

COUNCIL WOULD LIMIT MID-WEEK RECREATION

Regular Meeting of the Women's Council Busy Affair. Paper Offered by Miss Guppy.

The Women's Council, at the regular meeting Friday, expressed itself as unfavorable toward mid-week engagements for Freshman girls. Freshmen, they maintain, must limit their social activities to Friday and Saturday evenings. The action of the Faculty and Student Affairs Committee in their stand against any entertainments except on Fridays and Saturdays was approved. The Council further voted to co-operate with the Y. W. C. A. in the production of a pageant on December 14. Mabel Lawrence was elected to fill the vacancy in the Council.

Delta Delta Delta, Gamma Phi Beta, Chi Omega, Lambda Rho, Beth Reah and Mary Spiller offered their houses for the entertainment of assembly guests whenever occasion should demand.

Miss Ruth M. Guppy concluded the meeting with the reading of a paper on the "National Association of Collegiate Alumnae," which is composed of over five thousand college graduates throughout the United States. The aim of this organization is different from any other, as it is both civil, educational and philanthropic. The women are doing a large work in providing scholarships to deserving students and in securing women social helpers. The Collegiate Alumnae of Portland have for several years maintained a scholarship in the University of Oregon. In conclusion, Miss Guppy described some very effective work the organization is doing in Tacoma, her former home. Oregon women will not be eligible to this organization until the establishment of a building purely for women on the campus.

The last report of the superintendent of the military academy at West Point recommends that the number of cadets in the war school be increased to 700. The new buildings will easily accommodate this number. The superintendent urges an increase of students for economical reasons, and because he believes that the military status of the nation will be made more efficient by the education of more men in the art of war.

The superintendent also recommends that a modern hotel building, to cost \$3,000,000, be erected on the grounds for the accommodation of friends and relatives of the cadets.

Weyland, one of the tackles of the West Point team last year, who has been unable to play so far this year on account of studies, has just come out for the team and should strengthen it materially.

The election for editor of the Washington Daily will be held in three weeks. Several candidates are expected to enter the race.

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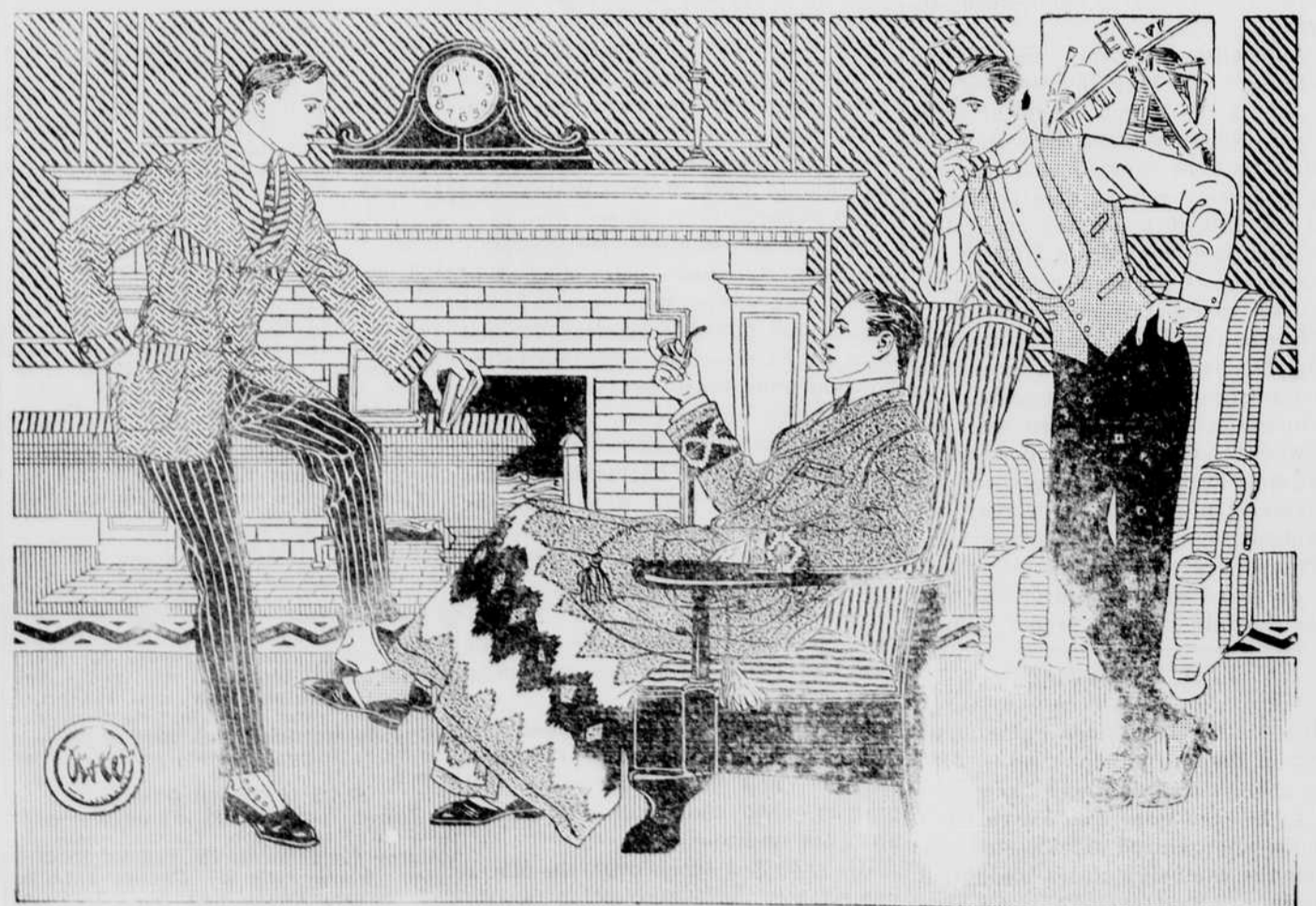
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
