Aides Predict More Journeys For Pope Paul

VATICAN CITY (UPI)—Pope Paul VI, back from a triumphal journey to the Holy Land, may soon tell the world of his spiritual experience in an encyclical, a high Vatican source said today.

The Pope was cheered by a million Romans Monday night on his return from the pilgrimage to the land of Christ's birth. Observers said the success of his trip has cast him in a new role as a traveling apostle of peace and unity, and they predicted more trips for the pontiff.

The Vatican source said the 66-year old pontiff was expected to take a few days of rest and then start work on the first encyclical of his half-year reign. They said it was likely to tell of the sources of inspiration and hope the Pope found in the Holy Land and reiterate the message of peace he proclaimed from Bethlehem.

At a later date, they said, the Pope may issue encyclicals on other subjects.

Fitting Occasion

One of these, they said, was on scientific research, for which this year's fourth centenary of the birth of Galileo could be a fitting occasion.

Galileo, the 16th century Italian physicist and astronomer, was condemned by the Roman Catholic Church of his day for his theory that the earth revolves around the sun. This was considered heresy at the time. The Vatican's stand on Galileo has long since been reversed.

The sources noted that the church's approval and support for science already has been outlined in a number of documents and speeches by the late Pope Pius XII.

They said Pope Paul was not thinking so much of adding something new to this stand on science but of recording it in the form of an encyclical.

Broader Encyclical

In any event, they said, an encyclical on science and technology was not likely to come before the issuance of the Pope's broader encyclical on religious and world problems.

This would be a sweeping "State of the Church" message. The sources indicated it may be weeks before the encyclical is finished because the Pope has so many experiences to analyze and fit into it.

They include world reaction to his message from the Holy Land appealing for peace, his experiences visiting the places of Christ's life, and most important of all, his meeting with Patriarch Athenagoras, head of the Eastern Orthodox Church.

In addition to this activity, the Pope is considered virtually certain to make more trips abroad.

Rector Says Curse Worked On Sinners

BRAMBER, England (UPI)—The elderly rector of Bramber has removed the curse he pronounced against local vandals because, he says, "it worked."

Last Sunday the Rev. Ernest Streete, the 72-year-old rector of the Anglican Church of St. Nicholas, discovered that some one had overturned tombstones in the church graveyard, chalked "devil worship" symbols on its walls and propped up a heavy cross against its door.

"Black magic" cried the rector, striding to his pulpit to "curse those who touched God's acre in this churchyard, and for their sacrilege and the terrible thoughts in their minds."

"May their days be of anguish and sorrow and may God have mercy on their souls," he intoned.

The use of curses and other occult injunctions has a long history in the Church of England's fight against sin.

When the Rev. Mr. Streete walked down to the church Monday morning, he found the signs erased and the tombstones and cross repaired.

"My curse has worked," smiled the rector. "They have repented. All it needed was a firm hand. I shall withdraw the curse." And he did.

But today local police said the rector owed his tidy churchyard more to them than to his curse.

"I can't understand why he said the vandals repented," a policeman said. "Three of us put back the cross on Sunday evening. The black magic symbols already had been rubbed out by the rector."

Barry Would Aid Invaders Of Cuba

CONCORD, N.H. (UPI)—Sen. Barry Goldwater said today that if he were president he would be "inclined" to provide air cover for Cuban exiles in any future invasion of their homeland.

"I would help Cuban exiles," he said. "I would train them and supply them."

A newsman asked Goldwater, "would you supply them with air cover?" Goldwater replied, "I would be inclined to do that."

Goldwater also said that Russia would free "captive nations" rather than risk withdrawal of diplomatic recognition.

Skeleton Report False Say Police

"Ghouls at Work" or "There was no Skeleton in That Closet" might be appropriate titles to tales being told around Roseburg this week.

Rumors current in the city to the effect that a skeleton was unearthed during cleanup and excavation work on the site of the former Roseburg Funeral Home (Chapel of the Roses) corner of SE Oak Avenue and SE Kane Street, are entirely unfounded, according to Roseburg city police.

Where the rumors started isn't known, but the guess is there's a practical joker with a morbid sense of humor floating around the city, police surmise.

Search Continues For Lost Aircraft

HONOLULU (UPI)—A fleet of 18 Air Force, Coast Guard and Navy planes fanned out over the Pacific today in a continuing search for a C-124 Globemaster cargo plane, missing since last Wednesday with nine men aboard.

The commander of the eight-man crew of the ill-fated plane, Lt. Col. Woodland M. Styron, arrived from Utah Monday to take part in search activities. The ninth man aboard the plane was a sailor escorting a body back to the United States.

"We're all hoping and praying that we'll find our crew and bring them back safely," said Styron. The Newbern, N.C., officer is commander of the 28th Air Transport Squadron at Hill Air Force Base, Utah.

The Globemaster disappeared Wednesday while flying from Wake Island to Hawaii. It was en route from Tokyo to the United States.

Temblor Jolts Pasadena Area

PASADENA, Calif. (UPI)—A sharp earthquake was recorded in the southern California desert area to the east of Pasadena Monday, strong enough to rattle windows but too slight to cause damage.

Residents at Palm Springs, about 100 miles away, reported feeling the quake that was believed to have been centered in the desert not far away.

Wife Beating Not In Order

MELUN, France (UPI)—Police arrested laborer Francois Bujas 50, Monday night for attacking his wife despite his contention that it was "quite in order to beat my wife from time to time."

Heart Attack Claims Solon

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (UPI)—Rep. Howard Baker, who represented a staunchly Republican area of Tennessee in Congress while most of the South was Democratic, died today of a heart attack.

Baker, 61, was pronounced dead at Ft. Sanders Presbyterian Hospital here where he was rushed after suffering the attack at his home.

Baker helped write the tax law revision of 1954 and was a champion of the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) although he was aligned with the Republican party's conservative wing.

He had represented the Republican stronghold of east Tennessee since 1950.

Baker would have been 62 on Sunday.

Tennessee Gov. Frank Clement, a Democrat, said in Nashville he would call a special election to fill the congressional vacancy caused by the Republican's death.

The winner of the special election would serve until expiration of Baker's term in January, 1965. No date for the election was set, but election laws require the governor to set a date within 60 days after official notification by the House of Representatives of a member's death.

It was reported Baker may have fallen in the bathtub of his home. He was still wearing pajamas when he was carried into the hospital room on a stretcher. Two doctors pronounced him dead at 10:04 a.m. EST.

"Death was instantaneous," one of the doctors said. "He was in apparent previous good health."

College Signup Deadline Tonight

Tonight from 7 to 9 p.m. is the deadline for registering for two more Umpqua Community College courses. According to Ralph Snyder, registrar, classes begin tonight at the high school in General Psychology and College Algebra. Those persons registering after the first class has been held in any subject must pay a "late registration" fee.

Following Monday night's beginning classes in History of the U.S. and World Literature, total registration to date is 78 with 31 persons taking one class, 17 taking two classes and 30 registering for three or more classes.

Almost half of the students registered thus far are from outside the immediate Roseburg vicinity, Snyder reported today. Sutherland is furnishing the largest number with a total of nine students so far from that area. Other registrations include Glade, six; Winston, Dillard, five; Myrtle Creek, three; Oakland, Riddle and Drain, two each; and Camas Valley, Willbur and Canyonville, one each.

Deadline for any registration for the term is 5 p.m. Jan. 10 at the high school business office.

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County Has First Fatal

Douglas County registered its first fatal traffic accident of 1964 Monday when Donald Beryl Shanks, 50, of Lake Oswego was fatally injured near Scotts-Lurg on Highway 38.

The car slammed into the cement pillar on the west end of the Umpqua River bridge while traveling east, according to a report from the sheriff's department.

Shanks was alone in the vehicle. He was taken to the hospital at North Bend where he died on the X-ray table at 9:20 p.m. The sheriff's deputy assisted state police from Reedsport in the investigation.

Youth Awaits Sentence After Plea Of Guilty

Dale Andrew Hargraves, 19, of Myrtle Creek, Monday pleaded guilty to a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon, in connection with the shooting and wounding of Nancy Irene Campbell, 28, of Briggs Acres, Myrtle Creek.

Pre-sentence investigation has been ordered for Hargraves by Circuit Court Judge Charles S. Woodrich.

The shooting took place Dec. 9 about 5:20 p.m., when Hargraves allegedly fired through a bedroom window of the Charles Campbell home with a .12 gauge shotgun. The gunshot passed through a drawn plastic curtain over the window and through another curtain over a door, then struck Mrs. Campbell in the living room of her home. She had eight pellet wounds in her back, but her condition is not serious, according to police reports.

The investigation showed young Hargraves and Mrs. Campbell had been away from home together and had been drinking. On their return home, an argument ensued between Mrs. Campbell's husband and Hargraves, and the latter was ordered off the place. He left and a short time later the shotgun blast was fired into the home. Campbell told police he got a .22 rifle and fired at the fleeing assailant.

Hargraves caught a ride into Myrtle Creek with a neighbor, then hitchhiked to Corvallis, en route to Philomath, where his estranged wife was living. He was picked up outside Corvallis by state police that night.

Hargraves was indicted by the Grand Jury on four charges, two of assault with a dangerous weapon against Campbell and his wife and two of assault with intent to kill against both.

LBJ Reviews State Of Union Message With Demo Leaders

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson reviewed his State of the Union Message today with Democratic congressional leaders and got a promise of swift action on the administration's top priority civil rights and tax reduction programs.

Speaker John W. McCormack told reporters after the weekly breakfast meeting at the White House that the State of the Union address Johnson will make to a joint session of Congress Wednesday is one "the American people overwhelmingly will respond to — and most favorably."

After giving his legislative lieutenants a peak at the speech, the President meets later today with two highly influential groups of labor and business leaders to solicit backing for his 1964 legislative targets. He invited members of the AFL-CIO Executive Council to lunch and gets together tonight with business executives.

Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield said the State of the Union Message accents domestic issues. He said it is "to the point" in seeking to deal with national interests. But Mansfield would not give specific details of the program Johnson will submit to the House and Senate at 12:30 p.m. EST Wednesday.

Arrest Due New Suspect In Slaying

NEWPORT BEACH, Calif. (UPI)—The second of two Spanish-born sisters, one of them the sister-in-law of multimillionaire William A. Bartholomae, was expected to be arrested today on suspicion of murder in the stabbing of the wealthy yachtsman - financier, police said.

Carmen Bartholomae, 25, wife of the 70-year-old victim's brother, Charles, 56, was jailed Sunday, the day Bartholomae was found dying on the kitchen floor of his palatial waterfront home in this southern California beach resort city south of Los Angeles. The motive for Bartholomae's slaying was unknown.

Carmen's sister, Minola Galardo, 32, who came here from Spain for the birth of Carmen's boy three months ago, was to be booked on similar charges today, authorities said.

Minola was confined to a hospital for treatment of severe cuts on her hand, which investigators said she received when she grasped the knife blade as she stabbed.

East German Bid Snubbed By Willy

BERLIN (UPI)—West Berlin Mayor Willy Brandt today in effect rejected a Communist proposal for him to meet with a high East German official to discuss reopening the Berlin wall.

Acting East German Premier Willi Stoph, in a bid to gain recognition for his Communist regime, suggested a meeting between Brandt and Deputy Premier Alexander Abusch.

Brandt told a news conference the Stoph letter contained "no practical proposals" for opening the wall. He promised not to submit to "political blackmail" for humanitarian reasons.

The West Berlin mayor said he would not discuss the letter further until he has concluded talks about it with the Western Allies and the West German government.

He did not, therefore, specifically say he would refuse to meet Abusch. But Western Allied officials called such a meeting out of the question.

They said it would tend to grant recognition to the Communist government of East Germany and undermine the legal position of West Berlin by playing down Western responsibility for the divided city.

The Western Allies will not allow such a meeting, the officials said.

Brandt said West Berlin wants the wall opened to traffic again, and that his municipal government has made proposals for this to the East Germans. He refused to disclose what the proposals were, however.

No Clues Found In Widow's Death

SEATTLE (UPI)—Police said today they were without clues in the murder of a Seattle widow whose bound body was found early Monday in her dark and heatless home.

The victim, Mrs. Katherine Shea, 63, died of a heart attack, brought on by the shock of an attack in which one of her arms was broken.

Police entered the home where Mrs. Shea lived after a mailman reported her mail had not been taken from the mailbox since Dec. 19.

Police found Mrs. Shea on the floor of the dining room, her hands tightly bound behind her back with heavy cord. She was fully clothed, with a shawl around her shoulders.

The coroner said the woman had been dead about 17 days. Investigators at the three-story home, where the woman lived with 13 cats, found a bag of groceries in the kitchen with a sales slip dated Dec. 21.

Money Order Blanks Stolen From Store

Burglaries at Douglas High School and the Dixonville Store, owned and operated by Mr. and Mrs. Neil Hart, is also being investigated today.

An estimated \$30 in cash was taken, but the owners were more concerned about a missing money order check "protector" and 68 Western World personal money order forms numbered 2433 through 2500. Banks were alerted this morning to be on the watch for money orders written in this series.

Door Forced

Entry to the store was achieved by forcing open a back door, the owners said. The cash taken included about \$6 worth of postage stamp money, about \$12 taken in on the sale of records by the Oregon Jazz Band (of which Hart is a member) and about \$12 in dog license fees.

Mrs. Hart said the burglar scattered things and "created quite a mess" while rummaging around the store in search of money.

President's Message Due Wednesday

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The second session of the 88th Congress convened today to face a heavy load of leftover business that leaders warned could run right up to fall elections.

Senators and representatives returned only eight days after the end of the first session, the longest since World War II, to take up where they left off with a batch of legislation. This included the controversial civil rights and tax cut measures of the late President Kennedy.

In addition, President Johnson was reported planning to propose in his address before a joint session Wednesday new programs designed to cut unemployment and so-called pockets of poverty in the nation.

Confer With Johnson

Administration legislative leaders conferred with Johnson in a White House breakfast strategy session today. Speaker John W. McCormack and Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield agreed that chances are dim for clearing the heavy legislative calendar by July 13 when the Republican National convention opens in San Francisco.

McCormack said he and the other Democratic congressional leaders, who hope to finish work on at least the major legislation by convention time, briefed Johnson on plans for the House Rules Committee to begin hearings Thursday on the civil rights bill, which bears the administration "must" label.

The leaders told Johnson that the entire House membership knows "this is a primary matter before the House," McCormack said. "We assured him that the civil rights bill will come to the floor of the House as quickly as possible as soon as the committee reports."

Await Rules Committee

By this, McCormack meant the bill would be taken up quickly as soon as the Southern-led Rules Committee decides upon terms for debate and sends it to the House floor.

Mansfield said the Capitol Hill leaders and Johnson also discussed prospects for the \$11 billion tax cut bill now before the Senate Finance Committee.

"We hope to get something to the floor by around the end of this month," Mansfield told newsmen.

Sinatra's Kidnappers Arraigned In Court

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—The three accused kidnappers of Frank Sinatra Jr., arraigned in U.S. District Court Monday on the federal charges, probably will be tried as a group on a six-count grand jury indictment.

Visiting Judge William G. East of Oregon set Jan. 20 as the date when all three defendants—Joseph Clyde Amsler, 23; Barry Worthington Keenan, 23; and John William Irwin, 42—must enter pleas.

Attorneys for the suspects agreed with the government on a tentative trial date of Feb. 10.
