Those interested in the development of intra-college sports as against specialization and too much attention to intercollegiate sports will be pleased to learn that exactly 105 different players have taken part in the 11 games already played in the league's schedule. Not more than 15 or 20 of these have even been trying for the first team squad, which is pretty clear evidence of the really valuable part played by the league in bringing out men who would othervise not participate in athletics.
