A. management about a month ago, but owing to the extensiveness of his tour, a definite date could not be guaranteed until recently.

subscribe to the Alumni system. Better ability is in the market and such service ought to be secured, otherwise we cannot hope to meet in competition successfully our rivals." In his opinion the Middle West is the place to find a coach for the reason that an Eastern man possibly could not adapt himself to conditions in the West as readily as one from the Middle West.

George Hug heartily endorses the system, but would modify the present one. He would have only one head coach and give him absolute power and control of the team, with possibly one assistant. The money now spent for assistants would be used to bring back alumni to help him at such times as he saw fit.

"The best man for the place," said

Ray Goodrich, "whether he be a graduate or not." He does not oppose the graduate system, if they can furnish the man, but feels that Oregon men should at least have some Eastern experience. He said: "Coaching, like teaching, requires a broad knowledge of the subject, whether the man be a good player or not." They would not think of hiring Oregon graduates exclusively for instructors in the University without having had the additional training in other schools to broaden them. He heartily favored getting a man from the Middle West or Eastern schools.

seph Shafer, head of the Extension Department, "and promises to afford a great field of usefulness for the University. The equipment here is, of course, as yet, incomplete; and the help is insufficient. Those now engaged in the work are flooded with outside work. But, after the next legislative session, we will undoubtedly receive relief in funds, and the department will expand and do a continually increasing work."

At the meeting of the Board of Regents last Saturday, it was agreed to ask for \$15,000 annually for the support of this department and the summer school work.
