Close Schedule made out for Club, Fraternity and Sorority Dates With Photographer

The picture taking will occupy the time from now until well past the middle of February, even if everything goes off according to the rather close schedule. The staff is working hard to prevent any delay in that department as they are making every effort to get the work out as early as possible, and delay in getting the cuts will hinder its early delivery on the campus more than anything else.

In order to save time and needless trouble, Nellie Hemenway, who has charge of the fraternity, sorority club and class pictures is anxious that every student sitting for a picture will tell the photographer just how many times his or her picture will appear in the volume, either as a member of any club or staff or officer of any student organization, so that the correct number of solios can be made at once. This plan will save the editors and the photographer much time which would be wasted otherwise in searching through negatives after they have been put away, simply because some student remembers at the last minute that he belongs to something which he had forgotten all about.

In order to give the book a neater and more uniform appearance and to insure better and clearer cuts, nothing but white backgrounds will be used in the pictures. It has been the custom formerly to use negatives for two or three successive years if they were good, but this year that cannot be done unless the pictures have light backgrounds. This will necessitate the taking of more photographs than usual but the cuts will be decidedly better as a result.
