### MORE GENERAL PARTICIPATION

The best inter-fraternity track meet ever held took place this morning. The finest of spirit prevailed; the events were closely contested, and in short, it was again demonstrated that the Inter-fraternity Athletic League is one of the most valuable institutions ever established at the University of Oregon.

However, there is an opportunity for improvement, and now is the time to begin planning ways and means of making next year's meet of even greater benefit to the students and the school. The principal aim in the organization of the league and in Hayward's offer of the cup was to provide athletic training to men below Varsity standard, who would not otherwise participate in athletics. So far the fraternities and clubs have relied to too great an extent upon men of Varsity calibre to make up their teams, and there has not been the number of undeveloped men out training that there should be.
