254 ARTISTIC PAGES ARE CRAMMED FULL OF GOOD STUFF

Publication is Also a Financial Success. Talent of University Has All Contributed to Splendid Book.

The 1911 Oregana staff made good their previous threats and turned out the best annual in the history of the University. The two hundred and fifty-four pages are crammed full of interesting college dope, clever drawings and several hundred cuts depicting every possible phase of student life as it is at Oregon. Nor does the outside of the book make an any less attractive appearance. Bound in quarter leather, in green and gold, the Oregana is gotten up in style suitable for a gift book.

There is an original dedication in verse, commending the publication to a number of different interests. The seniors are represented by individual cuts and "pedigrees." There are clever verses characteristic of college folk, that would do credit to any publication. Some of the Varsity's best literary talent are contributors to the literary department. One of the bright features of the whole thing are the headings and thumb nail sketches. Miss Wade has contributed several drawings and clever headings, as have also Fritz Dean and J. Elwood Luckey.

The fun is witty, without being personal or cutting. The advertisements and boxing cards are particularly effective, as is the fake calendar. O.A.C. FINISHES FIRST IN NORTHWEST LEAGUE

WASHINGTON IS SECOND AND OREGON THIRD

Baseball Does Not Pay, But It Makes Hard Up Hill Fight Against Adverse Circumstances

With the close of the first Northwest Intercollegiate Baseball League, Oregon finished in the third place, but with a good average. O. A. C. takes first with a full schedule of games played, and the University of Washington second place, with nine games played.

It was not expected at the time of the formation of this league in Portland that baseball would pay for itself, and so far this is true, for although official reports have not been received from the different managers, it is known that

the sport has not paid its own way this year.

In proportion to the expenses of the other colleges, Oregon has a very small deficit. Manager Jamison said this morning that the season had been as successful as could be expected under existing conditions. Outside of paying for the squad suits, the baseball jerseys, and the coach salary, the club will break even.

Oregon baseball teams are handicapped in several ways, due, however, to no one's fault in particular. In the first place there is no enclosed baseball diamond on the campus, and although the crowds have been excellent at Midway Park, they have not been as large as if the games were played on the campus. Another handicap to the finances of the team is the manner of paying the coach. Idaho's coach receives his salary from the University fund. Pullman's coach receives no salary, and the coach at Whitman alone is paid by the student body.

Manager Jamison, however, expressed high hopes of financial success next year. With the exception of Dud Clarke, practically the whole squad will be back next Spring, and with the abundance of new material that it is hoped the freshman class will have, there is no reason why Oregon should not have a championship team, and that alone will attract a large crowd. It has also been rumored about the campus that a new baseball field will be made near the present football grounds, and if this plan is carried to completion next year's manager should have no trouble in securing the crowds.
