

Firing Squad Claims Hungarian Envoy-Spy

VIENNA (UPI) — A former Bulgarian diplomat who claimed he spied for the United States in exchange for a life of wine and women died before a firing squad in Sofia Sunday.

The one-time United Nations delegate, Ivan Assen Georgiev, appealed for pardon from his conviction for high treason, but the Bulgarian National Assembly rejected it.

The official Bulgarian telegraph agency, which reported the execution, said Georgiev submitted the appeal despite his court statement that he deserved no mercy.

Before his New Year's Eve death sentence by the Bulgarian Supreme Court, the 56-year-old ex-diplomat and lawyer requested the "heaviest punishment" for admitted cold-war crimes which read like a paper back spy thriller.

For seven years until his arrest Sept. 7 in a Moscow hotel room, Georgiev claimed, he supplied the U.S. Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) with Communist political, military and economic secrets.

In return, he said, he received \$200,000 which he spent on a "luxurious life" surrounded by "loose women" and a variety of mistresses allegedly flown to him by the CIA.

Georgiev's trial touched off a demonstration by 3,000 Bulgarians who smashed the windows of the U.S. Legation in Sofia and damaged four American diplomatic automobiles. The United States sent two protests to the Communist Bulgarian government.

Man Who Issued Kennedy Threat Faces Grand Jury

AMARILLO, Tex. (UPI) — A federal grand jury today considers charges against Russell W. McLarry, 21, who allegedly threatened the life of President Kennedy the night before the assassination.

McLarry, a part-time student who was employed across the street from where Kennedy was to speak Nov. 22, said he would go before the grand jury and personally fight the indictment.

The machinist, who attended a night school at Arlington (Tex.) State College, admitted he threatened the President but claimed it was only a joke. Two classmates reported that he uttered a threat the night before Kennedy was slain.

No connection was made between McLarry and Lee Harvey Oswald, the accused assassin.

A Secret Service agent, who testified at McLarry's arraignment last month in Fort Worth, said the suspect told him that he was not sorry that Kennedy was dead. McLarry denied the statement, but told the U.S. commissioner that he thought Kennedy should have been impeached. He was freed on \$2,500 bond.

Ralph T. Shaver

Ralph T. Shaver, formerly of Sutherlin, died Saturday in Los Angeles, Calif. where he was retired.

Shaver was the son of the late Mrs. Ora Banker. He came to Sutherlin in 1911 from Minnesota. He was a graduate of Sutherlin High School and attended Oregon State College. Shaver was a veteran of WW I. He retired in June 1963 from 28 years with the Electrical Testing Laboratories for the city of Los Angeles.

He is survived by his wife Carol; two sons, Clark and Lewis, all of Los Angeles; one sister, Mrs. Rolla (Helen) Wilson of Drain; a nephew, Meredith Wilson of Roseburg; and five grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held Tuesday in Los Angeles.

Yoncalla Man Spearheads Drive To Cut Solon's Pay

Yoncalla resident Stacy Adams is spearheading a campaign to reduce the salaries of Oregon's state legislators.

Adams heads a group which calls itself the "Committee for Reasonable Legislative Salaries."

He said the committee is circulating an initiative petition which would call for a state-wide vote next November on the matter of legislative pay. The proposal would be to reduce the lawmaker's monthly

salary from \$250 to \$100. "I think this is adequate because, in addition, they will still receive \$37 per day (for expenses while the Legislature is in session) including \$17 for secretarial expense, plus mileage when called to Salem, and free meals in the legislator's lounge," Adams stated.

Adams, a frequent critic of legislative budget handling and a supporter of the John Birch movement, said he will ask each signer of the petition to contribute 2 cents to defray costs of the project. Persons interested in obtaining petitions will be asked to donate 25 cents to guarantee the printing costs.

"Any money collected in excess of actual cost involved I will send to Francyl Howard, who initiated the tax referendum, to apply on the indebtedness that he incurred with his referendum," Adams stated.

Other members of the committee he heads are Frank P. Liening, Winston; George A. Trunbo, Oakland, and Dean R. Boss, Drain.

Alva M. Henslee, 86, well known Roseburg resident, died Saturday at a local hospital after a long period of illness.

Mrs. Henslee was born April 25, 1877, in Waco, Tex. She was married July 23, 1899, to James B. Henslee who preceded her in death in April of 1960. Mrs. Henslee moved to Oregon in 1910 and had lived in Douglas County ever since, spending 17 years of that period in Roseburg. She was a lifelong member of the First Methodist Church.

County Drenched By Heavy Rainfall As Snow Reported In Highland Areas

Rainfall was heavy Sunday night and early Monday morning, and snow was falling in the highlands.

Ben B. Irving, Water Resources Survey engineer, reported several of his rainfall gauges spotted around the county showed well over an inch of precipi-

tation during the 24-hour period ending at 8 a.m. today.

Among these were Roseburg with 1.11, Camas Mountain with 1 inch, Elkton 1.64, Looking-glass 1.25, Flournoy Valley 1.45, Elkhead 1.51, Steamboat 1.22 and Sutherlin 1.5.

The U. S. Weather Bureau reported the snow level is at 3,000 feet now. Correspondent Mrs. Arthur Selby said the Toketee Ranger station had reported three inches and more snow falling this morning. She quoted Don Wilson, owner of the Lemolo Lodge as saying when he left the lodge on Lemolo Lake Sunday afternoon at 4 p.m., snow had reached a depth of 10 inches and was still coming down.

The five-day weather forecast according to the Weather Bureau station at the Roseburg airport calls for temperatures near normal with heavy recurring rains through Saturday. Total rainfall is expected to be up to 1 1/2 inches in the interior valleys. Temperatures will include highs in the 40's and lows in the 30's.

The snow which is now falling above the 3,000-foot level, is expected to turn to rain soon, according to Weather Bureau spokesmen.

Water Resources Meeting Called

A meeting of an inter-agency committee which is involved in water resources studies for the Rogue, Umpqua and Coquille rivers will be held in the Coos County Courthouse at Coquille Tuesday night.

Ben Irving, water resources engineer for Douglas County, will attend.

Irving said purpose of the session, sponsored by the Coos County Water Resources Committee, will be to correlate investigations being conducted by the various government organizations.

Expected at the meeting are representatives of the U. S. Corps of Army Engineers, Bureau of Reclamation, state Water Resources Board, Fish and Wildlife Agency and other conservation offices interested in the river resource study.

State Education Cost Third High In Nation

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Oregon ranks third in the nation in the amount of money spent to educate its public elementary and high school students, a National Education Association study showed today.

The annual expenditure in Oregon for each of its 440,000 students is \$549, according to the study. Alaska was first with an annual expenditure of \$705 and California was second with \$634.

Oregon was 13th in its average teacher salary at \$6,240, the NEA said. Alaska was first with \$8,750.

Roseburg City Police are checking into a report by Cleo Stotler of 1093 SE Jackson St. that he was beaten, robbed and dumped over a bank into the South Umpqua River along the Melrose Road shortly after midnight today.

Stotler admitted to police he had been drinking and left a local cafe with intentions of taking a taxi home. He said two young men who claimed to be friends of his son, came by and offered him a ride home.

Instead, he said, they drove out on the Melrose Road, and without warning started beating him about the head and face, then when they thought he was in an unconscious state, took his bill fold and checkbook, then rolled him over the bank.

He claimed to have swum across the river to get away from them, then finally found his way to a house from which he called his wife, who was crying at the cafe. She, in turn, sent her son to pick him up. Police said Stotler had bruises about the head and minor cuts and was wet from the chest down when they called about 1:30 a.m.
