

South Eugene Center Tops 5-A-1 Scorers

South Eugene's John Pinkstaff got off to a fast start in the race for the Midwestern League scoring crown by sinking 50 points in the first two encounters.

Pinkstaff's 25 points-per-game average gives him a five point-per-game lead over his nearest competitor after the first weekend of play.

NBA All-Star Game On Tap

BOSTON (UPI) — New blizzard conditions delayed — and possibly snowed out — some of the top basketball players on their way here for tonight's National Basketball Association All-Star game.

Alternate transportation plans were made and the game was expected to go on as scheduled.

A few of the players arrived in time for Monday night's banquet. However, officials said 18 present and past stars, who were to participate in the two-day event, were stranded by weather in Chicago and eight others were held up in St. Louis.

NBA President Walter Kennedy said if a sufficient number of All-Stars failed to show up by game time, the world champion Boston Celtics will meet those All-Stars who arrive here.

Some All-Star exhibitions may be staged primarily for the television audience, but not so in the NBA where everything is strictly for blood.

The mere presence of the NBA's currently most successful coaches, Red Auerbach of the Boston Celtics and Fred Schaus of the Los Angeles Lakers, virtually assures the 14th All-Star game here tonight will be an all-out affair.

There's no difference in the take-home pay or the expense allowances to winners and losers. But to players like Bill Russell, Walt Bellamy, Oscar Robertson and Wilt Chamberlain, that makes not a particle of difference.

Auerbach, 5-3 in his eight seasons as Eastern coach, thereupon named three members of his own five-time champions to the East starting lineup. They included unanimous-choice Russell at center, veteran Tom Heinsohn in the corner, and Sam Jones in the backcourt. The opening five also will include Cincinnati's Oscar Robertson and rookie Jerry Lucas.

Western Coach Schaus had a problem. Two of the top five Western vote-getters were centers, Baltimore's Walt Bellamy was the squad's only unanimous choice while perennial leader Wilt Chamberlain of San Francisco finished fourth.

Schaus, basing his decision on Bellamy's vote victory, named the Baltimore pivot to the starting center job.

Beyond that complication, Schaus said he would have his own twosome, Jerry West and Elgin Baylor, the veteran St. Louis Hawk star Bob Pettit and San Francisco's Guy Rodgers on the court for the opening tap-off.

While Pinkstaff operates from the post position for the Axemen, the runner-up after one weekend is a guard — Gary Bates of Springfield. Bates totaled 40 points in the first two games for a 20 points-per-game average.

Completing the top five in league scoring are: Ken Lathen, Sheldon; Glen Campbell Thurston; Ron Caderette, Marshfield; and Chuck Olds, Cottage Grove.

Roseburg's leading point-maker in league action is guard-forward Bob McKee. McKee bucketed 27 points in the two loop counters to boast a 13.5 points-per game average for the Indians. Also among the top 15 scorers in league play for the Tribe is Gary Heeter with 25 points and Bruce O'Neil with 23.

Upsets marked the first weekend of 5-A-1 competition, with Sheldon and Marshfield emerging as the only undefeated teams in conference action, with six teams tied for third place with identical 1-1 records.

Friday's round of Midwestern League play this week will find Willamette at Roseburg, Cottage Grove at North Bend, Marshfield at North Eugene, Thurston at Sheldon and South Eugene at Springfield.

Saturday Roseburg will be at Thurston, North Bend at South Eugene, North Eugene at Willamette, Springfield at Marshfield and Sheldon at Cottage Grove.

Substitution Ruling Okayed By NCAA

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (UPI)—The NCAA Rules Committee took its cue from the booming popularity of pro football and voted to allow wholesale substitution in college games next year.

In several rules changes which brought smiles from college coaches pressing hard to pep up the game and cut down on injuries, the group approved free substitution on any down when the clock is stopped—with one exception.

That's when an official calls a timeout to remove an injured player from the field and is to prevent "faking it" to get subs in the game.

The committee, which winds up a three-day meeting Monday, also voted to allow two players from either team to enter the game on any down while the clock is running before the ball is put into play.

The two changes are both big and surprising. Although college coaches and fans had been pressing for the new orders, it had been rumored that no drastic changes would be made by the rules makers.

The changes throw out last season's rules which said wholesale substitution could only be used on second and third down while the clock was stopped. They also erased another rule last year which stipulated two "wildcard players" could be shuttled in and out only on fourth down, or on first down when the ball changed hands.

While the old "wildcard" rule allowed coaches to get their punters and quarterbacks in and out as the ball changed hands, the rule replacing it will allow more flexibility for substituting on any down without calling for a timeout to make shuttles.

Williamson said the two-man rule would also cut down on injuries by allowing fatigued players to get out of the game without a timeout.

And with safety in mind, the committee also voted two other big changes into the rule book: —To boot any player out of a game if he "maliciously uses his helmet or head to butt or ram an opponent's head, neck or face."

—To cut down on dangerous runbacks of punts and kickoffs after a fair catch is called.

The first of these has been in the making for a long time and, according to the committee, will give referees a hammer with which to enforce more flagrant and dangerous

AL Facing Legal Battle Involving Move Of KC 9

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Organized baseball may get more than it bargained for when the American League meets in New York Thursday to consider Charles O. Finley's proposal to move his Kansas City Athletics to Louisville, Ky.

In addition to baseball men, a good sized coterie of national to back Kansas City's efforts to retain the team. Sens. Thurston lawmakers may be on hand to watch, and possibly participate, in the deliberations.

Finley signed a contract last week to move the Athletics to Louisville when he was unable to come to terms with Kansas City officials on a new lease. Several American League owners have voiced their disapproval of Finley's action, and Finley has threatened to cause trouble if the other owners block his move to Louisville.

Sen. Stuart Symington, D-Mo., and Sen. James B. Pearson, R-Kan., plan to be present. B. Morton and John Sherman Cooper, Kentucky Republicans, are expected to back the proposal to move the team to Louisville.

Besides the senators, assorted House members from both states may attend the league meeting.

Brings Out Jitters
Baseball men get jittery when government officials take too close an interest in their affairs. They have a great deal at stake — such as whether the game is a sport or a business.

It's the doubt created by that question that will keep Missouri's junior senator, Democrat Edward V. Long, away from the meeting. Long sits on the Senate anti-trust subcommittee

which might be asked some day to consider bringing baseball under the Sherman and Clayton Acts.

In fact, there is a bill pending in the subcommittee now that baseball men want passed. It would treat the big four of professional sports — baseball, hockey, football and basketball — equally as sports. It would exempt them from the anti-trust laws in four categories:

—Equalization of competition (the player drafts).

—Employment, selection of eligibility of players or the reservation, selection or assignment of player contracts (the heart of the old reserve-clause controversy in baseball).

—The right to make agreements for exclusive operation within specific geographic areas (exclusive franchises).

Preserve Confidence
—Preservation of public confidence in sports contests (the right to discipline players for gambling, rules infractions, misconduct, etc.).

Currently, baseball operates joyously under various Supreme Court rulings which say it is a sport. But football does not. The bill would treat all the

But legislation could be made that operation of all the sports is business. In fact, Pearson said, perhaps only half facetiously:

"We may go up there with anti-trust bills sticking out of our pockets, with just the title showing."

But these considerations, apparently don't concern either Kansas City Mayor Irlus Davis, Kentucky Gov. Edward T. (Ned) Breathitt, or Louisville Mayor, William O. Cowger. All enlisted the aid of their congressional representatives.
