**BASEBALL HIGH BROW
GAME AT WASHINGTON**

Washington Faculty Decides "Summa
Cums" Alone May Pursue
Horsehide.

A decidedly hard luck baseball story
appears in the Washington Daily of
March 19. It appears that the Northern
scholarship authorities have taken
a stand demanding a grade of "B" for
those men who make the two weeks
California baseball trip. This "over-
conscientiousness," as it is termed by
the Washington sporting scribe, is ex-
pected to tear great gaps in the blue
and gold lineup, especially with regard
to the pitching staff.

Dean Milnor Roberts, who appears
to have the high hand, as far as pruning
"deformed" athletes is concerned,
is quoted upon the subject as follows:
"I am heartily in favor of the men
making the trip, but we can no longer
permit fellows to miss two weeks of
school, when they cannot do satisfac-
tory work under ordinary conditions.
The rule now is that all those who
make the California trip, must have
"good" grades, and I would not con-
sider anything below a "B" as de-
scribed by this adjective. I do not
say that "C" would disqualify a player
but it would be much safer in such a
case if he had an "A" or two to offset
the lower mark."

In speaking of the pitching staff's
probable depletion the Washington
scribe closes his article with the fol-
lowing soliloquy: "If Boatman, the
Puyallup freshman who is making
good, were to be suddenly 'stricken,'
and with Johnson out of the running,
there would be nothing for the varsity
to do but hand the ball to the op-
posing stickmen and ask them to
kindly bat a few flies."
