

COUNTRY CLUB MAY ABSORB GOLF LINKS

Club House to be Erected—Tennis and Polo May Also be Added to Outdoor Sports.

Eugene will have one of the best and most complete golf courses in the state if the plans of the Eugene business men materialize. Several of the influential men of the city, who are interested in golf and tennis, met recently and formed an organization to promote outdoor sports. It is the intention of the members to get control of the College Hill links and to locate a Country Club upon the property. It is planned to not only put the links in first class condition, but also to build a modern club house, where players may rest and have refreshments served. Tennis courts will be built and when the club is well under way, it is stated that some of the more interested members have planned to introduce polo to Eugene. Committees have been appointed and will report at the next meeting to be held a week from tonight.

Webb Kincaid, secretary of the new club, when seen today, said: "Eugene should be able to support a Country Club and a few of us have decided to promote such a scheme. So far we have been most successful in our enterprise and now have a membership of nearly 150. It is our plan to form a corporation and take over control of the links, which will be put in the best possible shape. I expect to be able to announce soon more complete details of the organization."

At present, by the management of Fen Waite, who has been reviving the interest in golf among the varsity devotees, the links have been put in better shape than for several years.

The weeds have been removed from the greens and in addition a strip 50 yards wide has been mowed between the holes. If enough students pay the fifty cents golf dues, the greens will be sanded immediately to help lower the score of championship aspirants.

In case the Country Club takes over the links a higher membership fee will be charged, but all those who join the varsity club will be entitled to the use of the grounds for the 1912-1913 season.

Junior Team Badly Weakened—Alpha Tau Omega-Sigma Nu Game is First of Club Series.

The basketball season of the University of Oregon will be ushered in immediately after the Thanksgiving recess. The great number of inter-class and inter-fraternity games, coupled with the Varsity try-outs, will give the fans a profusion of entertainment.

The announcement of the schedule of the inter-class contests for the possession of the Hayward cup will be announced at an early date. In all probability these will be staged before the inter-fraternity games or be mixed with them.

At present the cup is held by the class of 1914. The prospects of the Juniors retaining the trophy are none too bright, for they will be playing with three of their old stars gone from the line up. Bradshaw is ineligible (for the inter-class games) because of his place on the varsity, while Cady Roberts and Viereck are not in college this year. The weakening of the Juniors will give the class of 1915 a good chance for the championship, they having finished second in the series last year.

The first inter-fraternity game will be played on Friday, December 6, between Alpha Tau Omega and Sigma Nu.

Coach Hayward announces that because of a prospective California trip the Varsity squad will be selected and put into shape before the Christmas holidays.

ALBANY "COPS" WATCH ED GEARY'S ACTIONS

Presiding at Ticket Booth, Oregon Student is Dogged by Small Town Sherlock

Edward Geary, a student of the University, was one man in Albany last Saturday whose actions were closely watched by an officer of the law. In fact, Geary had the honor of being the only Eugene notable with a body guard for the great occasion. It happened this way:

Bert Pilkington, graduate manager of the Agricultural College, knowing of Geary's ability, begged him to assist in selling tickets for the game. Mr. Pilkington insisted and offered such an exceptional reimbursement for his services, that when the crowd began to arrive Geary was to be found before the main entrance dealing out the little pasteboards.

A few special officers on the ground were ordered to report to the Graduate Manager for orders. However, one of the newly made officers was instructed to this effect: "Watch that ticket seller."

This officer was a conscientious man. He evidently had not learned of crowds, of pickpockets, short change artists and other accessories, for not once did he direct his attention to the howling multitude, but watched the ticket seller as directed.

When the rush was over, Geary closed his place of business, took his sack of money, and went into the grandstand to watch the game. The officer accompanied him. Geary saw a lady friend in the audience. He went up to talk to her, and the officer was still onto his job. By this time Geary had formed his opinion of "small town cops."

The game was over, the ticket seller and policemen retired to the bank together, and the officer was still present when the vault was closed upon the precious coin.

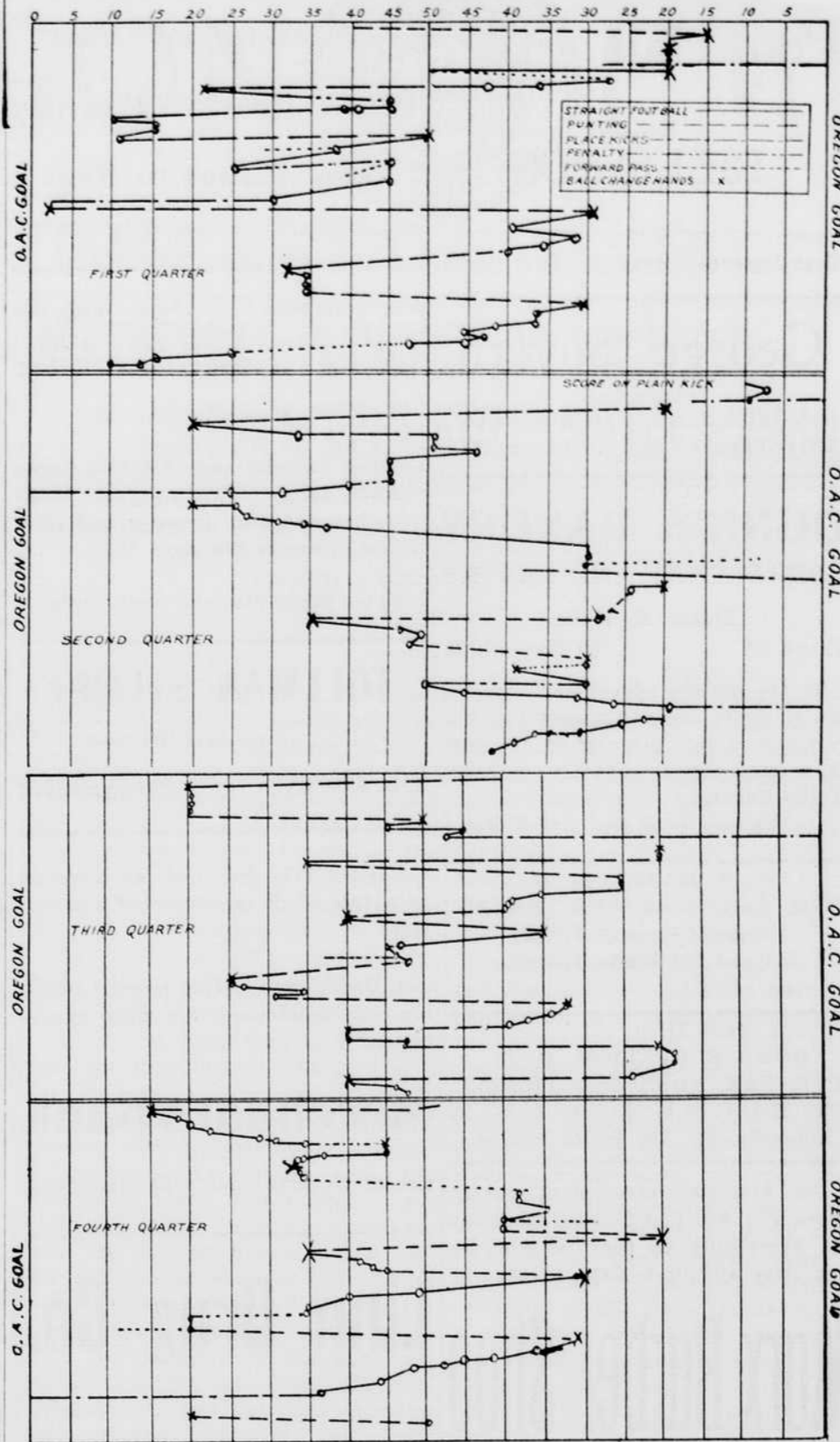
His supposed duties over, the officer immediately made application for his pay.

Game in Detail.

O. A. C. won the toss. Blackwell kicked to the 15-yard line. Walker received, but fumbled. O. A. C.'s ball on 20-yard line. Three downs, lose three yards. Place kick attempted from 30-yard line goes wide by two yards. On next play Parsons tore through Aggie line for 35 yards. Walker lost 15 on bad pass over his head, but Parsons immediately returned to 35-yard line on end run. Fenton punts 30 yards, but Oregon penalized 15 for holding. From the 45-yard line Cornell ran six yards on long end run, but Fenton forced to punt on fourth down. Blackwell returns punt, but Cornell runs back six yards. Oregon's forward pass to Fenton failed. Parsons plunges 10 yards. Oregon penalized 20 yards for holding. Forward pass, Fenton to Walker, no gain.

First Kick Fails.

Cook through center for 15, and Fenton attempts place kick from 30-yard line, but kick goes wild. O. A. C. punts to center field and the ball rolls to Oregon 10-yard line. Cornell picks up and circles left end for 10 yards. Parson covers four around the end. Cornell follows through center for six and Fenton punts 30 yards. O. A. C. return punt blocked. On next play O. A. C. line shattered and Blackwell forced to punt. Fenton received the 35-yard line drive and returns for six yards. Oregon makes yardage first down.

Score in Second Quarter.

Parson plunges six through center and Walker shoots forward pass to Fenton for 25 yards on Aggie's 15-yard line. Place kick by Fenton successful. Score, Oregon 3, O. A. C. 0. O. A. C. kickoff, return 15 yards. Line back failed and Oregon loses five yards for offense. O. A. C.'s ball on downs, but unable to carry ball forward. Evenden attempted place kick from 35-yard line, but failed. Cornell made five yards on first down; Cook makes yardage. Walker three through line. Parsons 25 through center to O. A. C.'s 30-yard line. Two bucks and a forward pass fail and place by Fenton from 40-yard line failed. Evenden makes yardage. Blackwell gained two yards, but forced to punt on next play. Punt 50 yards. Cornell returns ball to center of field. Fenton against punts 25 yards. Blackwell injured when tackled by Bradshaw and Walker. Richardson substituted. Cook recovers ball by receiving O. A. C. forward pass, but Oregon penalized 20 yards for

holding. Parsons makes yardage with 14 yards. Cook plunges three yards through center. Parsons follows with 13. Another place kick by Fenton goes wild. O. A. C. resumes play and makes yardage. Evenden out. Rasmussen substituted.

Second Half.

Evenden kicks off. Cook receives, but Crisman recovers former's fumble on 15-yard line. After unsuccessful line plunges, Evenden attempted place kick, which failed. Dewey fumbled. Cook recovered ball and Fenton punted 40 yards to center of field. After Parsons gained five Cook downed by Kellogg for loss and Fenton punted 40 yards, ball rolling over goal line. From the 20-yard line a fake play by Evenden failed and Richardson and Dewey unable to make gain.

Larson Enters Game.

Larson substitutes Robertson. Larson punts 20 yards, but Fenton returned 35. May fumbled, but Evenden recovered. Richardson enters for Blackwell and plunges 10 yards through center. Follows with four yards more. Shaw makes two. Larson punts 25 yards. Fenton immediately returns 30 yards and Evenden falls exhausted as he receives ball. Rasmussen enters game. Richardson gained 25 yards around right end. Two plunges by Rasmussen of no avail. Larson punts to 20-yard line. On first down Parsons netted three yards and follows with two more. Fenton adds three on fake punt, but is forced to punt after Cornell loses three. Richardson received the 30-yard spiral and ran back six yards. Richardson plunges for five yards on second down, and then Larson punts 35 to Parsons. Parsons returns six yards on first play, fails to gain on second and Fenton punts 45 yards. Larson, Richardson and Shaw successively fail to gain yardage. Larson drives to 10-yard line. Cornell injured, but resumed play.

Fourth Quarter.

Fenton punts 45 yards to Larson, who returns 10 yards. Richardson, Rasmussen and Dewey make yardage on straight football. On next play Cook intercepts Rasmussen's forward pass. Walker downed by Larson, but Parson plunges six yards. The O. A. C. line holds like a wall and O. A. C.'s ball on downs.

The Triple Pass.

Following two plunges by Richardson O. A. C. surprises with a remarkable triple pass, gaining 35 yards. After the ball carried Rasmussen, Rasmussen passes to May over shoulder. May to Larson, Larson to Dewey. Larson plunges seven yards. Triple pass failed and Larson punts 20 yards. Fenton returns with 40, but Dewey runs back 10. Richardson goes through line for two yards, then held and Larson punts 30. Parson received and is downed on 25-yard line. On next play he skirted left end for 35 yards. Parson carried two yards. Larson injured. Fenton's forward pass intercepted by Crisman on 18-yard line.

Almost Chance to Score.

On the 10-yard line Fenton spoiled the third attempted O. A. C. triple pass as May passed the ball by knocking it into air. An Oregon man fell on fumbled ball, but it was returned to last down on account of an offside play. Larson punts 45 yards to safety. Parsons stopped by Crisman. Oregon backs make yardage. Annunen takes Bradshaw's end. Parsons plunges 10 yards, but Larson stopped Walker. Forward pass, Walker to Fenton, failed. Attempted place kick from 40-yard line by Fenton fails short. Larson's punt to center of field ends game.

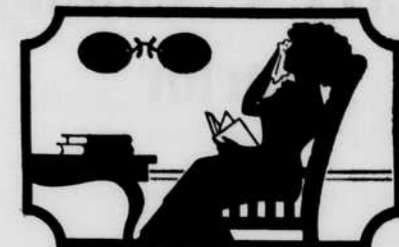
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
