

Peters, Jim Jarvis Pace Beavers Win

HONOLULU (UPI) — Frank Peters led all scorers for the Beavers connected on his first six shots from the floor Tuesday night to lead Oregon State to an easy 71-55 victory over Hawaii.

The Beavers, here for a three game series, were never in trouble, holding a 34-23 lead at halftime.

The Beavers pulled away in the second half and led by as much as 21 points, 59-38, when Randy Rothman dropped in a rebound with 8:45 remaining.

Big Mel Counts, playing only about 30 minutes of the game, scored 13. The seven-foot Counts spent most of the evening feeding his teammates. He picked off 13 rebounds.

The Beavers hit on 31 of 84 field shots for the night. Roy Walker led Hawaii with 15 points.

Hawaii coach Red Rocha, a former star at Oregon State in the late 1940s, described the Beavers as "real tough."

"They're so well rounded — they can hit from any place on the court. If you make a mistake, they'll run you through."

When asked about Counts, Rocha commented, "he's amazing."

Rocha went on to say, "we were sending everybody at him whenever he had the ball, but he only lost it about two or three times all night."

The same two teams meet Saturday night. The Beavers play the Armed Forces all-stars on Friday night.

Mat Action Set Thursday In UVL Play

Prep wrestling action on the local scene will find the six Umpqua Valley League teams competing in their first conference matches Thursday.

In the opening round of the UVL the Sutherlin Bulldogs will be at Douglas to face the Trojans, the Glendale Wildcats will invade Riddle to clash with the Irish and the Myrtle Creek Vikings will be entertained by the Glendale Pirates. Action in the three dual meets will start at 6:30 p.m.

The Pirates of Glendale and the Wildcats of Glendale are ranked as the top teams in the UVL, with Glendale currently boasting three wins over A-1 opponents. Douglas and Sutherlin are ranked as dark-horse contenders, while Riddle and Myrtle Creek appear to lack the over-all team strength needed to capture league honors in dual meet competition.

The six UVL teams are preparing for the league meet which will be held Feb. 22.

Boasting three consecutive Emerald League victories, the Drain Warriors will be out to make it four in a row Thursday when they host the Junction City Tiger matmen at 7:30 p.m.

Drain is competing in wrestling for its second year.

In addition to the conference matches, the Douglas Trojans will compete in the Friday and Saturday Philomath Invitational Tournament, and Sutherlin will be at Oakland for a dual meet with the Oakers at 1:30 p.m.

Finley Plans Move For 'A's'

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (UPI) — Kansas City Athletics owner Charles O. Finley set up shop in Convention Center today to prepare for moving the A's franchise here, despite strong opposition from other club owners.

The determined Finley signed a contract Monday with the Commonwealth of Kentucky for the use of the Kentucky State Fairgrounds Stadium by his major league team for the 1964 and 1965 seasons.

The contract was signed after negotiations for leasing Municipal Stadium at Kansas City fell through.

Finley, with members of his "front office" crew from Kansas City, inspected the newly renovated Convention Center in downtown Louisville Tuesday.

"This is where we'll sell tickets," he said.

But before the ticket-selling can get underway, Finley must have the approval of seven of the 10 American League club owners for the move. At present he has only one certain vote—his own.

Portland's Pilots Edge Ducks 61-58

PORTLAND (UPI)—Sam Coston's lay-in and two free throws by Ken Falkner in the final one-half minute gave the Portland Pilots a 61-58 basketball win over the Oregon Ducks Tuesday night.

Coston stole the ball from Elliott Gleason and scored with 20 seconds left and Falkner made his points with five seconds remaining.

The decision gave the Pilots a 7-3 record and left the Ducks with a 2-6 mark.

Cincy Powell and Falkner each scored 16 points and Tom Nichols tallied 12 for Portland.

For Oregon, Jim Johnson made 24, Steve Jones had 13 and Jim Barnett added 12.

The Pilots made 24 of 63 field goal attempts for a .381 percentage and the Ducks hit 22 of 73 shots from the floor for a .301 mark.

Oregon held a 54-50 edge in rebounding. Steve Anstett and Powell of Portland each had 13 rebounds and Johnson made 12 recoveries.

'Knox Death' Report Made

BALTIMORE, Md. (UPI) — The state of Maryland, faced with an alternative of abolishing professional boxing, today considered six recommendations made by a grand jury investigating the Oct. 16 ring death of Ernie Knox.

The jury urged the state to enact tighter regulations for control of boxing after reporting that "no fraud" was found in the Knox death.

Knox weighed 178 for a bout with Wayne Bethea last Oct. 14. When he died two days later as a result of ring injuries, doctors said the body weighed only 153 pounds. The jury, however, failed to find evidence of a criminal nature and said it was satisfied "Knox did weigh as he was represented to weigh at the time of the fight."

To prevent a similar recurrence, the grand jury suggested that all weigh-ins be held only on officials' scales of the state Athletic Commission and examining physicians or a member of the commission directly supervise the ceremony.

The jury also recommended: —That participants undergo complete clinical-type pre-flight medical examinations with each test phase recorded.

—That fighters sign affidavits basis for denying promoter licenses to individual partnership or members of a corporation.

—That fighters sign affidavits stating they do not suffer from physical diseases or injuries not listed in their "fight history."

—That the Athletic Commission have full authority to prevent a fighter from appearing in a match unless it is completely convinced he is physically qualified to participate in prize fights.

—That prior to licensing of exhibitions, promoters be required to file with the commission a ring history of a fighter and the results of each fight listed, a detailed medical history of the fighter and a fee to pay the cost of pre-flight commission examinations.
