Galaxy of Talent to Appear in Game Scheduled at 2:45 Sunday Afternoon.

There will be a benefit baseball game pulled off at Midway Park tomorrow afternoon, at 2:45, the proceeds to be donated to the fund for sending Trainer Hayward with the Oregon athletes to the Stockholm games.

A score of enthusiastic students under the direction of Ben Chandler and Obak Wallace are canvassing the down town business district this afternoon, disposing of tickets to the benefit performance.

The manner in which the students and friends of the University have entered into the spirit of the campaign has called for the highest commendation on the part of all those who realize the vital importance of sending Trainer Hayward along with the brilliant Oregon athletes, who were successful in making the national team.

Tickets will be on sale at Obaks up until the time for the game. The proceeds will be telegraphed to Mr. Hayward in New York, as it will be necessary for him to leave tonight in order to catch the boat which leaves New York on the 15th.
