## Adult Education Classes To Open

The Adult and Vocational Education Department of the Roseburg Public Schools will hold organizational meetings for classes in sewing and welding Tuesday at 7 p.m.

All women interested in basic sewing, Bishop method clothing, making the basic pattern, designing clothing, dressmaking or tailoring are urged to attend this organizational meeting to be held in the high school home-making department. As many classes and sections of each class will be set up as necessary to meet the demands of those interested, according to Alex R. Kennedy, director of the department.

Also on Tuesday an organizational meeting for those interested in arc and acetylene welding will be held in the high school Farm Shop. As many as four sections of welding will be offered if enough people show interest, said Kennedy.

Business courses starting Tuesday are typing in room 207 and accounting in room 209. Typing and accounting classes will meet each Tuesday and Thursday for 10 weeks.

On Wednesday, conversational Spanish will meet in HR-4 of the main building and mathematics in room 3 of the Social Arts Building.

On Thursday, a course in public speaking in room SA-1 and a course in lettering will start in the art room in the Library Building.

On Jan. 13, "Mr. Chairman," a course in parliamentary procedures, will start in the agriculture classroom.

All apprenticeship related training classes will resume the week of Jan. 6.

## Cow Creek Group Slates Meeting

Ralph Place, president of the Cow Creek Valley Development Association, has announced that there will be an important meeting of the organization on Tuesday at 8 p.m. at the Glendale City Hall.

Business on the agenda will include an up-to-date report on the status of the Rural Fire District program which has been delayed by the necessity to re-draw the map of the proposed fire district to provide detailed and exact legal descriptions of the proposed area in order to satisfy the requirements of the law. Both the map and the legal descriptions are now in the hands of the attorney chosen to represent the district, according to Clyde Marriott, fire district chairman.

A vote will be taken at the meeting to see whether or not members of the association are willing to underwrite some of the preliminary expenses of setting up the district from the Cow Creek Valley Development Association treasury, reports correspondent Mrs. G. B. Fox.

Plans will also be made for attending a public meeting at Canyonville on Jan. 14, at which progress reports will be given on plans for the Umpqua Basin water projects, including the Galesville Dam which has been backed by the association.

## Negro Attends First Classes At Auburn U.

AUBURN, Ala. (UPI)—Negro Harold Alonzo Franklin, sole occupant of Auburn University's Magnolia Dormitory, attends his first classes at the newly desegregated institution today.

The 31-year-old graduate student, first member of his race to crack the school's color line, was scheduled to begin his history studies at 10 a.m.

Franklin registered Saturday on a campus heavily guarded by Alabama state troopers. He was greeted by a few catcalls but registered without the federal escort which accompanied Negro students entering the University of Alabama—the state's only other desegregated college.

Today most of the state troopers were gone. Highway patrol commander Al Lingo pulled out most of the 100 riot-trained patrolmen he had on duty and left security arrangements to a small detachment.

Franklin, who won a court order requiring the university to furnish him a dormitory room, was assigned a room in Magnolia Hall, a four-story dormitory otherwise vacant. He told United Press International by telephone Sunday that he spent a "very quiet" first night on the campus, but refused to answer other questions.

University officials, who put strict regulations into effect during the desegregation, announced Sunday that four white students were suspended for removing restriction signs on the campus.

The students, who were not identified, were scheduled to appear before a disciplinary committee today. Highway patrolmen caught them pulling up signs saying the campus was off limits to all but students and faculty members.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson, appearing rested after a holiday visit to his Texas ranch, returned to his White House desk today for a round of conferences on his budget and legislative program.

The President also called in his top advisers to help put finishing touches on the State of the Union message that he will deliver to a joint session of Congress Wednesday.

Johnson first planned to meet with Secretary of State Dean Rusk, Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara and McGeorge Bundy, special presidential assistant for national security affairs.

A breakdown of enrollment to date shows 24 persons taking one course; 16 taking two courses, and 24 persons taking a full load of three or more courses. The last date for registering for any classes will be Jan. 5 at 5 p.m. at the high school.
