TRACK AND BASEBALL SMOKER GREAT SUCCESS

Speeches, Wrestling Matches and Yells Serve Effectively as Pip Renovater

The smokeless smoker, one of the most successful athletic rallies in recent years, was pulled off by the supporters of track and baseball at the University gymnasium last evening. Some three hundred students were in attendance, fairly filling the gallery and down-stairs of the hall. Hon. Sam Friendly made the opening speech in which he commended the students for their desire for clean, successful athletics. Manager Barbour, Captain Hawkins, Trainer Hayward were the speakers for track and all of them voiced the general student determination to humble Washington in the big triangular meet here May 13th.

Captain Taylor, Coach Lynch, and Manager Luckey spoke on the condition and hope of the nine. In a few well-chosen words, Manager Luckey asked the students to properly support the remaining games to be played on the campus diamond. Coach Euchen, of the department of forensics, delivered an affective talk on debate, emphasizing the importance of the co-ed debate with Washington next Friday night. One of the most appreciated numbers of the evening's program was a recitation delivered by Hammond, the dramatic coach of the Senior play. Mr. Hammond, an alumnus of 1898, possesses the real "old grad" spirit and instilled considerable pepper into the assembled cohorts.

Other events of the evening's program were the wrestling matches, in which Kelly, Sam Robinson, Reuter and Lee Huggins participated. Kelly won from Robinson with two straight falls, Huggins succeeded in pinning Reuter's shoulders to the mat in the first and only fall of their match.
