CORRESPONDENCE STUDY DEPARTMENT GROWS APACE

University Aims to Serrve People of State to Greatest Possible Extent. Dr. Leonard Director.

The Correspondence Study department promises next year to keep pace with the general growth expected by the University officials. It has been the constant aim of the Regents to make the University serve the people of the state to the fullest possible extent, and it was in keeping with this purpose that the Correspondence department was established in 1907. To the courses now offered, it is planned to add others as soon as resources will permit. A study of the list of courses offered now shows that many of the members of the taculty are giving some time to this department, and others will be added as soon as the number registering make it necessary. Dr. H. B. Leonard is resident director.

The courses offered are designed to be as nearly like the work given on the campus as possible. Besides general preparatory courses for entrance to the University, there are extensive college courses given in Mathematics, Economics, History, English Composition and Pedagogy. Atthough all subjects can not be taught efficiently by mail, experience has shown that those subjects where much written work is required of resident students lend themselves to effective long distance treatment.

AMENDMENTS PROPOSED TO A.S.U.O. CONSTITUTION

Members of Graduate School May Be Barred From Student Offices

Following the assembly addresses Wednesday, & short special meeting of the student body was held, in which two amendments to the constitution were proposed.

The first was to amend Article I, Section 2, to read as follows: All students of the Colleges of Literature, Science and Arts, and Engineering, are members of this Association. Members of the Graduate School are not eligible to elective offices in the Associated Students.

The next was to amend Art. III, Section 2. Where two or more candidates are to be elected, and the voter casts his vote for less than the number to be elected, that portion of his ballot shall be void.

The next assembly will be the last one held this year, and will be in charge of the alumni.
