

# Planes Rush Doctors To Aid India Leader

BHUBANESWAR, India — (UPI) — Three Indian air force planes flew doctors and medicine to this provincial city today to treat Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru, who is reported suffering from fatigue. The planes were ordered to stand by as Nehru cancelled all his engagements "for the present" on his doctors' advice.

Originally, Nehru first cancelled all his engagements for the day. Then an announcement said his doctors advised him to take two weeks of complete rest. This later was amended to indicate he would be away from his work for longer than initially expected.

An announcement from the Orissa state governor's house at Bhubaneswar, quoted by the Indian news agency, disclosed the doctors' orders to Nehru, who has been attending a session of his ruling Congress party here.

The 74-year-old statesman was forced to miss the day's sessions of his bickering Congress party and a speech to a big public meeting in nearby Paradip.

There were unofficial reports that the prime minister was not feeling well under the unusual strain of the stormy meetings. He has looked exhausted and stooped over since he arrived here two days ago for the annual convention of his ruling party.

# Report Shows No Collusion In Ruby Case

DALLAS (UPI) — A complete investigation into the shooting of Lee Harvey Oswald showed no collusion between Dallas police and Oswald's self-appointed executioner Jack Ruby, Dist. Atty. Henry Wade said today.

The investigation into Oswald's death was just a portion of a "complete and detailed" report on President Kennedy's assassination and the events surrounding it filed with the state attorney general's office at Austin.

Texas Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr said the report included the investigative findings by state and Dallas authorities on the President's murder, the wounding of Gov. John Connally, the shooting of Dallas policeman J. D. Tippit, and the slaying of Oswald.

Carr said the report also included "the attempted murder of Gen. Edwin Walker." A shot was fired through a window in Walker's Dallas home last April. Oswald's widow told her attorney that the accused assassin implicated himself as the sniper who fired on Walker.

Wade said he had just begun to study the section of the report dealing with Oswald's death, but that he was convinced by the evidence put forth that Ruby had no connections with Dallas police.

Wade declined to discuss details of the report.

# Cypriot Peace To Be Policed

NICOSIA, Cyprus (UPI) — Archbishop Makarios, president of Cyprus, agreed Monday night to permit a United Nations observer to police the cease-fire between this island's feuding Greek and Turkish communities.

More than 200 persons have been killed since fighting broke out between the Greek and Turkish Cypriots last month. British troops were enforcing a truce, but new bloodshed was feared.

Monday six homes were burned in Omorphita, a mixed suburb of Nicosia. Omorphita has been the scene of repeated arson and some of the most bitter fighting.

In another incident, four Greek Cypriot postal officials were held in the Turkish quarter's main post office for five hours before they were released unharmed to Vice President Fazil Kuchuk. Kuchuk, a leader of the Turkish community, turned them over to British soldiers.

Monday night a presidential spokesman announced that Makarios, leader of the Greek Cypriots, had agreed to a proposal for a U.N. observer in Cyprus. The proposal was first advanced by Sir Patrick Dean, Britain's representative to the United Nations, to U.N. Secretary General Thant.

Intercommunal fighting broke out when Makarios announced plans to modify the country's constitution. Turkish Cypriots, outnumbered by about four to one, feared the changes might curtail rights granted to minorities under the constitution.

# Youth In Hospital After Auto Crash

George Kenneth Boyd, 17, of 1297 NW Ellen St., Roseburg, was taken to Douglas Community Hospital with head injuries today, after his car was involved in a collision with another operated by Steven John Webber of 1331 W. Brown Ave., Roseburg. Both are Roseburg High School students.

The accident occurred at the intersection of W. Military and Brown about 8:30 a.m., according to city police investigation. Webber was traveling west on Military, and his car went into a skid as he attempted to negotiate the sharp curve on to Brown. His car skidded 63 feet into Boyd's vehicle, police said.

Webber, who had to have stitches taken in his knee at the office of a local physician, was cited for violation of the basic rule (accident - control). Both cars were badly damaged.

# Two Are Hurt In Auto Crash

A one-car accident Monday night at the Garden Valley-NE Stephens Junction north of Roseburg, sent two persons to the hospital, one with a broken leg, and resulted in the "totaling out" of the car involved.

Injured were Mrs. Carl Roselund of 202 NE Fulton, reportedly bruised and shaken up, and Anitra Kahananui, 16, granddaughter of Mrs. Roselund, also of Roseburg, with a broken leg. Both were taken by ambulance to Douglas Community Hospital where their condition is reported as "good" today.

According to state police, the accident occurred around 9 p.m. when Mrs. Roselund, driving a 1958 model car, hit an iron post in a divider just north of the intersection. Rain and poor visibility, combined with the slick surface of the highway, were said to be contributing factors to the accident. No other persons were in the car, and no other cars were affected by the pileup. The car involved was towed from the scene.

# Heavy Snows Close Diamond Lake Roads

Heavy snowfall in the Diamond-Crater Lake area has resulted in closure of the West Diamond Lake, East Diamond Lake and Crater Lake North highways. According to L. R. Chandler, division engineer for the South Douglas division of the Oregon State Highway Department, the roads were closed for the winter Monday afternoon.

In excess of 5 feet of snow is now piled up in the area including 24 inches recorded since late Sunday. Snow was still falling late in the day on Monday, Chandler reported.

# Tucker Faces Action By Grand Jury Following Assault On Sutherlin Man

Jim Mackey Tucker, 37, of Wilbur, has been bound over to the Douglas County Grand Jury from the court of District Judge Gerald R. Hayes on a charge of assault and battery by means of force likely to produce great bodily harm.

He is accused of a knife assault on Eunice McKeithen Jan. 1, in a complaint filed by Sutherlin police officer Roger Hutchins. He is accused of jabbing McKeithen in the abdomen with a knife blade during an altercation in the wash room of a Sutherlin tavern.

Contributing Charged Samuel T. Stanley, 56, of Winston, has been arrested by the sheriff's department on a secret indictment of the Grand Jury charging him with contributing to the delinquency of a 13-year-old girl on Nov. 1, 1963. He has been released on posting \$1,000 bail.

Richard Gayle Hans, 29, of 1256 SE Mill St., Roseburg, Monday pleaded guilty to a charge brought in a district attorney's information accusing him of drawing a bank check with insufficient funds in the bank to cover it.

The charge involved a \$10 check passed Sept. 9 at the Fullerton Rexall Drug Store. However, police said two other checks were outstanding. Hans was sentenced to serve three months, 11 days in the county jail, but full credit was given him for the time he spent in jail in Pennsylvania, where he was arrested on the Douglas County warrant. He was extradited and brought to Roseburg to face the charge. The jail term covered the period he has spent in jail, so he was released immediately on order of Judge Woodrich.

Donald Eugene Nute, 34, Roseburg, is booked at the Douglas County jail on a Lane County warrant charging him with non-support.

Donald Thomas Cantrell, 21, has been returned to Roseburg by sheriff's deputies from Dallas, where he was arrested, to face probation revocation on an 18-month sentence to the Oregon Correctional Institution. Probation was granted June 13, 1962.

Wayne Kenton Rice, 39, Rte 1, Oakland, Monday was sentenced by District Judge Hayes to 60 days in the county jail and fined \$150 and \$5 costs for drunken driving. He was found guilty on trial last Thursday but imposition of sentence was postponed at that time.

# Two Are Injured In Auto Accident

The driver and occupant of a lone car suffered minor injuries when the vehicle went out of control about a mile south of Winchester Junction on Interstate Highway 5 at 2:20 p.m. Monday, state police report.

Raymond Lee Brunick, 40, of Bill's Trailer Park, Sutherlin, was listed as the operator and Carl Henry Julius, Fresno, Calif., as the passenger. Both were taken to Douglas Community Hospital and treated for minor scratches.

Police said the car was traveling south on Interstate 5 and while negotiating a slight turn to the right the car went out of control on slippery pavement. The 1962 model car was towed from the scene by a local wrecker.

# Car-Train Crash Hurts 2 Women

A train-automobile collision on NE Atlanta St., Roseburg, at 1 p.m. Monday sent two elderly persons to a local hospital with injuries, Roseburg city police report.

Injured were the driver of the car, Erma Ruth Blumer, 76, of 534 NE Jackson St., and her passenger Margaret Luella Crocker, 89, of 44 NE Atlanta.

Mrs. Blumer was traveling north and didn't see the west-bound switch engine with nine cars as she drove onto the track, she told police.

The train hooked the car and carried it 209 feet west on the tracks. The train engineer was George B. Abdill of 444 SE Eastwood.

The women were taken to a local hospital but their injuries were not serious. Mrs. Blumer had a sprained shoulder and pulled muscles. Mrs. Crocker had possible rib fractures.

Car Rolls A runaway car incident was also checked by police. Cleis Kenneth Barker of 1678 Deer Creek Lane, parked his car on SE Cass Ave., at the rear of the parking lot of the Douglas County State Bank about 2:55 a.m. today while he went into a restaurant across the street for coffee.

# Credentials Of Principal Suspended For One Year

SALEM (UPI)—The teaching and superintendent's credentials of Harrisburg Union High School principal Charles F. Fredrickson, 42, were suspended Monday for a one year period.

Public Instruction Supt. Leon P. Minear said he formally notified Fredrickson of the suspension on Monday.

Minear said Fredrickson admitted "misappropriating more than \$900 in student body funds" while he was principal at Eagle Valley high school at Richland in Baker County.

Minear said Fredrickson could request a hearing before the State Board of Education if he wished to dispute the suspension of his certificates.

Minear said Fredrickson had been accused by the Pine Eagle School Board and district superintendent of misappropriating the student funds.

Verbal Notice Received Minear said "I received verbal notice of the charge about one month ago, and asked for a written statement and resolution from the board at Halfway."

"I turned the report over to the attorney general's office and was advised by the attorney general's office there had been a clear infraction of the statutes."

"I called a show cause hearing, at which Fredrickson appeared, on Dec. 30. "At that time Fredrickson was given an opportunity to indicate if the charges were true or false. Fredrickson admitted the charges were true. I notified the county superintendent on Dec. 31 that Fredrickson's certificates would be suspended."

"Fredrickson was officially notified Monday of the suspensions," Minear said. Minear said Fredrickson was principal at Richland until last June, when he moved to Harrisburg to take over as superintendent.

Minear said the misappropriation of funds was discovered in a routine audit. Minear said Fredrickson may apply for a renewal of his certificates after the one year suspension.

Minear said "I understand the bonding company has restored the misappropriated student body funds, and that Fredrickson has made arrangements to pay back the bonding company."

Fredrickson told the Oregon Journal he fell behind in his \$75 a month child support payments. His former wife, Dorothy, and a son, Robert, 16, live in Eugene. Fredrickson was divorced in 1956 and he remarried two years later. He and his wife, Marvane, have two small children.

In Baker, Dist. Atty. Jess Himmelsbach said he launched an independent investigation of the shortage Monday after learning of it for the first time. He called in the State Police and said he expected to present the case to the Baker County grand jury at its next session.

# Hugh Tosses Hat In Ring For Commissioner's Post

Roseburg businessman and real estate developer Cecil A. Hugh became the first candidate to toss his hat in the political ring for Douglas County commissioner when he filed for the Republican primary Monday.

Hugh, a native Oregonian and long-time resident of Douglas County, filed for the No. 1 commissioner seat. There will be two commissioners elected this year, and candidates must file by position number.

Up for election are the No. 1 position held by Democrat Judge V. T. Jackson and the No. 3 position held by Republican Ray Doerner. The No. 2 position, held by Republican Elmer Metzger, does not come up for election this year. Under the new County Court system, there will be no county judge elected this year. All three will be commissioner posts, and the three commissioners will elect one of their members as chairman of the board.

Woods Job Held Hugh's background spans two major segments of life in Douglas County, that of the businessman and that of the woodsman. A native of Boyd, Ore. (located near The Dalles) he came to Roseburg in the mid-1940's, following 17 years as owner and operator of a fleet of log trucks. At one time during this period in his life he hauled timber into the Sutherlin area.

Hugh obtained a real estate broker's license in 1946 and spent two years in that profession in Roseburg. In 1948 he purchased JC Sporting Goods in downtown Roseburg, a business which he managed until 1958.

In 1957 he began developing a tract of land on the western edge of the city which he had purchased earlier and which had taken on the name Hurcrest. His final development of the tract was concluded during the period from 1961-63.

Hugh returned to the real estate profession in the spring of 1962, joining Roseburg Realty as a salesman, a position he still holds.
