KOYL AGAIN CHOSEN Y. M. C. A. SECHETARY

Advisory Board Re-elects Man Who Has Built Best Association In Seven States

At the last meeting of the Advisory Board of the Student Y. M. C. A Charles W. Koyl was for the third time re-elected General Secretary of the Association for the coming college year, 1913-1914. Koyl was graduated from the Economics Department of the University with the class of 1911. He was the President of the Association in his senior year, and was elected class treasurer in his Sophomore and Junior years. He has always been identified with the work of the Christian Association, and has done a great deal toward bringing it to its present position on the campus.

Since he has been Secretary, Koyl has inaugurated the social service lectures, which have been so popular with the students. The budget has increased from \$1,400 to \$2,300 and the work of the employment bureau has been trebled. The number of students in the Bible classes has been doubled, and the Student Association at Oregon now ranks as first in seven Western states, according to Gale Seaman, Coast Secretary.

In speaking of the indications for the coming year, Koyl said: "The prospects indicate that the Association will be in a better position than ever before to meet the needs of the men, and the University as a whole I am confident that the organization, with the men who are now behind it, will do a great work. The present leadership represents the best that can be found in the University."

Koyl will attend the conference of Estes Park, Colorado, July 1 to 22. He will also attend the student conference at Columbia Beach in June.
