Oregon, 72; Washington, 51; Idaho, 17, or in other words, Oregon repeated its old trick of taking more points than both its competitors. The photographs of the score board should be framed and hung up, as articles of permanent interest and value to serve as perpetual rebukes and denials to the croakers who have been prophesying that the sceptre had forever departed from Judah, and that Hayward could never come back.

Those who saw Saturday's meet, however, and observed the relative merits of the two teams, will not take seriously any such charges. Probably, indeed, the same old familiar cry of "robbed" will be raised heavenward when we defeat Washington on the gridiron next fall.

Meanwhile Bill Hayward wears a happy smile and is too busy receiving congratulations to bother about telling any one who he is.
