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WOMEN'S BASKET-BALL TRIP IS IN DISFAVOR

Miss Guppy and Dr. Stuart Declare Against Acceptance of Challenge

That the women of the University of California would play intercollegiate basket ball with the co-eds of Oregon is the substance of a letter received Friday by Miss Mary Moffat, secretary of the Oregon Women's Athletic Association, who have already signified that they are willing to play and wait only for the permission of Dr. Bertha Stuart, Miss Ruth Guppy and President Campbell. At present he is in the east and no definite action will be taken until his return about December 5th.

The challenge states that the California women want the match to be played on their campus, but other than this the arrangements are left to Oregon. No time is set, but it is presumed that it means before the holidays as this is virtually the close of the women's basket ball season in Eugene.

Intercollegiate basket ball is entirely new at Oregon, though the two matches of intercollegiate tennis with the O. A. C. co-eds last spring and this fall have not only been a success from the spectators' standpoint, but have aroused enthusiasm for the game, given the women an incentive to play and reward for their efforts.

At California the co-ed basket ball team has contested with similar teams from nearby colleges and twice has gone as far east as the University of Nevada. That the results have been encouraging and in every way successful is the statement of the secretary of their Athletic Association, and so much so that they now seek to extend their field to Oregon.

Basket ball at the University has always been the leading women's sport. Class teams every year compete among themselves. They are practicing at present, and beginning Wednesday, the interclass series will be played through the week. From these games three judges, Homer Jamison, Ed Shockley and Miss Harriet Thompson, who is coach, will select an All-Star team. Should the contest with California materialize this team will represent the University of Oregon at Berkeley.

That she is opposed to the game is the statement of Dr. Bertha Stuart, who believes that co-ed contests should not be played off the campus, and that intercollegiate basket ball is too strenuous for women. The Women's Athletic Association are enthusiastically in favor of the move and have unanimously voted for it. The captains of the girls' class teams, further have expressed their approval. Bess Cowden, captain of the Senior team, declares that "Competition does as much for girls' sports as for the boys. The girls who are now on the class teams are among the best students in the University. They are in perfect health and I feel justified in saying that they could easily stand the strain of competition and the time taken from the studies." That intercollegiate basket ball can do more than anything else to encourage the lagging interest of Oregon girls, is the statement of Captain Beulah Stebno, of the Junior team. TERESSA CARRENO PLAYS TO EUGENE MUSIC LOVERS

Audience Shows Appreciation World's Greatest Woman Pianist

After an absence of several years from this country, Madame Teresa Carreno, the eminent Venezuelan artist pianist, appeared in Eugene last evening before an enthusiastic audience. The recital was given under the auspices of the University School of Music.

The program was an interesting one beginning with the Beethoven Sonata Op. 57, followed by Chopin's variations; Schumann's Etudes Symphoniques, MacDowell's Les Orientals and the Schubert-Tausig Marche Militaire.

In the latter part of the program the artist had a chance to warm up, to get in touch with the audience and instrument. Her complete command of finger technique and the strength, which is hers, made the enormously difficult variations as easy as child's play to her. The brilliant Marche Militaire served as a fitting climax to her numbers. The attentive audience showed its appreciation by generous applause. Several encores were given by the artist.
