

Recalls Parting

Caught at Deadline

Thousands of West Berliners clung to the pass privilege as long as possible, and were caught at deadline lined up on foot and in cars on the Eastern side of the gates, waiting for clearance. Many had tears streaming down their faces. Even some husky men were crying.

Beyond the lines of returning visitors stood a ring of lip-biting, hand-wringing East Berlin relatives. Some kept yelling "auf wiedersehen" — till we meet again — through their tears. Others waved vigorously.

Nicosia, Cyprus (UPI) — The crisis in Cyprus grew tense again today with accusations by the island's Turkish leader that Greek Cypriots plan a "general massacre on a larger scale than before."

No new fighting was reported. But a British spokesman for the joint British-Greek-Turkish force on Cyprus said a Turkish school in the town of Larnaca was gutted by fire Sunday.

"Despite the cease-fire agreement, Turkish life and property are still in great and imminent danger in Cyprus," Vice President Fazil Kuehuk, leader of the Turkish community, said in an appeal Sunday to all "peace-loving nations."

Turkish Cypriots are outnumbered by Greek Cypriots by about four to one. Fighting between the two communities has taken an estimated 200 lives in the past two weeks.

The fighting broke out shortly after Archbishop Makarios, the island's Greek president, announced plans to modify the constitution. Turkish Cypriots fear such a move could curtail their rights as a minority group.

The independence of Cyprus is guaranteed by Britain, Turkey and Greece under a 1960 agreement making Cyprus a sovereign republic. British troops airlifted to the island have created a buffer zone to stop the fighting. Later this month a conference is expected to be held in London in an effort to solve the dispute peacefully.

Court Sets Public Meet On Museum

The Douglas County Court has scheduled a meeting Wednesday at 10:30 a.m. to hear testimony on county Historical Society petition for establishment of a county museum.

A petition containing 15 names has been filed with the court requesting the establishment of the seven-person board. It indicates consideration should be given to establishment of a public museum under a state law which allows it with use of county funds.

It says that other counties have taken such steps to establish historical museums.

Mrs. J. V. Micelli, president of the historical society, said today the society has been increasingly concerned over the lack of a public museum to house items from all historical periods of the county.

She said the Lane House on SE Douglas Avenue is a fine landmark as a restored house of a given period in the county's history, but it does not serve the purpose as a general historical museum.

She said that the house should be retained as a relic of the period from the mid-19th century to late in the century. At the same time, she said, it is far too small to contain all the articles which will be received. For example, she noted that at least one stagecoach has been offered. Other big items have been stored because no housing was available for them.

She said if a new museum is built, many of the items in the Lane house would be transferred to it.

The meeting before the court will be open to the public.

Arsonist Hits Astor Ballroom

NEW YORK (UPI) — An arsonist set fire to the Grand Ballroom of the Hotel Astor in the heart of Times Square early today. The fire was controlled quickly without injury.

The blaze, which caused damage estimated at \$1 million by hotel officials, was "definitely set," said fire commissioner Edward Thompson.

Moments after the fire erupted just after midnight, a hotel employee chased a young man with a crenelated trenchcoat from the ballroom into the street but he escaped. Police later questioned a man fitting that description but he was released before dawn.

Pope-Patriarch Meetings Open Road To Unity

JERUSALEM (UPI) — Pope Paul VI made history and further progress toward Christian unity in meetings Sunday night and today with Athenagoras I, patriarch of the Eastern Orthodox Church.

Although neither side attempted to minimize the difficulties of reunion after 910 years of division, both stressed the things that the two churches have in common.

Pope Paul said it is fitting "that, as pilgrims from Rome and from Constantinople, we should be able to meet and be united in a common prayer."

Old Animosity Don't Die Away

NEW YORK (UPI) — Old animosity don't seem to fade away.

A reporter asked President Harry S. Truman on his morning walk today if it was true he had buried the hatchet with former President Dwight D. Eisenhower. Truman observed that he and Eisenhower had "never had any differences" between them.

The reporter asked if he was ready to make peace with Gen. Douglas MacArthur, whom Truman recalled as U.N. commander in Korea in 1951. Truman shook his head emphatically to indicate "no."

He was then asked if he would support the recent suggestion that Gen. MacArthur be raised from a five-star general to the unique position of six-star general.

"I'd recommend that he be cut down to four stars if I had anything to say about it," Truman snapped.

Pope Paul Trods Paths Of Christ

ROME (UPI) — A weary Pope Paul VI returned triumphantly to the Eternal City today from an unprecedented pilgrimage of prayer to the Holy Land where he appealed for Christian unity and issued pleas to 224 world leaders to devote themselves to the cause of peace.

The 66-year-old pontiff was greeted by a 21-gun salute, the pealing of hundreds of church bells and the cheers of waiting thousands when his chartered Alitalia DC8 jet airliner landed at Ciampino, Rome's military airport, after a flight from Amman, Jordan.

A majestic torchlight reception awaited the Pope on his drive through the streets of ancient Rome to Vatican City where thousands more were on hand to greet "Il Papa."

In an airport arrival address, the Pope said:

"We return with a heart full of intense emotions, carrying forever engraved in our memory the radiant and moving images of the holy places, which speak with bare eloquence of the life of Jesus Christ, of His suffering, of His love."

The pontiff said he had knelt at the grotto where Christ was born, visited Nazareth where He grew to manhood, prayed at the traditional site of the Last Supper, the Garden of Gethsemane, at Cavalry where Christ was crucified and on the bare rock of the sepulcher where Jesus was buried.

Visibly tired after three stress-filled days during which he was besieged by cheering throngs of Moslems, Christians and Jews, the pontiff climaxed his trip today with a second historical summit meeting with Patriarch Athenagoras of the Eastern Orthodox Church.

The hearded 77-year-old Athenagoras I of Constantinople and Pope Paul, 66-year-old head of the world's more than half-billion Roman Catholics embraced each other warmly and exchanged firm pledges to seek to heal the schism that has split their churches for more than nine centuries.

The meeting between the Pope and the patriarch was the first such encounter between the Eastern and Western church leaders in 500 years.

Pope Paul, the first pontiff in nearly 2,000 years of Christianity to visit the land where Christ lived, preached and died on the cross, was seen off from Amman airport by Jordan's King Hussein after throngs of Jordanians gave the pontiff a surging roaring goodbye as he drove to the airport at Amman.

The pontiff, in a farewell message, urged an end to "bitterness" and "wrath," and what appeared to be an appeal for peace between the Israelis and the Arabs.

Investigators said cuts on Bartholomae's hands indicated he had struggled with his assailant.

Bartholomae's former wife, Sara, won a \$5.5 million divorce settlement last February, after a two-year legal battle. He had not remarried.

"Divergencies of a doctrinal, liturgical, and disciplinary nature will have to be examined at the proper time and place in a spirit of fidelity to truth and of understanding in charity," he added.

"The meeting opens the door wide to numerous further meetings," Athenagoras said. Informal sources reported the Orthodox Church would decide at its March meeting whether to send a delegation to the Ecumenical Council, the Vatican's Christian unity conference, when it resumes next fall.

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The king in return pledged to preserve the holy places forever and called the pontiff "the greatest pilgrim of them all."

Even after the pontiff's plane started rolling down the runway at Amman Airport, the youthful King Hussein raced alongside in his cream-colored Rolls Royce in a final salute.

The pontiff sent statements of gratitude to Hussein and to President Zalman Shazar of Israel, whose countries are still in a state of war.

Jordan Radio quoted the Pope as saying:

"From the holy city of Jerusalem I take the opportunity of my visit here to ask you to do all in your power that peace should prevail in the world."

A flight of a dozen Jordanian air force jets escorted the Pope's plane to the borders of that country.

In a farewell airport statement the pontiff urged an end to "all bitterness, and wrath, and indignation" in what appeared to be an appeal for peace in the bitter Arab-Israeli dispute.

Jordan's King Hussein bade farewell to the Pope in a speech pledging to "preserve the holy places forever" and promising to work with all his strength for peace and justice. He hailed the Pope as "the greatest pilgrim of them all."

Second Summit Meeting
On the final day of his pilgrimage, Pope Paul held his second religious summit meeting with Eastern Orthodox Patriarch Athenagoras in 2 days.

In the first such conference between a Roman Catholic Pope and an Eastern patriarch in 500 years, the two leaders agreed their encounter "may be the sign and prelude of things to come."

During his tour of Christian shrines Pope Paul encountered a tumultuous welcome that threatened to crush him in the narrow streets of old Jerusalem, said Mass in the Sacred Church of the Holy Sepulcher while flames leaped overhead in a short-circuited wire, visited the Garden of Gethsemane, and crossed the armed border into Israel for visits to Nazareth and other sites associated with the life of Jesus Christ.

The Pope also exchanged a symbolic "kiss of peace" with Patriarch Athenagoras at their talks and repeatedly called for peace and unity among all Christians.

Jordan Radio said today the 66-year-old pontiff had also issued peace appeals to 224 heads of government and organizations appealing to them "to do all in your power that peace shall prevail in the world."

Just before he entered his DC8 jetliner for the homeward flight, the pontiff turned and raised his arms to the crowd, bestowing his apostolic blessing.

A roar from the throng answered the gesture.

The pontiff had told the crowd: "May God grant peace and happiness to the inhabitants of the Holy Land."

The pontiff traveled from Jerusalem to Amman in a motorcade at speeds sometimes exceeding 60 miles an hour.

His progress through the city itself, however, was slowed when enthusiastic throngs of thousands spilled out into the streets in an attempt to approach the pontiff. Cheering thousands also were at the airport.

The pontiff was a slight figure in white against the crimson carpet stretching from the royal pavilion at Amman Airport to the airliner steps. The Pope stopped to shake hands with each member of the crew lined up by the plane side.

Twelve Jordanian jets flew escort for the papal plane, whose tail was painted with the Vatican colors of white and yellow. The jets left the airliner at the Jordanian border. The airliners route took it over Syria, Lebanon and Cyprus en route to Rome.

In three days, Pope Paul accomplished what no other pontiff had in centuries. He fulfilled a long-cherished dream of visiting the shrines where Jesus was born, grew up, died, and was resurrected.

He held the first religious summit talks with an Eastern patriarch in 910 years, agreeing with Athenagoras that their encounter "may be the sign and prelude of things to come."

Military Vehicle Plunge Claims 5

CAMP PENDLETON, Calif. (UPI) — Three Marines and two Navy corpsmen were killed Sunday and 14 other servicemen injured — three of them critically — when a truck in which they were riding plunged off a steep mountain road.

Names of the dead and some of the injured were withheld pending notification of the next of kin.

Three of the injured were listed as in critical condition, nine as serious, and two as satisfactory.

Of those in serious condition, one was identified as Sgt. Billy H. Kneeder, 37, Fallbrook, Calif.

In satisfactory condition were Pfc. Edward L. Anderson, 19, of Liberty, Mo.; and Pfc. Lawrence Coblenz, 19, Portland, Ore.

Pvt. Willard J. Schultz Jr., 18, of Colorado Springs, Colo., was treated and returned to duty at this Marine base.

A Marine Corps spokesman said the truck was transporting the men on a training mission when the brakes apparently failed.



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
