

# Oakland Oaks Topple Sutherland In Non-Loop Tilt

Building a solid lead in the first half, the Oakland Oaks romped to a hard-fought 59-52 non-league hoop win over the host Sutherland Bulldogs Tuesday.

The Oaks got off to a fast start hitting the hoop on better than half their shots in the first half. Oakland broke into the lead early in the game and held a 19-11 advantage at the first break, then went on to lead 39-22 by the halftime intermission.

Sutherland rallied in the third quarter to cut seven points of the Oaks' lead, then moved three points closer in the final stanza. The Bulldogs employed a full court press in the fourth quarter which bothered the Oaks. However, the losers had trouble hitting the shots close in after taking the ball away from the invaders.

The Bulldogs hit 17 of 57 field goal attempts, while the winning Oaks swished 25 of 57 tries from the field. The lanky Oaks held a 40-32 edge on the boards.

## Two New Grid Bowl Games Are Approved

NEW YORK (UPI)—Two new bowl games came into existence today and from the hothouse attitude of most football fans, they would have settled for one good five-cent cigar.

Conditional approval of a Mayor's Trophy Bowl game in New York City and a Tobacco Bowl game in North Carolina next December by the National Collegiate Athletic Association Tuesday was greeted by the greatest rash of indifference imaginable.

"Just what we need," commented one veteran athletic director at the NCAA convention. "We've got 14 bowl games already and three of them didn't even bother operating this season."

Even so, promoters for four other bowl games put in their bids with the NCAA's extra-events committee in the hope of being certified for 1965.

The four hopefuls represented the Mile High Bowl in Denver, the Auto Bowl in Detroit, the Indian Bowl in Phoenix and the West Side Civic Club Bowl in Cedar Rapids, Iowa.

Those four bowls are a long way from fruition but if the NCAA's conditions are met, the Mayor's Trophy Bowl game will be played in New York, Dec. 19, 1964, and the Tobacco Bowl game will be played in the Raleigh-Durham-Wake Forest area on the same day.

James R. (Bud) Jack, director of athletics at the University of Utah and chairman of the NCAA's extra-events committee which certifies all bowl games, said the condition for each game is that the respective promoters must deposit other bowl games put in their bids with the NCAA's extra-events committee in the hope of being certified for 1965.

## Black Is Cinderella Of Today's Pro Golf

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (UPI)—If the clock doesn't strike midnight too soon Jim Black can turn out to be the Cinderella kid of professional golf.

Black is the 21-year-old golfer who was the sensation of the Los Angeles Open, where he finished in a tie with Julius Boros, the National Open champion for 1959. Each collected \$1,550.

To the young Negro ex-caddy it must have seemed like a fortune. And like Cinderella, everything in the future looks beautiful.

Black, who is married and has three children, left his native Charlotte, N.C., home with a bus ticket and 25 cents in his pocket last summer and headed for New York.

He caddied there all summer, then like so many before him, took the \$500 he had saved and rode west to seek his fortune.

**Slow Start**  
He tried his luck in a couple of small Southern California tournaments with no success. Then along came the Los Angeles Open qualifying and he won a spot in the rich event.

Instead of being awed by the big name pros, the likable young man stood right up to them and when night fell the first day he was tied for the lead.

Instead of folding completely under the expected pressure, he played near par golf the rest of the way to win the big check.

Black won't be appearing in the San Diego Open because he isn't eligible for it. He does not have a PGA-approved player card yet and he didn't make an application to the San Diego tournament directors.

But he is going to apply for a PGA card—and then he is going to hit golf's golden trail.

**Family Coming West**  
With the \$1,550 he won he is moving his family to California. And the future looks bright.

There was a wealthy Negro funeral director from Chicago in the crowd when Jim shot his sensational first round 67.

The man, Lavernon Cornelius, was so impressed with the way Black played in the tournament that he is going to sponsor the young man.

"He's going to give me \$10,000 a year for three years," said Black. "That ought to be enough time to prove if I have what it takes to be a successful touring professional."

Black hits a long, straight ball off the tee and approached and putted real well in the Los Angeles Open.

**First Big Tournament**  
"It was the first big tournament I ever played in," he said. "My closest connection with pros before was when I caddied once for the late Clayton Heffner."

The pros who played the last round with Black, Dow Finsterwald and Tommy Jacobs, described Jim as a "real nice boy."

But they saw some flaws in his game. Mainly he uses the interlocking grip that was popularized a half-century ago by Gene Sarazen.

"It's a bad grip," said Jacobs.

"I admit that he hurts when I hit a bad shot," confesses Jim.

But if Black learns to handle it as well as Sarazen did, then the golf world has another champion.
