EXPOSITION OF BIBLE ETHICS BY DR. SHELDON

Traces Evolution of Hebrew System of Ethics By Bible

Dividing the development of Christian ethics into three stages, Dr. Sheldon pointed out that the ethics of the early Hebrews arose out of seeing the necessity for social cohesion, and was based on rules and social customs. The next type of ethics, as presented in Isaiah was a reconstruction of the former idea that prosperity followed righteousness. The misfortunes of the Hebrews at the hands of other nations caused them to reconstruct their ethical ideas in order to reconcile them with historical facts. The conclusion—prophetic of the future—was reached that the spiritual life has only an accidental connection with prosperity, that material possessions are after all of minor importance and that the real basis of life is the moral attitude toward man and the atavistic instincts or sin.

The culmination and perfection of ethical development is represented in the Sermon on the Mount in which it is taught that to enter the kingdom of joy, peace and happiness, one must be born again; that is, take a new ethical point of view. The difference between Buddhism and Christianity is that Buddhism's virtues are quiet and passive, and Christianity's active and positive.
