

## CLUB GAMES POSTPONED FOR CLASSES

Sophs and Freshmen, Captained by Vosper and Davis, to Play Next Monday.

The schedule of the inter-fraternity basketball games has been changed because of the conflict with the inter-class games. ## ALLEN TALKS TO FACULTY

Explains Difference Between Press Agent and Reporter, and Explains Work of Journalists.

The news agent was scored, the supervision of news shown not desirable, and the position of the department of Journalism toward the University explained by Professor Eric W. Allen at the Faculty colloquium held Tuesday night. The press agent, declared the ex-newspaper man, bears an entirely different relation to the newspaper than does the reporters. In fact, the press agent verges upon what could be called an illegitimate newspaper man. Professor Allen mentioned this in reference to the suggestion that the department of Journalism be made a press agent bureau for the University of Oregon. To this he objected, declaring that the temptation to color news is too great, and to be able to give uncolored news is that which he is undertaking to teach.

Another suggestion offered was that the Journalism department be given the supervision of the news sent to the outside papers. In the first place, declared the editor, this is impractical, and secondly it is unnecessary. He stated that the newspaper correspondents are careful, and as far as any suppression of news is concerned, such a policy would be more harmful than good.

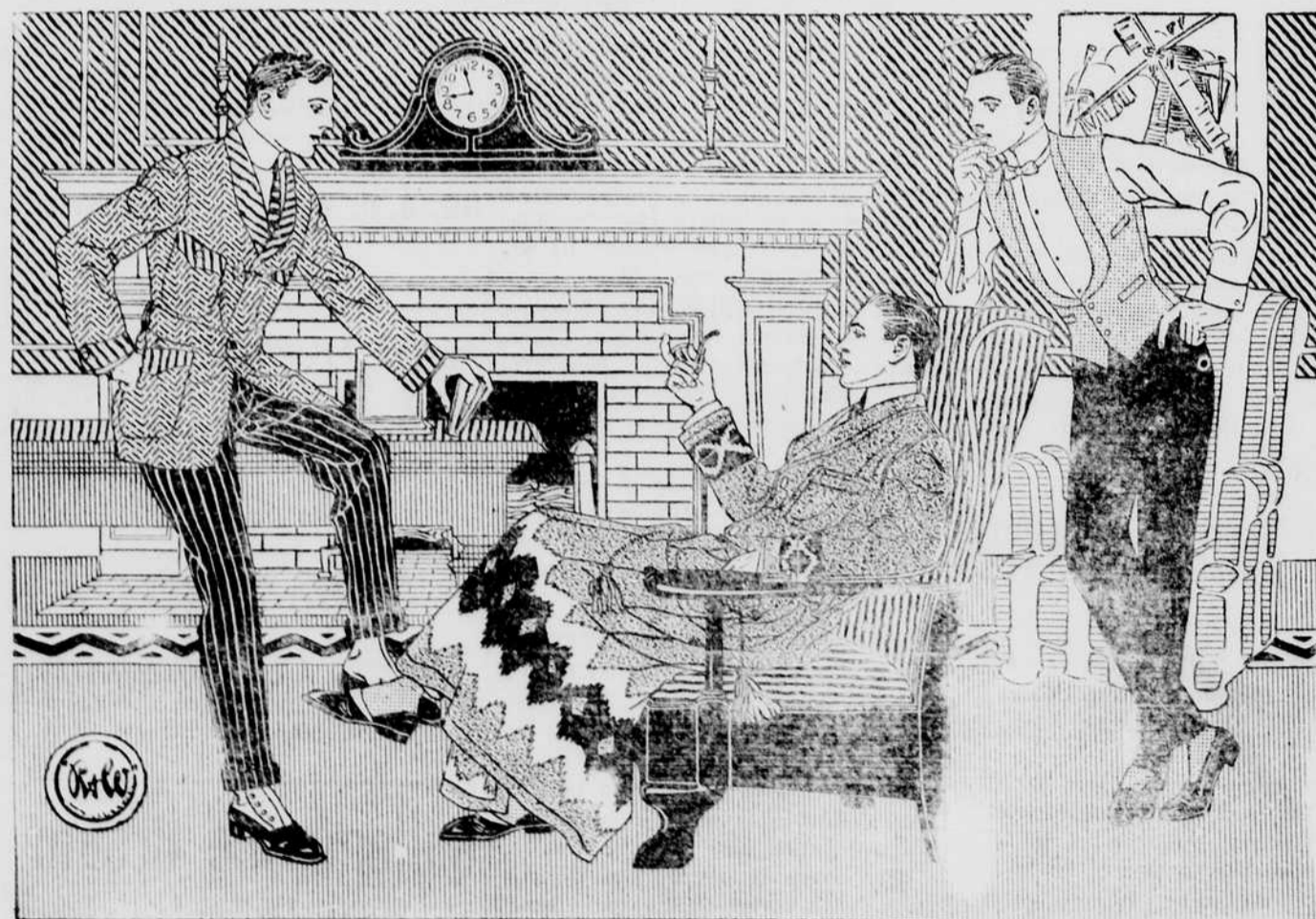
