WHAT COMES IN HERE ARE

Miss Tingling, who is lecturing in the interests of the Women's Christian Temperance Union, was formerly of Liverpool, England, where she was engaged in the same work. In her address Miss Tingling represented the temperance organization as an aggressive association, laboring for the annihilation of a great evil-the use of alcohol. She called those actively interested in this endeavor, "the heroes of the 20th century."

Charts, representing experiments and statistics, performed and compiled by great authorities, were introduced into the address to prove the lecturer's assertion that "even the moderate use of strong drink is injurious." Far the greates percentage of crime, needless deaths, lunacy, and epilepsy, in the world today, were attributed to the use of alcohol; and efficiency tests were used to prove the evil of its use.

Miss Tingling concluded her address by saying: "May every young man and woman find a place among tury."

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
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
