

Trojans Log 69-60 Win Over Crusaders

Douglas' Trojans held off a spirited bid by the invading St. Mary's Crusaders Saturday to record a 69-61 hoop victory over the southern power.

Hitting at a wicked clip from the field, the Trojans moved in front 14-6 in the first quarter after the Crusaders had broken the ice with a free toss. Douglas continued to lead throughout the contest, though the rampaging Crusaders narrowed the gap to five, 60-5, in a hectic surge in the closing seconds of the game.

For the game the winning Trojans hit 26 of 51 shots from the field, while St. Mary's made 23 of 69. Rebounds favored the winners, 47-31.

The winning Trojans displayed a well-balanced scoring attack with four players breaking into the double figures. Ray Shepherd led the way with 17 points, followed by Ron Stobbe and Larry Samples with 13 each and Dan Withers with 10.

High point honors for the game went to St. Mary's Randy Corliss with 24. Ron Roberts potted 15 and John Batzer hit 13 for the losers.

In the preliminary game the Douglas Jayvees dumped St. Mary's, 71-27. Rod Shafer led the winners with 17 points.

Douglas now sports a 6-1 record for the season, and has not suffered a setback against A-2 competition.

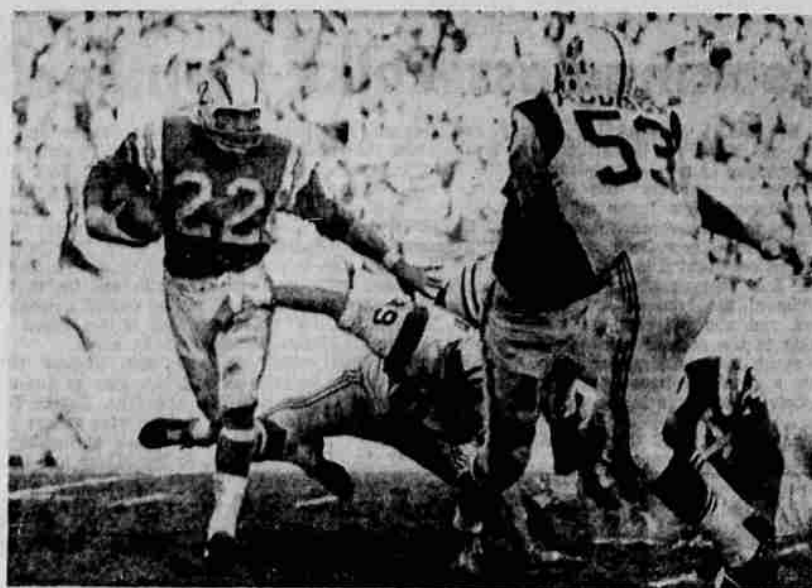

Defense Sparks Vikings To Decisive 51-35 Win

Displaying their defensive prowess, the Myrtle Creek Vikings stormed to a decisive 51-35 non-league triumph over the Myrtle Point Bobcats Saturday.

Coach Hank Talus praised his team for its outstanding defensive effort, stating that Saturday's game was the "best team effort of the season."

While limited the Bobcats to a minimum of scoring, the Vikings potted 18 of 33 shots from the field for a healthy .545 shooting percentage. Myrtle Point made 13 of 53 shots for a mere .245 percentage. The Vikings controlled the boards, 32-31, in a hard-fought duel.

Myrtle Creek went wild in the first quarter while holding the home team to three points, enjoying a 16-3 margin by the end of the period. From that point on the Vikings were in complete control of the game.

Larry Pringle potted eight field goals and made three of five shots at the foul line for 19 points to emerge as the game's top scorer. Teammate Bob Fuller added 15 points and Jerry Willson potted 13 for the Vikings. Riddle Pallen's 10 points was high for the Bobcats.

The Vikings now sport an 8-3 record in non-league play. Myrtle Creek is shooting at a .25 clip from the field for the season, while holding the opponents to a .297 shooting percentage.

Dan Billings scored 11 points in Saturday's Jayvee fracas to lead Myrtle Creek to a 41-33 victory.

OSU Uponds Cincy, 82-61

CORVALLIS (UPI)—"It really was a big one," Slat Gill said. "It sure helps make our season."

Gill's comments came after his eighth-ranked Oregon State Beavers rolled over fifth-rated Cincinnati 82-61 before 10,597 here Saturday night.

"In fact, it was one of the biggest wins in my 36 years at Oregon State," the veteran coach added.

Seven-foot Mel Counts poured in 38 points and picked off 16 rebounds to spark the Beavers, who fell to the Bearcats 57-53 at Portland Friday night.

"Mel makes the difference," Cincinnati Coach Ed Jucker said after the one-sided game.

"He's got so many more moves than he had last year," (the Bearcats routed the Beavers 80-46 in the NCAA semi-finals last season). But the big thing is that the other kids now have great confidence in him and so have more confidence in themselves."

Jim Jarvis had 18 points and Scott Eaton added 10 for the Oregon State.

All-American Ron Bonham scored 28 and George Wilson made 10 for Cincinnati.

The decision left the Beavers with an 11-2 record and the Bearcats with an 8-3 mark.

Oregon State was in control of the game most of the way, holding a 38-26 halftime lead after being in front by as many as 15 points in the first half.

The Beavers' biggest lead in the second half was 80-55.

Oregon State left by plane Sunday for three games in Hawaii this week. The Beavers play the University of Hawaii Tuesday and Saturday nights and meet a service all-star team Friday night.

However, the games will not be counted by the NCAA.

LC Cagers Win Tourney Crown

Wayne Petersen scored 19 points as Linfield's Wildcats rolled over Portland State 103-64 at Portland. John Nelson had 22 for the Vikings.

Keith Shugarts hit a free throw with four seconds left to give Western Washington a 61-60 victory over Pacific at Forest Grove.

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SD Chargers Run Wild In AFL Playoff Fracas

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (UPI)—The San Diego Chargers reigned today as champions of the American Football League.

The Chargers won the title Sunday by smashing the Boston Patriots 51-10 in the annual championship game between the Eastern and Western Division leaders.

The Patriots entered the game boasting the league's finest defense, but the running of Keith Lincoln and Paul Lowe, and the passing of Tobin Rowe and John Hadl sent Boston back to the drawing boards to prepare for next season.

Lincoln, voted the game's most valuable player, ran 56 yards to set up San Diego's first touchdown and 87 yards to score the second before Lowe dashed 58 yards around right end to give San Diego an insurmountable 21-7 lead in the first quarter.

Norton, Alworth Score

Rote dominated the second and third quarters, throwing 14 and 48-yard scoring passes to Don Norton and Lance Alworth respectively. Hadl took over in the final stanza with a 25-yard touchdown toss to Lincoln and a one-yard scoring plunge.

The Boston defense, which

had allowed the opposition an average of 79 yards a game on the ground all year, was turned in and out by San Diego for 318 yards rushing and an overall 610 yards — an average of 10.2 yards a play.

Coaches Sid Gillman of San Diego and Mike Holovak of Boston termed the win a well-deserved effort by the Chargers, but amazingly none of the Charger scores came on breaks. Boston did not fumble and had two passes intercepted, neither of which affected the scoring.

Lincoln, despite playing only slightly more than half the game, ran for 206 yards, a club record and a championship game record.

Near Faultless Play

Rote, a veteran of 15 years, was called by Gillman "the greatest quarterback to ever

take a snap from center." His play-calling and faking were almost faultless as was Gillman's plan to fake the end sweep to stop Boston's blitz and set up traps through tackle.

Alworth, voted the league's most valuable player, was held to four receptions, but officials to a man praised his ability.

The defense was equally superb. Boston quarterback Babe Parilli hit on 14 of 29 passes for 189 yards, but he and Tom Yewcic were thrown for 42 yards attempting to pass. This factor allowed the Patriots only two serious offensive drives, one for a touchdown and one for a field goal.

Boston halfback Ron Burton perhaps summed up the game best. "It was one of the best games we played all year," he said, but his team lost by 41 points.

Starr Shines As Packers Jolt Cleveland 11, 40-23

MIAMI (UPI) — Bart Starr was at the peak of his game and Jimmy Brown was far from it. That just about sums up the story of the Green Bay Packers' 40-23 victory over the Cleveland Browns in the National Football League's Playoff Bowl game.

To the crowd of 54,921 in the Orange Bowl and to a nationwide television audience, it appeared that the Packers gave a fine performance in this battle of the NFL's two runner-up teams.

To Vince Lombardi, Green Bay's perfectionist coach, there was a flaw.

"No defense," he summed up soberly.

Jimmy Brown could hardly agree with Lombardi. The Browns blockbuster, first pro-back to gain a mile in one season, was held to 61 yards in 11 carries by the Packers.

"We didn't have a special defense set up for him," Lombardi said after the game. "We didn't think it was necessary. After all, we normally have a pretty good defensive team."

Starr's performance won him the game's most valuable player award by the unanimous vote of the writers who covered the contest. Starr completed 15

of 18 passes for a total of 259 yards and three touchdowns. And even though Lombardi complained about looseness in the defense, the crowd enjoyed the barrage of eight touchdowns, two field goals and a safety.

Starr by far had the better of his duel with rival quarterback Frank Ryan, as well as with the rushing efforts of Brown.

Starr matched the NFL record for the longest touchdown pass, a 99-yard flip and run to Tom Moore which, while it doesn't count in the record books, was something to see. Standing in his own end zone, Starr faked line-busting Jim Taylor into the middle and then lifted a pitch to Moore at the 23. Moore lugged all the way down the sidelines for the game's outstanding feature.

There was a defensive gem, too, when the Browns marched 76 yards to a first down on the Packers one—and couldn't hammer it across in four all-out shots at the line. They gave the great Jim Brown two shots and his 228 pounds were stopped cold. Ernie Green smacked in there twice with his 210 pounds and both times was held with no gain. The Packers took over—and Starr uncorked that 99-yard touchdown play.

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
