

One Man Still Unaccounted For In Crash Of Air Force Bomber

CUMBERLAND, Md. (UPI)—The body of a crewman missing since the crash of a Strategic Air Command (SAC) B52 jet bomber was found today near Grantsville, Md., about 25 miles southwest of here. One crewman of the five aboard remains unaccounted for.

Board Considers Building Needs

Anticipated growth needs of Winston-Dillard School District 116 were projected by the building committee at a meeting of the school board held Tuesday night at the Winston school. According to Phebe McGuire, correspondent, all recommendations made by the committee were taken under advisement by the board.

In its report, the committee said that six additional classrooms would be needed at Lookingglass School and that there would be need also for a new junior high school at Winston. Also recommended was the purchase of 10 additional acres of land adjoining present property owned by the district in the Community Park area with an eye to future school construction. Paving at the junior high school was also recommended. Abner Rice Jr. is chairman of the building committee.

The board denied a request by Hult Lumber Co. for permission to gravel a portion of land at Dillard School and use the area for parking company trucks. The noise factor plus the need for school patron parking figured in denial of the request, Mrs. McGuire reported.

A student living with relatives other than parents who live elsewhere was given permission to continue attendance at Douglas High School and another request for attendance under similar circumstances was taken under advisement.

Eddie Fisher Must Make Next Move To Free Liz

PUERTO VALLARTA, Mexico (UPI)—Legal experts said today it is up to singer Eddie Fisher to make the next move in the breakup of his marriage to Elizabeth Taylor.

Miss Taylor filed suit for divorce here Tuesday, saying she and her husband have lived apart for more than a year without his taking any action to terminate the marriage. Under Mexican law, this is grounds for divorce.

Judge Arcadio Estrada Quinones, who granted a divorce last month to Mrs. Richard Burton, wife of the Welsh actor who is waiting in the wings to marry Miss Taylor, said Fisher may now:

- 1. Declare personally or through an attorney that he does not wish to contest the divorce. If he does so, a decree could be granted in a matter of weeks.
- 2. Contest the divorce, which

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Conviction Of Billie Sol Upheld By Appeals Court

AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI)—A Texas court of criminal appeals today upheld the conviction of Billie Sol Estes on swindle charges and ruled he must serve eight years in the state penitentiary.

The three-judge court upheld the verdict of a jury at Tyler, Tex., in a 22-page unanimous decision. Estes, former agriculture tycoon from Pecos, Tex., was charged specifically with swindling a farmer, T. J. Wilson, in a \$94,000 deal involving anhydrous ammonia fertilizer tanks.

New Riddle Ordinance Regulates Fumigation

At the regular meeting of Riddle City Council held this week at the City Hall, council members passed an ordinance regulating the fumigation of buildings and structures within the city.

According to Erma Best, correspondent, the ordinance states a permit must be secured prior to fumigation and all buildings to be fumigated must be clearly posted both as to the activity itself and time for safe re-entry. Violation of this ordinance is a misdemeanor punishable by either fine or imprisonment or both.

In other action, the council approved a liquor license for the Emar Corp. for the Riddle Supperette.

Mayor Virgil Nading explained to Riddle Garden Club members, present at the meeting, the procedure now underway for a cleanup of vacant city lots. The club had voted at its last meeting to investigate city policy on cleanup of lots, Mrs. Best reports.

Riddle Firemen Douse Fires At Mill, Garage

Fires Sunday afternoon and early Tuesday morning called out the Riddle Volunteer Fire Department. Both fires were beyond control when the siren sounded, according to Erma Best, correspondent.

The Sunday fire shortly after noon destroyed a garage at the Donald Powell place on Riddle - Canyonville hill road. The building and contents which included shop tools and a 1950 Chevrolet pickup, represented a loss of approximately \$3,500, according to Ed Mahoney, Riddle fire chief. Cause of the fire has not been determined.

Tuesday morning at 4:55 the alarm was sounded for a fire at the old Stomar mill office which was totally destroyed. Three pieces of fire equipment were called into action to subdue the flames, Mrs. Best said.

Kenneth Wallingford, round-the-clock watchman, who had his living quarters in the former office, was asleep at the time the fire broke out. He barely escaped with his life, losing all of his personal possessions, even his glasses, according to Ivan Puz, assistant fire chief. Cause of the fire has not been determined. Insurance was carried on the building.

Home Nursing Classes Enrollment Still Open

Additional enrollment is being taken in the Red Cross home nursing classes. Registration started this week and continues through Jan. 22. Registration may be made by calling the Red Cross chapter office at Room 417, Pacific Building.

The classes are being conducted by Mrs. William H. Baker, home nursing instructor, recently of Medford. This is a 15-hour course, 2½ hours once a week for six weeks. Separate classes will be held on Mondays and Wednesdays from 7 to 9:30 p.m. and on Tuesdays from 9:30 a.m. to noon.

There is no charge, except for textbooks at \$1.25. Classes will be held in the chapter office. The course covers the complete home nursing procedures for care of the sick and injured.

More Rain Forecast

The five-day weather forecast for Western Oregon according to the Weather Bureau station at the Roseburg airport calls for temperatures averaging near or a little below normal with highs mostly in the 40's and lows in the 30's. Precipitation is expected to be more than normal and in the form of recurring rain.

FORT WORTH (UPI)—Mrs. Marguerite Oswald, battling to wipe the assassin's brand from her dead son, said Tuesday she had hired New York attorney Mark Lane to represent him before the Warren Commission.

Lane, often involved in civil liberties cases, confirmed he would represent Lee Harvey Oswald's interests and said he had told Chief Justice Earl Warren, head of the commission, he would do so.

At a news conference in her home, Mrs. Oswald also said she had not seen her Russian-born daughter-in-law, Mrs. Marina Oswald, since last Thanksgiving.

Research Agency In New Quarters

The Roseburg unit of the Pacific Northwest Forest and Range Experiment Station has moved to new quarters in the Federal Building.

Formerly located on the fourth floor of the Pacific Building, the research agency now has its offices in the newly remodeled basement of the Federal Building. Its facilities include three offices for staff personnel, a lab room, reception room and library.

Bill Hallin, project leader for the unit, said administrative activities will be centered in the new quarters. Most of the unit's experimental work is carried on at greenhouse facilities on Garden Valley Boulevard.

The research unit was formerly known as the Roseburg Research Center but was renamed as result of a nationwide reorganization of the research branch of the U. S. Forest Service.

Auto Accident Puts Driver In Hospital

The condition of Theodore Jack Stanton, 32, of Route 4, Box 1107, Roseburg, was reported good today at Mercy Hospital, where he was taken following a two-car collision about four miles south of Roseburg Tuesday shortly after noon.

State police said the accident occurred on old Highway 99 at the turnout to Speedway racetrack.

A 1947 pickup, operated by Eddie Kent Brown of 2104 SW Austin Road, attempted to make a left turn onto the Speedway road, just as the car operated by Stanton attempted to pass.

Stanton's car after the collision continued south through the intersection, went off the left side of the highway and rolled over, according to police. Stanton was taken to the hospital by ambulance and his car had to be towed from the scene.

Traffic Safety Speaker Plans Roseburg Meet

Gasoline Theft Blamed For Fire

A gasoline theft is blamed in part for a vehicle fire which caused second degree burns on the hand of B. G. Fenwick, 577 N. E. Winchester St., Monday about 9:05 a.m.

Firemen were called to douse the blaze in the motor of the vehicle, a pickup truck.

City police, called to assist, report there was no one at the scene when firemen and police arrived. It was learned later that Fenwick had been taken to the hospital for treatment of his hand. The injury will cause him to be off work for a couple of weeks, he told officers.

Fenwick informed police he had filled his tank with gasoline the night before but when he tried to start his motor Monday morning it wouldn't start.

Not realizing he was out of gas, he checked his carburetor, then loosened a gas line to check further. When he learned his trouble he went to a service station for a can of fuel. The gas line was leaking and, as he attempted to tighten the connection, the fire ignited, apparently from static electricity, he said, burning his hand so severely he didn't attempt to put out the blaze. His wife took him immediately to the hospital.

Fire Station Bonds Redeemed By City

The city of Roseburg Tuesday redeemed the last remaining bonds on the West Side Fire Station.

Voters in 1954 authorized a \$50,000 bond issue for this facility. Redemption by the city of the remaining bonds wiped out the indebtedness, reports Bill Bladorn, city treasurer.

Bladorn pointed out the city's total tax supported indebtedness—even with the new bond issue for park and swimming pool improvements—is very low.

He listed municipal indebtedness at well under \$400,000. Legal debt limit for the city is \$1,800,000.

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
