Students Discourage Idleness.
"I am convinced that the student body of this institution strongly emphasizes the dignity of labor and the disgrace of idleness. I believe that the University is sending out into the world a class of energetic men and women," Mr. Harris said in part. B. W. Sleeman, of the Portland Building Trades Council, assured the assembly that organized labor approves of higher education, notwithstanding statements to the contrary. A. C. Raven, secretary of the Board of Control of the Portland Labor Press, predicted a large majority in favor of the appropriations November 4. E. J. Stack, secretary of the State Federation of Labor, stated that the labor unions had been misrepresented as to their attitude on higher education. Glenn Harris, representing the cabinet-makers union, urged the adoption of the compensation act.
Special music was rendered by the Glee Club quartette. Reverend William Parsons delivered the invocation.
