

Sale Of British Buses To Cuba Draws U.S. Rap

HAVANA (UPI) — The government radio told Cubans Tuesday they will have new British buses by the end of this year in a \$12-million-plus deal which has been criticized by the United States.

The deal involves the immediate sale of 400 city buses at a price of more than \$11 million, with more than \$1 million worth of spare parts, plus 50 interurban buses and spare parts at an undisclosed cost.

Premier Fidel Castro's revolutionary regime was allowed five years in which to pay for the buses.

The U.S. government assailed the deal as detrimental to its efforts to isolate Russia's Caribbean satellite.

"I don't like it a bit," Secretary of Commerce Luther Hodges said, "this hurts us."

But a spokesman for the British company concerned said it is only the beginning.

"We have dealt with Cuba before," said Donald Stokes, managing director of Leyland Motors. "We sold them \$10 million worth of buses in 1949 and about \$3 or \$7 million worth in 1953."

"This is just a repeat order from a traditional customer... this is a preliminary. They want 1,450 buses."

"We have no knowledge of having to go to America for permission to sell buses... we didn't have a press conference when they sold wheat to the Russians."

The British firm gave the Cubans an option to buy the 1,000 additional buses they want anytime between 1963 and 1968 at an estimated price of \$20 million.

The agreement also bound Leyland to train six Cuban mechanics to maintain the buses. The British firm promised to establish an office and repair shops in Cuba and to assume responsibility for delivery of the buses and the spare parts.

Goldwater In Tests Of Industrial Areas

NASHUA, N.H. (UPI) — Sen. Barry Goldwater sounded out his vote getting ability today in three key industrial cities where he needed heavy support to win the first-in-the-nation presidential primary.

Goldwater's brand of conservatism, taken for granted to exiles in an invasion of their homeland.

"I would help Cuban exiles. I would train them and supply them," he said.

Goldwater, who emphasized that Russia needed the United States more than "we need them," favored threatening the Soviet with rupture of diplomatic ties to win the cold war. He said Russia would free "captive nations" rather than risk severance of diplomatic recognition.

Ben Bella Orders Trial For Rioters

ORAN (UPI) — Algerian President Ahmed Ben Bella today ordered an immediate trial for 300 persons arrested in Oran for rioting against the government because of unemployment.

The prisoners were among more than 350 rioters, many armed with steel bars and bicycle chains, who stormed local administrative headquarters Tuesday night.

At least one person was killed and several injured.

The Algerian Press Service (APS) said Ben Bella created a special tribunal during an emergency cabinet meeting in Algiers Tuesday night, and that the trial could take place today.

APS labelled the demonstrators "juvenile delinquents" and said they were "instruments of reactionary bourgeoisie."

Armed police patrolled the dock area of the port city to prevent a possible repetition of the violence.

Oran is one of the most highly industrialized cities in Algeria. But it has suffered heavy unemployment since the French started leaving the country two years ago, closing factories and shops as they went.

There have been other anti-government disturbances in Oran, but Tuesday's appeared among the worst since Algeria became independent from France 18 months ago.

Other campaign stops were scheduled at Milford, Amherst, Manchester and Portsmouth. He delivers a major speech tonight at St. Anselm's College in Manchester, the state's largest city.

Nashua, with 39,096 residents and Manchester with 88,282 are the state's most populous cities. They are regarded as crucial to winning the primary.

Goldwater, in obvious pain from a recent heel operation, limped through a day of campaigning Tuesday in Concord. His right foot is in a cast and he walks with a cane. The pain forced him to cut short by one hour a public reception at his campaign headquarters.

Fielding a wide variety of questions during a news conference, Goldwater said if he were president he would be inclined to provide air cover for Cuban

Johnson Makes Bid To End Arms Race

All-Out War On Poverty Is Declared

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Johnson today announced a surprise slash in federal spending below current levels. He also ordered a cutback in nuclear production in a dramatic bid to end the "provocative and wasteful" arms race.

Johnson proposed spending \$97.9 billion in fiscal 1963—a cut of \$500 million from the \$98.4 billion expected to be spent during the current year. He said this would mean a deficit of \$4.9 billion, far below previous expectations.

In his first State of the Union message to Congress, the President also challenged Russia to follow his lead in ordering a 25 per cent reduction in output of enriched uranium—an atomic explosive—and closing down four plutonium piles.

An Important Step

He said such action by Russia, coupled with new disarmament proposals this country will advance at Geneva, would be an important step toward arms control and "our ultimate goal... a world without war, a world made safe for diversity."

The 2,832-word address, shortest State of the Union message since Franklin D. Roosevelt's in 1934, was televised and broadcast to the nation.

On the domestic front, Johnson declared "unconditional war on poverty" and urged the lawmakers to make the second session of the 88th Congress the best in history by cutting taxes, passing civil rights legislation and providing medical care for the aged.

He also called for reform of "our tangled transportation and transit policies," the "most effective, efficient foreign aid program ever" and more homes, schools, libraries and hospitals than ever were authorized in any previous session of Congress.

Then, obviously mindful of the approaching national political conventions and the election campaign, Johnson told the lawmakers:

"It can be done by this summer."

Asks Tax Cut

In calling for approval of the \$11 billion tax cut bill by the end of January, Johnson urged Congress to lower the basic withholding rate from 15 to 14 per cent to give wage earners

State To Open Road Job Bids

Douglas County was included in an estimated \$6,900,000 worth of projects to be opened for bids on Jan. 29 by the State Highway Commission.

A project for Douglas County calls for widening three overcrossing structures, construction of a bridge over the South Umpqua River and installation of signs on the Fairgrounds Road-Shady Section of the Pacific Highway (Interstate 5). The section will be widened to four lanes, it is located about two miles south of Roseburg. It is scheduled for completion in the fall of this year.

Two projects are included for Coos County, one a rock production project and the other a road and bridge construction job on the Coos Bay-Roseburg Highway.

The rock production project calls for 7,000 cubic yards of crushed material for maintenance use on sections of the Coos Bay-Roseburg, the Coquille-Bandon and the Oregon Coast highways. The project is scheduled for completion by early summer.

The second project calls for construction of two bridges over the middle fork of the Coquille River and grading and oiling of 0.46 mile of roadway on new alignment on the Rock Creek Section of the Coos Bay-Roseburg Highway, about 29 miles southeast of Coquille. This project is scheduled for completion in the fall of 1964.

Hatfield Plans Nationwide Tour

SALEM (UPI) — Gov. Mark Hatfield will leave Jan. 30 for a nine-day, cross country speaking tour.

He will travel to Los Angeles Jan. 30 to deliver a UCLA commencement address.

He then will fly to Detroit to address the National Auto Dealers Association, and meet with auto industry leaders concerning the possibility of establishing assembly facilities in Oregon.

At Columbus, Ohio, Hatfield will meet with officials of the Fattelle Memorial Research Institute.

He will then travel to Washington, D. C., where he is scheduled to address the president's prayer breakfast, and later appear at a Pentagon meeting.

He will go to Macon, Ga., to attend the Georgia State Junior Chamber of Commerce convention.

Lawyers Offer Ruby Appearance

DALLAS (UPI) — Jack Ruby's lawyers will offer the dapper strip club operator to the Warren Commission to explain his avenger role in the assassination of President John F. Kennedy.

"We offered Ruby to the FBI locally but they refused," J. H. Tonahill said, "I don't know why."

Tonahill said Ruby would submit to a "truth serum" — sodium pentathol — for the testimony before the federal commission, headed by Chief Justice Earl Warren.

In return, Tonahill said, he expected copies of the FBI and Warren Commission reports to be used in the defense of Ruby. The lawyer said he would go into federal court, if necessary, to get the reports.

Ruby, 32, dashed before national television cameras Nov. 24 and shot Lee Harvey Oswald, accused of slaying Kennedy. Murder with malice charges were filed against Ruby when Oswald died a short while later at Parkland Hospital, the same place where President Kennedy was pronounced dead two days earlier.

Tonahill said he and Melvin Belli, chief defense lawyer from San Francisco, both believe the FBI and Warren Commission reports will contain good defensive material "and we are entitled to it under several Supreme Court decisions."

The defense lawyer said copies of all reports connected with the assassination would be sought. Texas Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr and Dallas Dist. Atty. Henry Wade have made reports connected with the events of Nov. 22-24.

Umpqua College Enrollment Gains

Enrollment in Umpqua Community College classes is climbing steadily as the winter term gets under way.

According to a report today from Ralph Snyder, registrar, sign-up to date is 87 with more persons than ever before enrolling for fulltime work. Thirty persons are now taking three or more courses and the number of students in the one-class category has also hit a new high of 39.

Tonight is the last night to register without penalty for two more classes. Beginning at 7 o'clock are courses in History of Western Civilization, taught by Eugene Antley, and Principles of Economics, with Man He You of Korea as instructor. On Thursday night, beginning classes will be held in English Composition and General Biology.

Friday at 5 p.m. is the deadline for all registration. Those still planning to enroll may register at the business office at Roseburg High School. The one remaining class in the week is that of Music Appreciation which will be taught Fridays beginning at 7 p.m. at Fremont Junior High School. All other classes will be held at the high school.

Tippit's Widow To Receive Medal

NORTH PORT CHARLOTTE, Fla. (UPI) — The National Police Officers Association said Tuesday it will award posthumously its Medal of Honor to a Dallas policeman slain while trying to question the accused killer of President Kennedy.

The widow of patrolman J. D. Tippit will accept the award in a special ceremony here Jan. 17, according to Lt. Gerald S. Arenberg, resident director of the police museum and hall of fame.

Tippit was shot down last Nov. 22 when he attempted to stop Lee Harvey Oswald on a Dallas street shortly after Kennedy was killed from ambush.

Arenberg said Mrs. Tippit would be presented the medal, highest honor accorded by the Police Officers Association.

Council Sets Swim Pool Bid Opening

Bids on a project of renovating Roseburg Municipal Pool will be opened at 2 p.m. Thursday in the city administrative building.

This will be a re-run for city officials. Bids were opened a few weeks ago on the same project but the City Council rejected all proposals because they were too high.

City administrators and the engineering firm immediately went into a huddle and came up with a trimmed-down project which they hope will be within the funds available.

The Park and Playground Commission will review the bids at a meeting slated for 4 p.m. in the city manager's office.

The commission will also review sprinkler system bids for Legion Field, go over the Park Department's winter work schedule and discuss expansion of the deck area on the south side of the swimming pool, reports Robert Norton, chairman.

Selection of a landscape architect for a "Stewart Park site development plan" will also be discussed.

Youth New King Of Insomniacs

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (UPI) — Seventeen-year-old Randy Gardner became king of the insomniacs early today and promptly celebrated by checking in for a final physical test and an afternoon of "sleeping, just sleeping."

Family Of Five Flees East Berlin

BERLIN (UPI) — Members of an East Berlin family of five who slid down a rope to freedom said today they escaped through the only window they know of that had not been bricked up by Communist police.

They said they owed their escape to a big double bed.

The family fled Tuesday night from their third floor flat in an apartment house that stands on the border overlooking an American sector street.

They told the story happily, although the 50-year-old mother broke her ankle escaping.

And the double bed of Mrs. Friedrich Motters was the cause of it all.

When they moved into the apartment house on the border of the American sector's Kreuzberg district 15 years ago there was only one corner in the flat where they could properly fit their big double bed. That corner had a window overlooking Luckauer Platz in West Berlin and they papered the window over.

After the wall went up Aug. 13, 1961, Eastern police bricked up the windows of all houses fronting on the border to prevent tenants from escaping down ropes to the West Berlin streets below.

They bricked up all the windows in the flat of the Motters family, too, except the one that had been papered over.

"It looked like the rest of the wall and the police did not know there was a window behind the wallpaper," said Motters, a 56-year-old contractor. "We did not tell them. We knew that was our escape hatch."

The family—Motters, his wife Helen, and sons Wolfgang, 24, Peter, 14, and Michael, 9—decided they had to use the hatch when they were informed they soon would be evicted and moved to a home inside East Berlin.

The decision was made. Within three hours, the five members of the family dropped into West Berlin Tuesday night on a rope lowered from their apartment along the anti-refugee wall. All reached safety.

Waiting to receive them was Bernhard, who has been living in West Germany for 10 years since he fled the Communist sector before the wall went up and travel restrictions were tightened. He had been visiting his family when he suggested the escape.

After the decision to flee was made, Bernhard had returned to West Berlin. It was 5 p.m. He contacted police and firemen who mustered a small force of ambulance and medics

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LBJ Urges Fast Action On 'Rights'

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Johnson, asking for an end to bitter quarrels between the North and South, urged Congress today to act now on pending civil rights legislation.

Reminding Congress that time is short and its agenda long, Johnson called on members to begin work now so that the session will be remembered as one which "did more for civil rights than the last hundred sessions combined."

Johnson's State of the Union message proposed no new amendments to the broad civil rights bill now before the House Rules Committee. Instead, woven through his speech, the President repeated his intention of carrying out the provisions of the measure.

Outskirts Of Hope
