

RAILROADS PREPARE FOR BIG EXCURSION

Southern Pacific and Oregon Electric Announce Cut Rates to Albany.

Plans are already under way for excursions to the game. The Southern Pacific and the Oregon Electric have both made proposals to transport the crowd which will number approximately two thousand students and townspeople.

The Southern Pacific will furnish a special train to leave any time in the morning and to return immediately after the game, for a one way rate of \$1.35.

The Oregon Electric has promised a special train for a similar one way price of \$1.30, and upon the same running time.

Steps will be taken at once by Yell Leader Abe Blackman to mobilize the student forces for the game.

Announcement of more definite plans for the excursion will be made in the regular issue of the Emerald tomorrow.

Immediately after the O. A. C. Whitman game in Corvallis last Saturday, the question of a game between the University and the Agricultural College arose in a discussion between Coach Sam Dolan and Assistant Coach Gordon Moores.


Coach Moores admitted the superiority of the Aggie team, and told Dolan that the University was willing to play simply for the sake of putting an end to the wrangling, and with no hope of raising the Varsity's per cent for the season. Dolan then expressed his personal desire for a game next Saturday at Albany, in the light of that city's recent offer.

With this impetus and the promise made by both coaches to do as much as possible towards arranging the game, the matter rested until Coach Moores arrived in Eugene Sunday morning.

The Faculty members of the Athletic Council were informed of the plan proposed and gave their assent to the project. Coach Moores had the local situation lined up by noon, and ready for the arrival from Seattle of Manager Geary this morning. Coach Dolan telephoned to Coach Moores last evening, asking Moores to advise him this morning by 11:00 o'clock as to the action of the Athletic Council, but this body could not meet by that time.

A called meeting of that body resulted in the Council's assent being given to the Albany game.
