Harney Scores Win In Los Angeles Open

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Paul Harney, the soft-spoken golfer from Sacramento, Calif., by way of Worcester, Mass., was so happy today that he went right out and bought his wife a new \$2,000 mink jacket.

Harney, the 150-pound slugger who quit the tour last year, won the \$50,000 Los Angeles Open golf tournament Monday and collected \$7,500 for the feat.

To get the prize, Harney, 34, put up the fight of his life. He fought back the challenges of such golfing greats as Arnold Palmer, Bob Nickols, Bob Goalby, Dow Finsterwald and Al Geiberger to get the victory.

And when it was all over, he coasted into the 18th hole holding a two-stroke lead. He came through with a bogey that gave him a par-71 and a final score of 280 against a 281 for Nichols, and a 282 for the other top challengers.

"I rather guessed that I'd never win another tournament," said Harney whose last victory came in 1959. "This is the biggest victory of my life."

Harney, 34, quit the tour after nine years on the road at the start of last year and took a job as a club pro at Sunset Oaks, a housing development with golf course, 26 miles east of Sacramento. His contract allowed him to play only eight PGA tournaments a year. But he played 12 last year and in two of those—the National Open and the Thunderbird—he missed by one stroke of gaining lasting fame.

"But I have no thought of returning to the golfing trail," he says. "I have a wife and four children and we are settled in our home at Sunset Oaks. We plan to stay there. I have a long-term contract."

Harney had rounds of 71-72-66-71 for his 280. Monday while he was fighting to maintain a par average he had three birdies and three bogies.

Nichols picked up \$4,000 for his second place finish with rounds of 69-68-73-71 for his 281. If he had won, he would have collected another \$11,500 — including \$3,000 from a golf ball manufacturer and \$5,000 from the golf club that employs him.

Goalby, Palmer, Finsterwald and Geiberger each collected \$2,775 for their tie for third place. Dave Marr and Tommy Jacobs had 283 for \$1,950.

Patterson KOs Amonti In 8 Rounds

STOCKHOLM (UPI)—Former heavyweight champion Floyd Patterson, with an opening comeback victory under his belt, smilingly considered today whether Henry Cooper of England or Karl Mildenberger of Germany should be his next opponent on the title trail.

Monday night 29-year-old Floyd stopped burly Sante Amonti, champion of Italy, at 2:25 of the eighth round before a turnaway crowd of 11,800 in Stockholm's Johanneshov Indoor Stadium. Amonti was floored four times.

In his first fight since champion Sonny Liston knocked him out in the opening round last July 22, Floyd appeared ring-rusty and somewhat confused at times although he won with comparative ease.

He said he would need "four or five more fights" to sharpen himself properly for another shot at the title.

Tom and Al Bolan of New York's Championship Sports, Inc., who teamed with Swedish promoter Edwin Ahlqvist in Monday night's very successful show, said Floyd's next fight probably would be at Stockholm or London.

Championship Sports staged five of Patterson's title bouts. When Floyd was asked if he planned to fight soon in the United States, he said, "No, but I'll return to my camp at Highland Mills, N.Y., in about three weeks and begin training there."

Meanwhile, Floyd said he would give boxing exhibitions in Sweden and perhaps Norway for the benefit of Swedish charities. Patterson, weighing 192 pounds to Italian Amonti's 191, floored stocky, black-haired Sante once in the second round, once in the fourth and twice in the eighth. Then referee Andrew Smythe of Belfast, North Ireland, stopped the bout as Amonti leaned groggily against the ropes.

Kansas City Athletics Plan Kentucky Move

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (UPI)—Charles O. Finley waved a legal contract with the state of Kentucky in the face of American League clubowners today and in effect defied them to keep him from moving his Kansas City Athletics to Louisville for the next two seasons.

Finley, Gov. Edward T. Breathitt and other state officials signed the contract in the governor's office at Frankfort Monday, binding the colorful club owner to move his team from Kansas City into Louisville's state-owned Fairgrounds Stadium for the 1964 and 1965 seasons and to play as the Kentucky Athletics.

Finley said, "I hope in two years time the fans of Kentucky will demonstrate to us that we should stay here."

The agreement has the same provisions as the contract under which Finley formerly operated in Kansas City, but which he said he was unable to renew with a new city administration.

It gives the Commonwealth of Kentucky 5 per cent of gross gate receipts and 7.5 per cent of gross concessions revenue, in return for expenditure of up to \$500,000 to expand the stadium seating capacity from 20,100 to 30,632.

Money From Fund
State Finance Commissioner L. Felix Joyner said the money for the renovations would come from the state's capital construction fund.

However legal, the Kentucky contract was only another shot fired by Finley in his battle to wrest what he considered more satisfactory terms out of Kansas City officials, or move the club, and the Athletics were still a long step from opening their home season against Cleveland here next April 22.

American League President Joe Cronin said flatly he doubted that American League clubowners would approve the move.

Finley must win approval from at least seven other clubowners at a special meeting called by Cronin for Jan. 16 at New York to consider the matter. Before that session, the five league directors will huddle

Harold Wooley Paces Opening Trap Shoot

Jay-Ehret Mahoney, the AAU's new president, extended the olive branch Sunday when he expressed a willingness by his group to meet and discuss issues with the NCAA-supported United States Track and Field Federation (USTFF).

Mahoney made the offer before a joint meeting of the NCAA's Executive Committee and Council, to which he and AAU Executive Director Col. Donald F. Hull had been invited by NCAA President Robert F. Ray.

Ray said he was pleased the AAU had agreed to meet with the USTFF.

"I consider this to be a step in the right direction by both groups," he said. "I haven't

any idea when the meeting will take place but we hope it will be as soon as possible."

Mahoney, a New York attorney who succeeded Louis J. Fisher of High Point, N.C., as AAU president recently, said his group has every intention of dealing cooperatively with the issues involved and Ray made the same promise for the NCAA.

"As evidence of the AAU's good faith, Hull said it would review an objection to the current exhibition appearance of a Peruvian basketball team in the United States to determine whether the team is a club team. The Lima team opens a 12-game tour tonight against Oglethorpe University in Atlanta.

Ray was further encouraged when Hull told the NCAA council, in response to questions, that there was no international rule which prevents dual sanctioning of domestic competition.

The question of dual sanctioning has been one of the biggest bones of contention between the two groups.

Hull did add, however, that there was a specific AAU rule enacted in 1962 which does not permit cooperative sanctioning.

Can't Discuss Lease
The grey-haired Athletics owner argued, "we are not even at liberty now to discuss a lease with the Kansas City government. We have a contract with Kentucky."

In effect, Finley was saying to the rest of the league, either play me in Louisville or don't play me—and if you don't play me, you'll have to pay me.

Kansas City officials Monday afternoon sent the ball club a telegram extending for 14 days, until midnight, Jan. 24, the date on which the club must sign a new contract or vacate the ball park. The old contract with the city of Kansas City has expired—or as Finley said, was declared null and void by the city council while he was trying to negotiate.

Louisville, having lost its American Association franchise last year after 61 years, is in baseball terms, an "open city" and under baseball law can be taken over by a major league club any time up to Feb. 16. In order to move to a city which has a baseball franchise, such as Atlanta, Ga., for example, the declaration of intent would have had to be filed prior to last Oct. 31.

UCLA Ousts Kentucky As No. 1 College Quint

NEW YORK (UPI) — The UCLA Bruins are the third and latest collegiate basketball team to occupy first-place in the United Press International rankings but their coach, John Wooden, isn't happy.

UCLA was ranked No. 1 by 25 of the 35 coaches on the UPI rating board Monday to give the undefeated Bruins their first taste of the top spot in their history. The last West Coast team to attain first-place was California, crowned national champion March 8, 1960.

"Of course it is a wonderful honor," acknowledged Wooden, who has never had a losing season in 15 years at UCLA, "but it also means there will be much more pressure on us. It will be a natural reaction for all our opponents to try to knock off the No. 1 squad."

Wooden couldn't be blamed for being a bit leery about the Bruins' lofty position. Kentucky, No. 2 this week, could hold the top spot only one week before Georgia Tech upset them, and two weeks ago, Loyola of Chicago, now ranked third, was tripped by Georgetown (D. C.), and lost its first-place perch.

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AAU-NCAA Voluntarily Meet For Rules Discussion

NEW YORK (UPI) — The NCAA and AAU achieved the first major break-through in their long, bitter war today with a voluntary pledge to sit down and iron out their differences in a new atmosphere of "mutual cooperation."

The real key to this rather sudden reconciliation is the word voluntary, because the last time these two antagonistic groups sat down together they were ordered to do so by Gen. Douglas MacArthur in his role as arbitrator.

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
