Gifford Joins East Squad As Pro Bowl Test Nears

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Seasoned pro Frank Gifford of the New York Giants joined the East squad today in a practice session for Sunday's Pro Bowl game at the Memorial Coliseum — the National Football League's battle of All-Stars.

Gifford was named Thursday to fill a vacancy created on Coach Allie Sherman's team because of a twisted knee suffered by flanker Buddy Dial.

Dial, who was traded from the Pittsburgh Steelers to Dallas at the season's end, was sent to his Houston home for

treatment of his injury incurred in practice Thursday.

Dial will be replaced in the starting lineup by Bobby Mitchell of the Washington Redskins. St. Louis' 25-year-old quarterback Charley Johnson will head the starting backfield for the East, which also includes fullback Jim Brown of the Cleveland Browns and halfback Tim Brown of the Philadelphia Eagles.

West Coach George Halas Thursday nominated veteran Johnny Unitas of the Baltimore Colts as his starting quarterback, but added that he will alternate his own Chicago Bear signal-caller, Billy Wade, with Unitas, quarter by quarter.

Unitas, awarded the Pro Bowl's George Halas Trophy twice, will be backed by fullback Jim Taylor of the Green Bay Packers, halfback Tommy Mason of Minnesota and flanker Terry Barr of Detroit.

The West, coached for the first time by Halas, is rated a 6-2 point favorite.

Johnson, Serafin Win

Carl Johnson and Pete Serafin paced the members of the Roseburg Senior Rifle Club at the weekly shoot Wednesday.

Johnson and Serafin ended with identical 386 scores firing from four positions for a possible score of 400. However, Johnson earned top honors for the week by posting a higher score from the standing position.

Oregon State Faces 'Fast' All-Star Quintet In Hawaii

The Big Six basketball race warms up tonight when favored UCLA opens a two-game set with Southern California. Washington State comes calling on California, and Stanford hosts Washington.

The nationally first-ranked Bruins lead the conference with a 2-0 mark. Washington State, far has an 0-2 slate. The rest of the loop all have 1-1 records, and will be rooting for USC to dump the Bruins at least once this weekend.

The West Coast Athletic Conference also presents some big battles. Favored USC (1-0) hosts University of Pacific and St. Mary's tonight and Saturday.

San Jose State, considered the best threat to overhaul the Dons, is at Loyola tonight and Pepperdine Saturday. Loyola shares the WCAC lead with the Dons at the moment.

Nationally sixth-ranked Oregon State faces a dazzling array of all stars over in Hawaii when it tangles with the Hawaii Armed Forces League stars.

The latter team is led by Dick Markowitz, former George Washington ace, and LeRoy Jackson, a solid performer at Santa Clara the last three seasons.

Other games tonight include: Santa Barbara at Pepperdine, Cal Aggies at Chico State, California State at Humboldt State, Long Beach State at Fresno State, and San Diego State at Cal Poly of San Luis Obispo.

Action was light Thursday night, but the short, quick Gonzaga team rolled over Montana State, 100-83. Bill Wilson hit 30 points to push his season's average to better than 18 points per contest for the Bulldogs.
