PECULIAR CLAY IS FOUND BY CHEMISTRY DEPARTMENT

Professor O. F. Stafford, of the chemistry department, recently analyzed samples of a peculiar clay sent to his department for analysis by a resident of Myrtle Point, Oregon.

Upon investigation, Professor Stafford found that the clay was of a highly plastic nature, and that it shrank very little upon burning, thus making it especially valuable for pottery purposes.

A more thorough examination of the substance will be made later.


