DR. SPERRY WILL TALK TO THE UNIVERSITY MEN

Is Scheduled to Address Assembly
Next Wednesday and Y. M. C. A.
Tuesday.

The men of the University are to have the opportunity of hearing the famous physician, Dr. Lyman B. Sperry in addresses next Tuesday evening at the Y. M. C. A. meeting, and at assembly Wednesday morning.

The University men are to have the opportunity next Tuesday evening of hearing a lecture by Dr. Lyman B. Sperry. The subject of his discourse will be, "Four-Fourths a Man." Dr. Sperry will also speak before assembly next morning.

Dr. Sperry is a man of wide reputation. He is an authority of the medical profession, and has traveled extensively over the United States. He is also an author and lecturer of power and interest. Although Tuesday is a busy evening for many, it is to be hoped that the men will turn out to hear Dr. Sperry. The lecture will be in the men's gym, at 7:15, so that the men can get home in time to prepare their studies.

The initial meeting of the college Y. M. C. A. will be next Friday, at 7 o'clock, in the men's gym. An especially attractive program has been prepared.

FOOTBALL PROSPECTS GO UP POINT OR TWO

Return of Ed Bailey, Giant Tackle,
Bolsters Up Line.—New Men
Begin to Show Up.

The fluctuating football market at Oregon raised a point when Ed Bailey the 220 pound cherub of two previous Oregon teams put in an appearance on the campus and announced his intention of again turning out for the team. His presence will mean more weight in the line which is something needed badly. Bailey turned out for the first time Tuesday night and it will only be a matter of a few days until the old war horse will be in the harness at tackle.

Along with the news of Bailey's return comes the report that Earl "Ty" Cobb, the clever quarter of last year's freshman team, is to quit the gridiron for the remainder of the season. Cobb has been troubled with previous injuries which forbid returning to the game this year. Cobb's loss will be severely felt as he was a player of Varsity calibre. While it was not probable that he would supplant Latourette at the pivotal position, still Cobb was a valuable substitute at either end or quarter.

Among the new candidates for line positions, Fariss and Noland look like winners. Kaiser, the big blonde from Alameda, and Heusner, a frosh from Cascadilla, show up well in the backfield. Jamison and "Brick" Michael, last season's Varsity ends, are out of the game this year and competition for the wing positions is perhaps the keenest on the team. The kicking department is the cause of considerable worry on the part of the coaches and students. As yet a kicker who will cause you to break your neighbor's derby has failed to show.

The practice game with the Vancouver soldiers will probably be called off on account of a disagreement about gate receipts. Manager Johns shrouds the early season practice games in mystery for some unaccountable reason, so the student body at large knows very little of what is going to happen before the opening of the conference season.

From early season appearances Nov. 18th will be the day of final reckoning for the conference championship. Very little is known of what Washington has in the line of new material, but it is dead certain that with over a hundred candidates out every night and Dobie and Max Eakins coaching and "Wee" Coyle to general the team, that the team from Elliot Bay will be the one big job for Coaches Warner and Hunt and Capt. Bill Main to tackle.

CLASS IN JOURNALISM NEEDS MORE STUDENTS

Organized to Meet the Demand of
Newspapers for News of the
Varsity.

To meet the demand for correspondents from the newspapers in various parts of the states, a class in newspaper writing is being organized. A number of editors have written, asking that news be sent them regularly, concerning the work of the State University and regarding the activities of the students from their localities.

This class, which is being formed, will meet at 1 o'clock every Friday, at the Library and will be instructed in the work by Graduate Manager Arthur M. Geary, who has had considerable experience in work along newspaper lines.

Besides the writing of news stories, a text on Practical Journalism by the well known newspaper authority, E. L. Shuman, will be studied. In this course, one full college credit will be given, but before the work can be successfully carried on, there must be a class of at least thirty students, who are interested in newspaper work. Arthur Geary, speaking of the course, said: "I hope that every student, who likes the newspaper work, whether he or she has had any experience or not, will join the class. I believe that the class can be of real value to the University, in supplying the demand of the press of the state for student correspondence."

It is understood that if the University gets its appropriation that one of the strongest journalistic men on the United States will be procured to establish a department of journalism here.
