Ramos Takes Step Toward New Title

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Featherweight champion Sugar Ramos moved a step closer to a lightweight title bout with Carlos Ortiz today after punching out a close, but unanimous, non-title decision Friday night over Vicente Derado of Argentina.

Matchmaker George Parnasus of the Olympic Auditorium announced he would offer the lightweight champion a \$60,000 guarantee to meet Ramos provided the Cuban featherweight fighter successfully defended his crown March 1 in Tokyo against Mitsunori Seki.

Derado gave Ramos an unexpectedly rugged tie in their nationally televised bout before a live audience of 8,100. The South American was especially effective when he pinned Ramos on the ropes and sent a hailstorm of blows against the favorite.

Beavers Fall To All-Stars

HONOLULU (UPI)—The Armed Forces All-Stars of the Hawaiian Armed Forces Senior Invitational League handed sixth-ranked Oregon State a 69-65 setback Friday night before 4,000 fans at Pearl Harbor's Bloch Arena.

The exhibition clash had a nip and tuck affair all the way with Oregon State enjoying no more than a six-point edge during any phase of the game.

Coach Kiyoshi (Knuckles) Matsuo's all-stars enjoyed the widest margin of the game with 13:45 left to play, 48-40. Oregon State led at halftime, 33-32.

The game was tied 11 times and the lead changed hands 20 times.

Trailing by a 65-64 count, the all-stars moved in front to stay on Dick Markowitz' layup with 1:15 remaining in the game for a 65-65 edge.

Donald Snyder and Bert Rickner followed with free throws in the final seconds to make it 68-65.

Mel Counts, Oregon's seven-foot center, took individual honors for the game with 38 points on 16 field goals in 29 attempts from the floor. He was 6-for-10 on the foul line.

Markowitz, former star at George Washington, topped the all-stars with 20 markers.

Oregon State concludes its Hawaii visit with a game against the University of Hawaii tonight at Civic Auditorium.

Roseburg's Jim Jarvis had three baskets for six points. Peters had seven.

West's Pros Are Favored

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—The favored West All-Stars will aim for victory Sunday afternoon in the 14th annual Pro Bowl and thereby complete a sweep of 1963 post-season honors for the Western Division of the National Football League.

West Coach George Halas directed his Chicago Bears to the NFL championship and the Green Bay Packers won the runner-up bowl, and as Halas points out, a win in the Memorial Coliseum Sunday would give the West a "clean sweep."

A crowd of about 60,000 was expected to pour into the massive coliseum for the nationally televised (ABC) game. Kickoff is 1 p.m. PST. Some 50,000 general admission seats go on sale Sunday morning and the place should be swarming with kids.

One adult purchasing a general admission ticket can get five youngsters under 13 years of age in free.

The starting quarterbacks are Charley Johnson of the St. Louis Cardinals for the East and veteran Johnny Unitas of the Baltimore Colts for the West.

The city of Baltimore is hardly in the Western part of the United States and St. Louis is much closer to being a part of the "West," but the loyalties of the two signal-callers are not likely to be confused.

East Coach Allie Sherman of the New York Giants has Washington Redskins Norman Snead ready to relieve Johnson. Likewise, Halas has his own Bill Wade ready to step into the second quarter of action to spell Unitas.

Sherman has had to make offensive plans with his New York Giant Ace, Y. A. Tittle, whose knee, injured in the NFL championship game, kept him from the Pro Bowl.

Earlier this week, flanker Buddy Dial twisted his knee in practice and was sent home, but Sherman was able to add eager Frank Gifford, a money player of long standing, to the squad.

Steelhead Runs Rising Steadily

Summer steelhead runs in the Umpqua River, given a boost by artificial production since 1956, have shown a steady rise in number since that time.

Jerry Bauer, district fishery biologist for the game commission at Roseburg, said final counts of the summer run passing Winchester dam show just over 4,800 summer steelhead moved over the counting boards during the summer months, the second highest total count ever made.

Records show that since the start of the game commission's program to bolster this run, the number of fish has built steadily from the average of 2,000 fish per year to the near 5,000 fish run of this year.

Bauer also said that the angler's catch of summer steelhead has increased in the Umpqua River, with the annual catch since 1957 well over double what it was prior to that time. Previously, he said, anglers were taking from three to five hundred summer steelhead a season, as compared to 600 to well over 900 steelhead beginning with the first hatchery returns of 1958. Hatchery-marked fish have made up from 25 to 45 per cent of the catch.

Vikings Win Thriller By Point Over Riddle

Myrtle Creek's Vikings were forced down to the wire before pulling out a thrilling 46-45 victory over the determined Riddle Irish Friday.

The game marked the opening of the Umpqua Valley League title chase for both teams, and was the ninth victory for the Vikings in 12 starts. Myrtle Creek managed to hold the lead all the way in the fracas at Riddle, but the margin was never comfortable as it varied from one to seven points.

Employing a full court press throughout the game, the Irish gave the winners fits. In the hectic closing seconds Mike Markham stole the ball from the Viks and drove for a layup in which cut the lead to a mere one point.

During the ensuing action Bob Beanblossom was fouled by the Irish. When the Viking ace missed both chances at the free throw marker, the Irish came up with the rebound and a long desperation shot as the final buzzer sounded was way off the mark.

Wall Leads At San Diego

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (UPI)—You can't tell the leaders with or without a scorecard in the \$30,000 San Diego Open golf tournament today.

The nominal leader should be Art Wall, who has a 36-hole score of 136 after shooting a 65 Friday.

But 42 players were caught on the course by darkness Friday night and among them was Bob Rosburg, the first-day leader with a 66.

Wall is four under par after 36 holes. Rosburg, who had to quit play after 12 holes, was five under after 30 holes of play. Rosburg could par in the rest of the way and regain the lead.

He'll get that chance bright and early this morning—around 8:30 a.m. if jack frost doesn't return to the Rancho Bernardo course. It was frost on the greens Friday morning that delayed start of play two hours and caused the 42 men to be trapped in by nightfall.

Meanwhile, Wall was enjoying his time in the spotlight.

"I guess that was the best round I've shot in a year," said the former Masters champion who has won 10 tournaments during his career.

He finished with four straight birdies — reminiscent of the time he birdied five out of the last six holes to capture the Masters in 1959.

Right behind Wall after 36 holes came Bruce Crampton of Australia, one of the tour's most consistent performers; and rookie George Archer, towering young man from San Francisco. They each shot 68s for 137 totals.

Next in line among the men who were able to complete 36 holes came Ray Floyd, the 1963 "rookie of the year" who also fired a 65 for a 138; Mason Rudolph, who had a 66 for 139, and Dow Finsterwald who had 71 for the same score.

Markham provided the Irish with most of their offense, hitting for a grand total of 25 points on 10 field goals and five of eight free throws. Gary Paetz added 10 points.

Myrtle Creek featured a well balanced attack as Tony Quinn and Jerry Willson each collected 12 points, while Bob Fuller and Larry Pringle each accounted for 11 points.

The Vikings won the game at the foul line where they sank 14 of 23 shots, while making only 16 of 46 from the field. Riddle bucketed 18 of 54 field goal attempts and added nine of 17 at the foul line. The Irish outrebounded the taller invaders, 34-24.

Myrtle Creek's Jayvees won the preliminary game, 45-29.
