WIFE'S MONEY DOESN'T KEEP LAW STUDENT OUT OF JAIL

She Wins \$20,000 in Breach of Promise Suit, but New Hubby is Jailed for Lack of \$22

Portland, Or., May 29-Two days after he married a woman who had just won a judgment for \$20,000 from another man on a breach of promise suit, Charles Yates, a University of Oregon Law School graduate, was arrested in Vancouver for larceny last week. He plead that he had no money with which to pay the \$27 deficiency, that would keep him out of jail. He could not furnish bonds, but was eventually released upon his own recognizance. The charge of larceny was based upon the accusation that he had taken \$27 from a client for an abstract, and that he had failed to deliver the money to the abstract company. He was acting as attorney for the L. E. Klupp, real estate Company, of Portland.

Yates' troubles came but two days after his marriage to Elizabeth Butler, daughter of W. L. Butler, of Polk county. Only a week previous to this Miss Butler received a judgment from A. B. Stevenson, of Dallas, on a \$50,000 breach of promise suit.
