in all league games in the order of their choice. If at any time none of the three can officiate, the captains of the contending teams may agree on an umpire.

Sec. 5. An official scorer and assistant shall be elected by the Board of Directors to officiate in all games. If at any time neither can act, the captains of the contending teams may agree on an official scorer. It shall be the duty of the official scorer to report in detail the results of each game to the Secretary of the league. He shall also keep on file a complete record of all games. These records to be accessible to all.

Sec. 6. Each team shall furnish one official league ball in all games. The winning team to take both on the completion of the game.

Sec. 7. The rules of the National Association shall govern in all league games.

Sec. 8. No games can be postponed without the consent of the Governing Board, but appeal may be made to the Board of Directors. Petition for postponement of any game shall be made not later than one day previous to the day of the game.

### ARTICLE III.

Section 1. Any bona fide member of the above named fraternities or clubs, being a regular registered student of the University of Oregon, shall be eligible to participate in league games.

Sec. 2. No member of any fraternity or club who is not a bona fide amateur shall participate in any league game. (It being understood that the word amateur shall be interpreted as it is defined by conference rules)

Sec. 3. Any player who is a regular catcher or pitcher on the Varsity squad shall not be eligible to play such position on his team in the league.

Sec. 4. All pitchers and catchers trying out for such positions on the Varsity shall be considered as regular until the Varsity squad is picked. After such players have been officially dropped from such position they shall acquire the status of other players.

### ARTICLE IV.

Section 1. Any fraternity or club winning a season's series shall be entitled to wear the official "D" for the next succeeding season. Said "D" to be brown in color and 5x4x1 inches in size.

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
