

Claims that Many College Men Lead Lives of Inefficiency and Uselessness.

The series of special student meetings that are being addressed by Mr. Charles D. Hurrey, began last night with one of the most impressive talks that could have been given to University men. Mr. Hurrey grasped the thoughts and attention of the men with his opening sentence, and held it concentrated upon his theme, which he rapidly developed with an intense seriousness that was contagious. The men sat through the talk with scarcely a movement, held by the intense conviction conveyed by the speaker's thoughts and manner.

Mr. Hurrey dealt, as a college man, with the struths that are most fundamental to college men. He stated the fact, only too obvious to the world, that men are going out of the universities by the hundreds today to lives of inefficiency and often of usefulness. The cause of this he brought home to the men with the unerring force of a man of knowledge and experience. It is the fact that, in the freedom of college life, men get to doing things they would be ashamed to tell the folks at home.

The great men of the world today and always, he pointed out, are those who have learned to reverence God, the Bible, a clean life, and noble principles.
